With a glance at the invention of the wheet, World history students were off to a rolling start. Next they moved to ancient civilizations. puzzling over the spellings of "Hammurabi" and "Thucydides." White World history Classes watched Europe awaken from the Middle Ages, American history students had ringside seats for the American Revolution. Finally, both classes struggled into modern times and through two World W'ars, then took a concerned look at our troubled present.

This year for the first time at GHS, a brand new laboratory made the study of foreign languages more realistic. Inside one of thirty booths, a student of French or Spanish faced a panel of controls. After donning his ear phones, which he dutifully refrained from "clacking" together, he had to fight the urge to shout "blast off" instead of quietly pronouncing "Bonjour" or "Buenos dias" into the microphone.

When not in the lab, French students tried desperately to understand verb conjugations; while those studying Spanish followed Don Quixote as he tried to revive the age of chivalry. Latin students found that root words and prefixes aided them in the study of the modern languages. From Caesar to Cicero, they learned not only the language but the culture of the ancient Roman empire.

Mathematics is a development, a logical progression from basic ideas. At Greensboro Senior High School the student develops just as mathematics does, beginning with fundamental facts and gradually progressing to more complex concepts. The development began with instruction in the basic processes of all mathematics and passed to the symbolism of algebra.

Next the students entered the realm of geometry, dealing first with plane figures and then with solid forms, concluding their high school study with trigonometry. Each step in the student's growth was based on the foundation of all that had been learned previously and carefully prepared them for further study.

To emphasize graphically the use of homemaking skills in vocations, home economics classes presented an assembly in December. While investigating careers corresponding to their interests, however, the girls were urged not to overlook opportunities for daily applications of home economics. ## Composer and his composition challenge Choir



As school began sixty-six choir members reluctantly dragged their thoughts from last summer's trip to Nassau and concentrated on the challenging year ahead.
