


- Back in 1964, the Craig Building used to be the Dover Library.

- In 1993, Gardner-Webb became a university.






Roughin' It for NYC!



What is Army ROTC?

Army ROTC provides collegetrained officers for the Army, Army Reserve and Army National Guard. The Army ROTC program is offered at more than 600 colleges and universities throughout the nation. As the largest single source of Army officers, the ROTC program fulfills a vital role in providing mature young men and women for leadership and management positions in an increasingly technical Army. Army ROTC is a 4-year program, divided into two parts - a Basic Course and an Advanced Course. The Basic Course is normally taken in [students']

freshman and sophomore years. The Advanced Course is usually taken during [their] final two years of college and includes a fiveweek Leadership Development and Assessment Course that is normally attended in the summer, between [their] junior and senior years. Leadership Development and Assessment Course will give [students] hands-on training and the confidence [they] can't learn in a classroom. The mission of Army ROTC is to "Commission the future officer leadership of the U.S. Army.







Missions

Ten Gardner-Webb students with Dr. Eddie Stepp and his daughter embarked on a 27 hour (15 by plane 12 by train) to Northern Russia in Cherepovets in the Vologda Region. For six days, we spent our time leading games, crafts, skits, and simply loving on Russian kids from troubled homes in two different regions of Cherepovets. Four days were spent in New Corners, labeled an impossible area to live in by scientists, due to the large factories and smokestacks. The apartments are extremely small and the chance to change one's future status was quite slim, but the children were alive with joy and beauty within their dreary environment.

We spent two days at the Light of Hope Center, where the children are provided with a free lunch daily and a positive place to spend time afterschool. For many of the kids, this is their one chance to play when teams come for camps. There was a good three feet of snow on the ground, so snowball fights were fun with the children and an interesting conversation piece to contrast our winters back in Boiling Springs, where we get about a day of snow each year, compared to 6 months! We were blessed with a day to tour Moscow, the famous Red Square, and the massive Kremlin.

At first, Russia might have seemed intimidating, how big it was, how cold, how gray, and how somber of a place. Yet, we gradually realized that life there could be beautiful. We saw this in the kids' eyes, in our fellow Russian Believers, and even among the smoky neighborhood of New Corners which began to feel like home. With Christ, everything has hope and beauty and we certainly saw God in Russia, but also the vast need for more believers to come to Russia's need.






COING FOR THE COAL






INTRAMURAL FOOTBALL


