Favored, but injury laden, the Whirlies absorbed an overwhelming upset victory by the Smith Eagles. The score, 48-32, was indicative of the sparkling offensive show exhibited by both teams.

The season ended with a last-second touchdown by Reynolds. Victory and a chance for a playoff berth barely escaped.

Despite the invaluable height, the Whirlies were haunted with the absence of a playmaker. Ball handling errors determined the outcome of several contests. Dominated by Seniors, the starting line-up consisted of Joe Howard and Mike Hipps-a back court duo. They were joined by Tim Browder, Bruce Piephoff and Mike Scott in the fore court. Top reserves were Robbie Wilson, Keith Broome and Ronnie Bolton. Frequent action seen by this trio during the year was due to a constant shifting of the starting line-up.


On December second, Whirlie hoopsters opened a long, belligerent campaign that was to end in the finals of the Central-4A Conference Tournament on February 25.
