

Orthography, Masterpieces of American Literature, Maury's Manual of Geography, Reed & Kellogg's Higher Lessons in English, Wentworth's Arithmetic, Collar and Daniel's First Latin Book, Harkness' First Greek Book, Wentworth's Algebra, and History of North Carolina and of the United States.


In addition to the above, students will be required to take English, Roman and Grecian history.

SCIENTIFIC COURSE.

The above course, without Greek, satisfactorily completed, will entitle a pupil to a diploma with a degree of B. S.

ELECTIVE STUDIES.

Students who prefer it will be allowed to substitute a two years' course each in German and French for the Greek course. Some of the text-books used are: In



French, Otto's Grammar and Joyner's Reader, La Litterature Française, Classique et Contemporains; in German, Otto's Grammar and Reader, Evan's Compend of German Literature.

TERMS.

Cash in advance at the beginning of term, except by special agreement. Interest is charged on all balances and delayed payments. A liberal discount will be made when tuition for the term is paid in advance. Students will be charged from the time of entrance to the close of term, and in case of protracted sickness, tuition will be refunded for the time pupils are compelled to be absent; but in no case will the tuition be refunded for voluntary absence or when suspended or expelled.

Day students, or such as enter by special agreement for a short time, will be charged higher rates.

Any damage done to school property is paid by the doer of such damage.

BOARD.

Board in private family, per month, \$7 to \$9.



DEPARTMENTS OF MUSIC AND ART.

The teacher in charge of these branches has had the best advantages for study and is prepared to do good work. These departments are open to both sexes.

THE PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.

This department is under the direction and supervision of the Faculty of the College, and is presided over by a teacher of experience and acknowledged ability and adaptedness for instructing the younger students. Rare advantages are offered in our Primary Department.

PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

Students of this department are also under the direction and supervision of the Faculty of the College, and are instructed by the Faculty of the College.

MATRICULATION.

In order to become a member of the College, the student must call upon the President, enroll his name, and pledge conformity to the laws of the College, and make arrangements for the expenses of the term.

Students are received at any time, but we would emphasize the importance of entering at the beginning of the term. No deduction will be made for absence, unless it be for protracted sickness or other unavoidable circumstances.

GOVERNMENT.

An important part of education is self-government. The discipline of Weaverville College first proposes to the student self-government as the highest type of government, and seeks to surround him with a social atmosphere toned with purity, honor and piety. The deportment enjoined for maintaining membership and good standing in the College is defined by the morality of the



Bible, the proprieties of gentlemen, and the fitness of our positive rules.

Every student is required to be present at chapel service, which consists of the reading of the Scriptures, singing and prayer.

Want of moral character and reckless indifference to law and order, the use of ardent spirits, carrying pistols, card playing and gambling of any kind, profanity, lying, fighting, or any other gross violation of order, will disqualify any one for membership in the College.

Every student is expected to assist in maintaining good order.

PUBLIC WORSHIP.

Public worship is held on Sunday, at which all students are required to attend. Students, with the advice or permission of their parents, and with the consent of the Faculty, my attend worship elsewhere. Every student is urged to attend Sunday-school.

A Christian character is considered the great essential, and no pains will be spared to surround the students with such influence as may be necessary to restrain them from vice and encourage them in virtue.

EXAMINATIONS.

At the close of each term, examinations are conducted in writing, as a test of proficiency and advancement, and each student's grade is recorded. If a grade of seventy in one hundred is not reached, the subject must be reviewed. No one can graduate until this grade has been reached on all the studies in the course.

DEGREES.

The degree of Bachelor of Arts is conferred on those who complete, in a satisfactory manner, the studies of the entire Classical Course.

Graduates in the Scientific Course receive the degree of Bachelor of Science. Diploma fee, \$5.00 All dues to the College must be satisfactorily settled.



The degree of Master of Arts is conferred on the graduates of three years' standing, who have sustained themselves honorably in scholarly pursuits, upon their application for the degree, accompanied by the usual diploma fee, \$5.

TERMS AND VACATIONS.

There are two terms in the year. The Fall Term begins on the first Thursday in September and continues eighteen weeks. The Spring Term begins at the close of the first, and continues eighteen weeks.

PRIZE MEDALS.

THE MATHEMATICAL MEDAL

This medal is furnished by Mr. J. J. MACKEY, and is awarded annually, during the commencement exercises, to the student who stands the most satisfactory examination in the College Course of Mathematics.

THE REAGAN MEDAL

For the encouragement of proficiency in Oratory, this medal is given annually at the commencement, by Rev. J. A. REAGAN, M.D., to the successful candidate in the oratorical contest.

THE VANDIVER MEDAL.

This medal was established by the liberality of Mr. E. F. Vandiver, and is awarded annually to the best declaimer.

THE AUSTIN DEPORTMENT MEDAL.

This medal is furnished by Rev. J. F. Austin, and is awarded annually to the student that has the best deportment record.



THE "NANNIE BLACK BURNETTE" MEDAL.

This medal is furnished by Mrs. N. B. McDowell, the teacher of Elocution, and is awarded annually for excellence in Elocution in the female department of the College.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

The Cliosophic, Delphian and Entre Nous Literary Societies hold weekly meetings for literary exercises, and form an interesting and important part of our literary organizations. They award medals for excellence and improvement in debate, and English Composition.

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REPORTS

Reports will be sent to the parent or gnardian of each student at the close of the term or oftener, and will contain an account of the student's proficiency and diligence in study, and general deportment.

FREE SCHOLARSHIPS.

Ministers of the gospel, preparing for the regular pastoral work, are not charged tuition, provided, however, they engage in that work; if they do not, they will be expected to pay as other students. Deductions are made in favor of the children of ministers in the pastoral work.

APPARATUS, LIBRARY AND MINERALS.

We will secure apparatus as soon as we are able. Our chemical apparatus is sufficient for our present purposes. A fee of \$1.00 per term is charged for laboratory work.

We have some books as the beginning of a library. We hope to add to these from year to year. Any donations of books will be gratefully received.

A good nucleus for a cabinet of minerals has been collected. Additions will be made from time to time. Our friends will confer a favor on us by sending us specimens of minerals, fossils or woods.



LOCATION. .

Weaverville College is beautifully situated in that salubrious clime, "The Land of the Sky," eight miles northwest from Asheville, and four miles east from Alexander station, in one of the most picturesque portions of the far-famed mountain region of Western North Carolina. Weaverville is a small, quiet village, containing about three hundred and fifty inhabitants.

The circuit and district parsonages of the M. E. Church, South, and one of the M. P. Church are located here.


