# Novelties and Rarities. 

[Measurements are inside of spines, in Centimetres.]
Cereus chloranthus, var. cæspitosus-A few fine colored specimens; 75 c to $\$ \mathrm{r} .50$ each.
Cereus Cochal, Orcutt-Bright green, tree like, with stout black spines, flowers greenish white ; $\$ 60.00$ per 1oo.
Cereus Engelmanni, and varieties-Fine clusters, 3-6 heads, 1arge ; $\$ 1.00$ to 2.50 each.
Cepeus gummosus, Engelm-A large species with broad black spines, plants $25-35 \mathrm{~cm}$. high; \$100.oo per ioo.
Cereus maritimus, M. E. Jones-A little known, low-growing, cæspitose species ; $\$ 75$.oo per ioo.
Cereus mojaveusis, Engelin-A cæspitose kind, of great symmetry, hundreds of heads growing sometimes into one great hemisphere, covered with blood-red blossoms.

Cereus Pringlei, Watson-The "Giant" of Lower California, growing sometimes fifty feet high. Plants from 25 to 60 cm . high; \$200.00 per ioo.
Echinocactus Enoryi, var. chrysacanthes-A beautiful new variety of E. Emoryi from the islands of Lower California, having twisted yellow spines, handsomer than E. Grusoni. Flowers, satiny-orange, sometimes with broad crimson mid-vein.

Echinocactus Emoryi, vat. - (No. 201), from Lower California -Dark crimson flowers ; \$roo.oo per ioo.
Echinocactus Mc是owellii, Rébut-Mammillaria-like, thickly set with long, straight, yellowish-white spines, from among which the mauve-pink blossoms hardly push out; $\$ 50$.oo per 100 .
Echinocactus polycephalus-We have some fine clusters about 30 cm . in diam. \$3.00 to $\$ 5.00$ each.
Echinocactus Trollieti, Rébut. (No. 79)-Egg-shaped, very symmetrical, with dark spines lying close to the body. Flowers chocolate and yellow ; \$2.0o each.
Mammillaria Goodridgii monstrosa-A beautiful symmetrical specimen Io cm. across ; price \$1o.oo.
Mammillaria Halei, Coulter-Cereus-like, with straight, long, stiff, purplish-brown spines, scarlet flower and large red fruit. From the islands of Lower California. Makes fine clusters. Good plants $8-15 \mathrm{~cm}$. high, $\$ 100.00$ per 100 .
Mammillaria radiosa Alversonii, Coulter-A fine upright grower, after the style of M. Arizonica, but far finer, and a native of the Californian desert ; \$50.00 per roo.
Pilocereus Sargentianus, Orcutt-When young bare, with small bunches of star-shaped spines along the 5 or 6 ribs, resembling the appearance of C. gemmatus; when older covered with soft, white bristles, $3-6 \mathrm{~cm}$. long along the ridges of the clear-cut ribs. Body, a clear, pale green. Flowers pink, profuse along the ribs and half way down the plant.
