

The President's Message

A NATION is a debt to a great man," said Senator Norris. A debt is to arrive at a Supreme Court, says Roosevelt.

The President's message on the reorganization of the Federal Judiciary is not forthright. It is not candid. Instead of meeting what is the most important issue before the American people it seeks to skirt it and to substitute substitutes for clear-cut policy. It does not re-define or seek to limit by law the powers of the Supreme Court, but it moves to subject it to the personal will and leadership of the Executive.

There is a constitutional issue to this proposal. It has come not clearly in the last four years. The character and nature of the election victory was an indication that the country as a whole wishes to move in certain directions which have been opposed by repeated Supreme Court decisions. There has been a growing feeling not only among Democrats but shared by many Republicans that the court's power to block legislation desired by an overwhelming majority of the nation's representatives ought to be curbed. Many authorities on the Constitution have advanced various proposals to this end. It has been proposed, for example, that no statute may be declared unconstitutional except by a greater vote of the majority than a two-to-one decision. Some have demanded a two-thirds or a two-thirds majority. Senator James Eastland, and at one time even Senator Norris, have supported such an amendment.

Others have proposed laws specifically giving power to Congress to legislate in certain fields. Senator Ashurst, for instance, chairman of the Judiciary Committee, has a seven-word amendment.
