


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
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Partial View of Vaughan's Trial Grounds at Western Springs, Ill.

Suggestions To Our Customers In

Ordering From This Catalogue

A reading of the following will prove an aid to you and to us.

Early Orders: Our rush season comes in the months of March and April. Orders sent at once secure prompt shipment from our full stocks.

How To Order: Write your name, postoffice, state and express office plainly with black ink, on every order, and every time you write to us. Give plain express, mail or freight directions; where none are given, we route the same at buyers' risk.

Use Order Sheets: The use of our order sheets enclosed in this catalogue is a great help to us in facilitating filling and shipment of orders. One order sheet is for seeds and bulbs, the other for plants, shrubs and trees. Instructions for use are on the sheets. More will be sent on receipt of a postal asking for same.

Vegetable Seed Orders should plainly state quantity before the name of the variety.

Flower Seeds may be ordered by number, always giving quantity.

Plant orders should give quantity, variety and size.

Keep A Copy Of Your Order: Check goods received with this copy. Sometimes items are sold out or will follow later, in which case a slip is enclosed with other goods or notice sent.

Mistakes: These will happen in spite of all care. Write us at once with copy of original order if possible, and mistakes will be promptly rectified. Please do not return goods until you hear from us.

Orders Are Promptly Filled: Or in case of delay, notified by postal card. If you do not hear from an order sent us, within a reasonable time, send us a duplicate order covering date of order, amount of same and form of remittance, your name and full address. If you cover these points in your first letter, a long delay is often saved in tracing.

Freight or Express: All express lines in the United States and Canada carry seeds and plants at the special reduced rate of 20 per cent less than general merchandise rates. On moderate sized orders we advise express shipment rather than freight.

Our Terms: Are strictly cash with order. We prefer not to send C. O. D. but if wanted by that method, customers should enclose 1/4 of the amount in remittance with order.

How To Send Money: Send cash with order (as we do not open book accounts for small amounts, and can only send to the value of money received), by New York or Chicago Draft, Registered Letters, or Postoffice or Express MoneyOrder; both are cheap and absolutely safe. Small postage stamps are taken as cash, but we prefer large denominations, such as fives, tens or fifteens. Registered letters can be sent from any postoffice, and your receipt sent you by return mail, by which you know it has reached us. If local checks are used 25 cents must be added to cover the cost of collecting. Make money orders payable to "Vaughan's Seed Store."

The most desirable Asparagus for both home and market use. Where planters grow this variety, it soon displaces all others. It wins out because of its large and rapid growth, its rust resistance, its length of yield, since its crown does not divide, its unsurpassed its length of yield, since its crown does not divide, its unsurpassed flavor and its good color. In growth it even surpasses French Argenteuil, of which it is a selection. Growers around Chicago have been known to cut their beds in two years, but three years will always grow a heavy crop. Its rust resistance is a strong quality, which was proven in 1898, when rust nearly wrecked the Asparagus industry in this country. In the originator's field, where all else was ruin, the mother plant of this variety stood strong and vigorous. In color the shoots are purple tinged, when grown in the usual way, but when planted deeper, white. The immense white stalks are of excellent flavor, both fresh and canned.





This new "Potato" bush lima is a great improvement upon the old Kumerle or Dreer Bush Li-ma. In its form of growth this new variety is stiffly erect, new variety is stiffly erect, whereas the older kinds grew low and spread out, the pods often being discolored from lying on the ground. The season is early. The plant is extremely prolific, and the pod, twice as large as the Kumerle Bush Lima, contains four or five large beans. themselves much greater in size than those of the old variety. 





Its foliage is green and white and the stalks are tender, brittle, very sweet and of a nutty flavor.

It has been necessary to sacrifice size for earliness. On account of its small stalks, this corn may be planted 2 feet apart, thus making up an average yield. This is a Russian variety secured through Prof. Hansen, and we grow it far North to retain its early habit. 





HALF SUGAR MANGEL. Carrots are well liked by all classes of stock. Their feeding value also is high. They are especially valuable for horses and may be fed alternately with oats. The stables of the largest and best feams in the large cities feed carrots once a day all winter and spring. "Horses, like human beings, require a variety of food and thrive best upon a ration that involves a change of diet." Carrots require a deep, well pulverized soil, fairly free from weeds. There are short varieties for shallow soil and long kinds for deep soil. Sow 5 to 6 pounds per acre.

CARROTS AND BEETS FOR STOCK FEEDING.

