## A Few Facts on Insecticides

It occurred to us several years ago that considering the importance, both in money spent and loss in crops, we greenhouse growers and florist's suppliers should know more facts concerning insecticides, and the best way to use them. For some years past, our Mr. R. J. Geary, has spent a large share of his time in making actual experiments himself and in consultation with leading chemical firms, government experiment stations, and state colleges. While the subject is very complex for the limited time the average florist has to devote to it, new methods of insect and disease control are continually being developed that require more attention than is given them. However, we feel that we can pass on to you a few fundamentals, that, if followed, would greatly reduce your insecticide costs.

We have found that most florists do not spray soon enough; try to control infesta tions in the early stages. Doing this, you not only save the damage to the crop, bu the cost of control will be much less. If you cannot diagnose your own trouble, ask your local state University or College, or send it to Washington.
Use the most efficient spray for the insect or insects you are fighting. Most insects are very susceptible to at least one or two chemicals, so if you know which ones, you kill most effectively, efficiently, and economically. For example, leaf rollers or tiers, are most easily controlled by pyrethrum extracts, ground pyrethrum flowers, or arsenical stomach poisons. Rotenone sprays (most sprays used by florists contain Rotenone) are not effective against leaf rollers, neither are thiocyanate sprays like Loro and Lethane. Again, rotenone sprays are best for aphids red spider, thrips, white fly and cyclamen mite, when they are on plants where they can be contacted with the spray; thiocyanates are the best for mealy bugs and chrysanthemum midge. (Rotogreen 106 contains both rotenone and thiocyanates with the best features of both). Many florists waste much money trying to contro thrips with rotenone sprays, even though most of the thrips are inside the flower buds and other places where the spray will not penetrate. The best thrip spray is poisoned bait consisting of two pounds tartar emetic, four pounds of brown sugar to one hundred gallons of water

Another great waste of money occurs in buying poorly formulated rotenone and pyrethrum sprays. The federal and state authorities try their best to police the field, but of course they cannot force the manufacturers of insecticides to change many features they know are detrimental. Many rotenone and pyrethrum sprays contain water, which not only gives you less for your money, but usually ruin the active principals of the spray material by a chemical process of oxidation, which is similar to the rusting of iron, only much more so. You can protect yourself against this by reading the listing of ingredients that every spray manufacturer is compelled to print on his product, unless it is $100 \%$ active materials. Naturally, if it contains water, it cannot be $100 \%$ active. Then too, many spray materials still contains water, it cannot be $100 \%$ active. Then too, many spray materials stid water conditions, but actually spoil the rotenone or pyrethrum they are combined with, both in the concentrate and in the spray or pyrethrum they are combined contain water or soap)
Great progress is being made daily in the insecticide field, and we believe it would be profitable for every florist to investigate the possible adaption of the following, new things to his use:

D N dust for red spiders on carnations
Methyl Bromide for the fumigation of pot plants against practically all insects, and greenhouse fumigation of chrysanthemum stock plants (one fumigation usually controls midge for an entire season if correctly done), and the fumigation of a gardenia house for red spider and mealy bug
Chloropicrin (tear gas) and Ethylene dichloride for soil sterilization. This is a cheap, effective way to sterilize the greenhouse, and flatting soil. Many growers ike it better than changing soil, and it is certainly cheaper. On request, we wil give more detailed information, or advise where it can be obtained.

For outdoor blooming start in flats in the house, shift into 2-inch pots and plant in April or so $v$ i. 1 t'le open as soon as ground is ready. To get satisfactory germination from Larkspurs in the hot weather, it is necessary to chill the seeds in an ice box for several days before sowing. Larkspurs must be grown cool. For a greenhouse crop in May, sow in January or February.

Annual Larkspur bought in the wholesale market was suspended in a cool, airy spot where it was allowed to dry for 60 days. When taken out it had not shattered and the color upheld.

## Pansies-Continued.

Pansies have long been a favorite with us. We introduced the Swiss Giants to American gardens and named and introduced the lovely Canadian variety, Maple Leaf, several years ago.
Each year we make extensive tests of all pansies in our greenhouses in Western Springs (this year we used two houses exclusively for them). The plants are checked for trueness of color and type and the mixtures for balance of color harmony. Next spring make a note to come out and see them during March and April.

How to Sow Pansy Seeds. Sow the seeds in a cold frame in light soil without any fertalizer. Cover the seeds very lightly with the same soil and keep moist. Shade the seed bed with cheesecloth or a muslin screen, and as soon as all the plants are up remove the screen. Or you may sow them in a large pot or seed pan.

To be sure of fine, strong Pansy plants, we suggest the following, applied as a top-dressing by the end of March or early April.

## POPPY

Cut newly opened flowers either early in the morning or in the late evening and immediately (within five minutes of cutting) burn the ends of the stems at the gas range or electric range for a depth of two inches. Burn them well until the ends are charcoal and glow red when taken from the fire. Then put them in fresh water and your Poppies will last from three days to a week in the house, or you can put them in full sun and they will stand up two or three days, or until the petals drop, without wilting. And very few even so-called fine cutting flowers will stand up like this in the hot sun.

OUR packet seeds are supplied on consignment on the usual terms, but with unusual display material and a unique method of direct delivery to you by parcel post. An assortment of flower seeds, or both flower and vegetable seeds as you choose, is sent you on consignment, to be sold at $40 \%$ commission. All flower seeds are 10 cents or more; some vegetables 5 cents, most 10 cents. Each rack is dated and bears a seed analyst's certificate of the purity and freshness of its seeds. At the end of the season you return the unsold packets in a bag supplied by us, and destroy the rack. You are credited with the returns and billed for the seeds sold, less $40 \%$.
