

KANSAS. (16 inches.) This Darwin hybrid has won first place among the few white tulips having the Darwin form and size by demonstrating its merit in the garden. It is the best for this purpose of all the Triumph class, which was bred by crossing Darwin and early single varieties. It blossoms a few days earlier, but maintains its quality throughout the season of the other tall, late flowering varieties. We recommend it as the most reliable white for your late flowering tulip planting. Doz., \$1.25; 100, \$8.50; 250, \$18.75.

ORANGE WONDER. (30 inches.) Here is a glowing color which no other variety can match. Recently introduced as a Darwin hybrid of the Mendel group, it has small resemblance to earlier Mendel varieties. It blossoms somewhat earlier than most Darwins, but holds in good condition until all Darwins are in flower. Equalling the largest Darwins in size, and held upright on strong stems, its glossy petals of bright orange blending to crimson make a brilliant display. Doz., \$1.50; 100, \$10.50; 250, \$23.00.

SMILING ANN. (28 inches.) Though classed as a Cottage Tulip, this new variety has the shape of a Darwin, with exceptional size and height. There is no Darwin with the delicate true pink coloring which in this case covers, not merely the tip, but fully half of each petal. True pink is a scarce color among the late Tulips, and for those who plan color schemes, we recommend this variety, to provide it. Doz., \$1.50; 100, \$10.50; 250, \$23.00.

CITY OF HAARLEM. (Darwin, 27 in.) Professionals in both Holland and this country rate this the finest Red Darwin, unmatched in bright coloring, shape and size. 
L. RUBRUM SPECIOSUM

Hardiest and showiest of Japanese Lilies, this is also the easiest to grow. In a well-drained location its bulbs live for years, bearing in late summer flowers in clusters, which may reach 6 inches in diameter on stems 4 feet tall. It excels as a cut flower and is much used by florists for corsages. Its petals are of exceptional substance and long lasting. Large bulbs, 8-9 inch, each 30c; doz., \$3.00.



L. TENUIFOLIUM

Coral Lily of Siberia. This grows 20-inch stems along which are suspended coral-red flowers, $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches across, with recurving petals. Grow in groups in the border where it multiplies from dropped seed. Largest bulbs, 3-4 inch, each 25c; 12 for \$2.50; 100, \$17.50.

Slender white wide-mouthed trumpet flowers nine inches long and very fragrant are borne on 2 to 3-foot stems by this hardy lily. The flowers are marked externally with reddish brown. The foliage is grass-like and the plants robust. 5 to 6-inch, each 35c; doz., \$3.50; 100, \$24.50.

4588 BLUE FAIRY TALE. Extra large flowers in rich blue shades with bright yellow eye. Very free flowering. Strong bushy plants with foliage of a rich dark green will measure 12 to 14 inches across with good culture in 10 to 12 months. Pkt., 50c.

Of all the new varieties introduced, relatively few survive the test of garden culture and take their place among the acknowledged leaders. The peonies you plant may outlive you, so it is important to choose varieties for permanent planting which have demonstrated lasting

merit. The four offered on this page are among the world's best, for display in the garden, or in the flower show. The flowers of each will last for days if cut in the bud stage and allowed to open in the house. Plant as soon as received in full sun, giving three feet in direction from other plants. Do not set the crown, from which the eyes grow, more than two inches below the soil surface.

FRANCES WILLARD. (9.1) A perfectly formed flower that is found among the winning classes in every show-room. Very large bloom of good substance opens an exquisite blush white, with an occasional carmine touch, changing to pure white. Late midseason. \$1.75.

KARL ROSEFIELD. (8.8) Very tall, compact grower of stately habit and an excellent bloomer, every stem carrying a huge flower of rich velvety-crimson. Very brilliant and striking. We consider it the best all-round red peony. Early midseason. \$1.25.





SCARLET AND GOLD

Princess Margaret Rose, Cottage, 25 in. This lovely flower is a "sport" of Inglescombe Yellow, known as the "Yellow Darwin." Edging each cup-shaped petal of soft golden yellow is a scarlet border, making it conspicuous but pleasing. Plant them in a group at a focal point in the border.

RED

Farncombe Sanders, Darwin. The only bright scarlet among the Darwin clan, this variety has held its own unchallenged by newer varieties. Its brightness is softened as usual with Darwins, by a pastel overtone. It stands on 25 inch stems. The flower is cupshaped, with white base.

DARK VIOLET BLUE

Queen of the Night, Darwin. So dark is the purple coloring of this variety, it is often called a "black tulip." But its large flowers on 28 inch stems and the richness of its color make it outstanding in any company. With yellow, pink and red companions, it brings out their beauty.

PINK


Princess Elizabeth, Darwin. This stately, well formed tulip was long the undisputed leader of all pink varieties, and still stands first in the opinion of many judges. Its large flower is bright carmine rose, silvery rose at the petal edge, and deep rose with white base inside. It is 26 inches tall.

Golden Harvest. Cottage. This is one of the largest yellow tulips, bearing on stems 28 inches tall large flowers of golden yellow and Darwin shape. It blooms early and its flowers last through a long season, increasing in size and beauty. It is larger than any yellow Darwin variety, and is beautiful in the border.

RED AND WHITE

Cordell Hull. Rembrandt. 24 in. Rembrandt tulips are all sports or mutations of Darwin varieties. This is a "broken" form of the popular Darwin Bartigon. It has petals of rosy red striped with white, and the same season of bloom as other Darwins. In border it provides an attractive contrast.