Root crops for stock feeding are undervalued in the United States and ought to be far more generally grown than they are at present. The feeding value of roots is directly proportioned to their dry matter content. One pound of this dry matter has a feeding value of about one pound of cereal grains when fed to cattle. Roots, besides, are very digestible. Dry matter in root crops usually runs from 10 to 14 per cent. A low yield of roots per acre is 20 tons, a little over 2 tons of dry matter. This is equal in feeding value to a yield of 65 bushels of corn. The extra work in tillage in raising a root crop makes the cost per acre a little more than grain, so that, roughly speaking, when corn meal is \$10.00 per ton it does not pay to raise roots. However, when it is \$20.00 per ton, root crops are much the cheaper. A certain ratio of grain must always be fed with roots because the high per cent. of water in the latter prevents the use of too large a quantity for feeding.

MANGELS, OR STOCK BEETS.

The main essential for raising this crop is a well-prepared seed bed. In preparing seed bed, plow deep, and then pulverize finely. Sow six pounds to the acre. Enormous yields have been recorded on carefully prepared land; forty to fifty ton crops are not at all uncommon. Mangel is a surer crop than any other root. This vegetable ripens after harvest, and feeding generally begins about January 15th. Mangels give one-third greater increase of milk in feeding cows, than does the same weight of potatoes.











Asters must not be planted in freshly manured soil nor in soil that has been planted with Asters for two or three years previous. Unslacked lime or fresh wood ashes are beneficial if stirred in the soil a little before the planting.





Our Nursery has made good progress. Our collection of Shrubs, Trees, Hardy Plants, has been much increased. These are supplied by us to thousands of suburban homes, and in a large way to many beautiful new country estates now being laid out and planted near all the largest cities. We are prepared to design and supervise all such horticultural improvements.

IMPORTANT.—We ship all orders for plants immediately upon receipt. We will reserve plants for future shipment, but instructions to that effect must accompany the order. This applies specially to plants ordered in winter.

HOW WE SHIP PLANTS.

Plants by Mail. Small plants will be sent free by mail when so desired. The greater part or all of the soil is removed from the roots, which are carefully packed in damp moss. We forward bulky plants, such as large Roses, Shrubs and similar stock by express.

Plants by Rail. Shrubs, Hedge Plants and other dormant stock can be forwarded safely by fast freight lines, even to very distant points, at low rates.

Safe Arrival Guaranteed. We guarantee the safe arrival of all plants to any point in the U. S. or Canada when sent by express. If forwarded in any other manner they are entirely at the risk of the purchaser.

We prefer Canna beds entirely of one kind or color, and offer the following suggestions for planting in such a manner.

Cannas should be planted in good, rich garden soil, mixed with half of old rotten stable manure. Water sparingly for first two weeks after planting. When growing freely, water liberally. Set the plants 18 inches apart each way, and if more than one kind is used, be careful to plant the taller growing kinds in the center and the dwarf ones along the edge. This applies to planting in beds.





When trees are dug in the nursery a portion of the roots are broken or cut off and the balance that existed in the structure of the tree is deranged. It is therefore necessary that the branches be pruned. Fruit rees from 5 to 7 ft, in height usually have clear stems varying from 3 to 5 ft, with the branches forming a head. The branches must all be cut back to within three or four buds of their base. All broken or bruised roots must be cut off smoothly to the sound wood. In case of larger trees the pruning must be in proportion. We shall be glad to prune fruit and other trees ready for planting if requested; in that case, however, our customers cannot expect to receive trees that answer our specifications as to height, since they are for trees not pruned.







ALFALFA or LUCERNE.

This is such a profitable crop when once established that every farmer can afford to take great pains in order to obtain a stand.

- Alfalfa under ordinary conditions yields three to four cuttings per year, yielding a good four to five tons per acre and many times higher. Besides this heavy yield the hay produced has a feeding value of almost equal weight to grain, and while producing is an actual benefit to the soil on account of its nitrogen gathering bacteria on its roots.

There have been a great many failures in establishing this crop in the eastern states, but with increasing knowledge of its needs, eastern acreage is larger each year, and it is safe to prophesy that in twenty years there will be a good sized field on nearly every farm. Farmers who have not tried the crop should begin with a small experiment and gradually increase the acreage.

Methods of planting vary greatly. In the East spring sowing has not been generally successful as weeds start earlier than Alfalfa, win the race and spoil the stand. A successful method has been to manure the Alfalfa field in winter or early spring and harrow it in with a disk. Harrow as early as possible. Let a plowing follow and afterwards disk at regular intervals. Disking is practiced to keep down weeds and to prevent hardening of the ground. After a thorough cultivation and harrowing, about the last of July, broadcast the seed about 20 lbs. to the acre. Harrow it in 1 inch. Do not sow on wet, acid or poor soils.

Our seed is American grown and raised on non-irrigated land. It is as free as possible from noxious weeds. 
