There is also the campus center. This encompasses the game room, the cafeteria, and the new commuter's lounge. The game room has pool tables, ping-pong tables, and













The film will be used to let people know what Gardner-Webb is truly about. Like the theme of the film says, "Gardner-Webb is a people place."









The College Reaches for the Sky

On November 19, 1988, Gardner-Webb College took a giant step forward by breaking ground for the Craven E. Williams Observatory. The \$107,000 project will be used to house the college's collection of telescopes and provide classroom and meeting space. It will be the only observatory in the area, and the equal of any in western North Carolina.

The observatory is being named after former Gardner-Webb president, Dr. Craven E. Williams, who broke ground for the facility. It will be over 1700-square feet with an observation pad, a domed room, a classroom, a faculty office and storage rooms. The observatory will be used to enhance the college's offerings in the area of astron-

omy, provide faculty research facilities, and facilities for local public schools and groups.

Housed in the observatory will be the college's collection of five telescopes, donated to the school by Dr.James Herman. The domed room will be used to house two large motor driven telescopes which will be used to view deep space. The other three telescopes are portable and can be used outside the observatory or on the observation pad.

The observatory will be located along Stadium Drive, near the baseball and soccer fields. Funding for the observatory was provided by a \$43,000 grant from the Janin'e Foundation of Asheville and through local donors. The expected completion date is Fall, 1989.
