In 1 ss : the property was donated to the Methodist Episcopal Chureh, somth, and placed under the control of the ammal conference within whose bounds it Wats situated. It is now operated, throngh a board of tross tees, by the Western North Carolina Conference.Dr. J. A. Reagan was the first president of the institution. He has been followed in order by J. M. Cimpbell, Rev. J. S. Kemedy, D. I., E. M. Goolsby, Rev. I). Atkins, II. I)., S. A. Trawick, M. A. Yost, Rev. George F. Kirby, J. M. Robeson, Rev. L. B. Abernethy and Olins. bean, the last of whom entered upon his administration with the session of 1909-1910.

Sy inexpensive board and tuition, the school has put its splendid adrantages within reach of poor and rich alike. As a result, many worthy hoys and girls from all classes have availed themselves of the opportunities offered here. Thus, during the thirtyseren years of its history, Weaverville College has sent forth from its halls gamates that have hecome eminently prosperous and useful in sociat, religions and political life.

The institntion is one of the jmin colleges of sonthern Methodism. It does not mofess to be what it is not, althongh its work and cmrriculnm are equal to those
jficto anto Trutpose of many who make larger pretensions. It is one of those schools, commonly known by the name of seconrlary, that sustalin a vifal relation to the church and to society becanse they take hold of the student in the pastic years and train him in the fundamental facts of true edncation, assisting him not alone in the mastery of text-book knowledge, but in the formation of habits that determine character.

Its purpose is to create and build mp in fomg men and roung women the desire to be what they onght to bethoughtful, appreciative and successful students of life, with its problems, opportmities and responsibilities.

The town of Weaverville, a prosperous community of ahout fise hundred inhabitants, is situated in the heart of the hills about eight miles from Asheville, and is