Kansas, Darwin Hybrid. This large snow white flower, with yellow center, was bred by crossing a Darwin tulip with an early variety. It blossoms 10 days earlier than other giant whites, but has the size and cup shape of the Darwins and is borne on a strong 22 inch stem. Plant them in a group, rather than singly. (3)

Darwin Tulips

Darwin tulips are characterized by a soft overtone which gives their colors a pastel effect. The flowers are cup-shaped and carried on tall, stiff stems. In color range they include all the rainbow hues, in amazing variety. Yellow, which long was missing from the Darwins, is now represented by several fine varieties; and new varieties include splendid giant whites.

Included in the variety lists on this and the following pages are many newly introduced varieties which show improvement in color, height, size or in some other important respect. But we retain the best of the old varieties, many of which may never be surpassed.

Pink and Rose Darwins

AFTERGLOW. (26 in.) All the splendor of a glorious sunset is suggested by this wonderful tulip with its deep orange tints suffused with salmon, and edged apricot orange. Tall, stately grower. Doz., \$1.35; 100, \$9.00; 250, \$20.00.

All varieties of the tall, late-flowering giant tulips are likely to be grouped in popular language as "Darwin tulips." They are often sold that way, though among them there are several clans, each having definite family resemblances, of which the Darwin, Darwin hybrids, Cottage and Breeder are most numerous.

All these bloom about the same time, and harmonize perfectly in garden plantings. They can be selected by color, height, and form for use in the garden border without regard to their ancestry. The distinction between these various clans tends to become less definite, as they are interbred by growers seeking improved varieties. We continue to list each tulip clan separately, however, to aid you in identifying favorite varieties, and also to give additional descriptive information. For an interesting planting, varieties of all types should be used.



Flower Seeds for Fall Sowing

When you sow seeds of annuals in Fall, you imitate Nature's method.

The ideal time is just before the ground freezes for the winter. November 15th is early enough in normal seasons in the vicinity of Chicago and New York. If the ground has been prepared in advance, sowings can also be made during winter thaws.

A fine seed bed is desirable, if the sides are protected with boards it will save the seed from washing away.

A light covering may be used if birds are troublesome.

Plant at half the depth used when sowing seed in spring.

Broadcast all small seed.

★Varieties preceded by star are especially recommended for sowing in the fall above your bulbs. They will grow in the spring and blossom after the bulbs. Their shallow roots will not interfere with the bulbs maturing properly; their growth will conceal the bulb foliage after it grows yellow and unsightly.

Irises are most effective if planted 3 of a kind in a clump.

As soon as iris plants are received, plant them in a sunny, well drained place. Each plant should have at least eighteen inches clear space from other irises, as it will grow in a circle and many varieties spread rapidly. The rhizome, or fleshy root stock from which the leaves and roots grow, should be barely covered with soil, with the roots properly spread below, and the soil well firmed about them. Until the plant is established, give it frequent attention, watering in dry spells. In the first winter, after the ground has frozen, a light mulch to prevent thawing and heaving will be beneficial.



Pointers on Planting Gall Bulbs

The first two months of spring, when garden beauty is most welcome, yet most rare, hardy bulbs supply the dominant flowers. And of all flowers, they offer the easiest, surest success.

Spring flowering bulbs prolong the garden season for a month at least; and in most sections they bloom at a time when all their surroundings are fresh and beautiful; when moisture is ample, weeds have not yet grown, and few if any insects bother them.

The greatest enemy of fall bulbs is poor drainage; they must be planted in locations where water drains away quickly, and if there is any doubt about this, beds should be raised above the surrounding surface sufficiently to insure it.


Bulbs will grow well in any reasonably good garden soil, but it should be well prepared to a depth of at least twelve inches. The depth of planting varies with the kind of bulb, but the depths shown on the accompanying planting chart are minimums, with deeper planting advisable in many cases.

When tulips are to be left for several years without lifting, bulbs should be placed 8 to 10 inches deep, where they will be cooler, will produce fewer "splits" and continue to maintain blooming size for long periods. Use no manure on bulbs unless it has been thoroughly rotted and can be spaded into the ground several weeks previous to planting. A balanced plant food applied to the soil at the rate of 5 lbs. to 100 square feet and spaded into the soil will benefit the bulbs.

The earlier bulbs blossom in the spring, the more important it is to plant them early in the fall, so they will have time to make root growth in their new location. Daffodils and hyacinths especially benefit from early planting

After the soil has been prepared, bulbs may

be planted with a trowel, or by the use of a blunt-end dibber. Avoid using a pointed dibber, or any device which will permit the bulb to be caught by the sides of the hole with air beneath it. The bulb should rest on the bottom with soil packed firmly around it.

What is known as the Dutch method is sometimes followed in planting beds. Soil is thrown out to the proper planting depth, bulbs are then placed where they are wanted and the soil filled in above them. This is a convenient method where a formal pattern is followed in placing the bulbs.

In case of necessity, however, fall bulbs can be planted as late as the ground can be worked. It is a good rule to plant all bulbs as soon as you receive them and you are willing to disturb established beds. Tu'ips should go in when the leaves fall. When late planting is necessary, cover the bed with a mulch of

Take especial care to plant them in well-drained soil, and if there is any doubt, elevate the bed a few inches to keep them above water. Plant bulbs 6 inches deep; after the ground has frozen a light mulch to keep the frost in will benefit.
