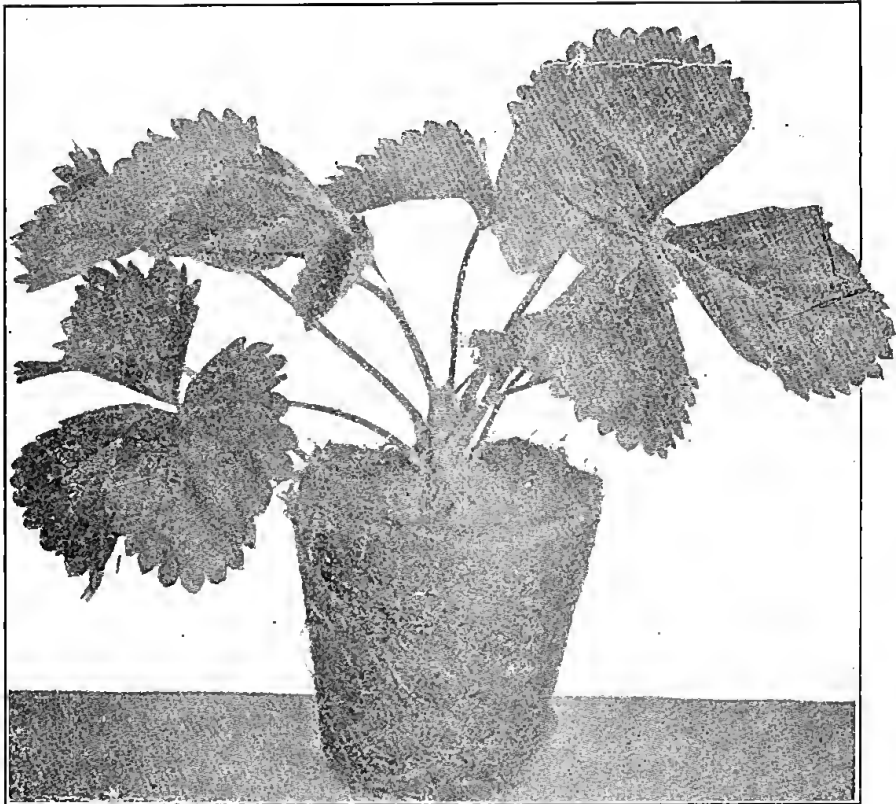

---

**P**OTGROWN strawberry plants are much superior to the ordinary ground layers usually sold, as there is no loss of fine roots in taking them up. They can be transplanted at any season with scarcely any check to their growth. The sooner pot-grown plants can be set out after June 1st, the larger they will grow and the more they will produce the next spring. We only offer varieties that are considered the best of existing sorts.

Those marked "P" have pistillate or imperfect flowers and must be planted near perfect-flowering kinds in order that the flower may fertilize. Varieties not so marked are perfect-flowering and can be planted alone.

### Brief Directions for Culture

Strawberries require rich, well-tilled soil. The plants should be set 15 inches apart, in rows 2 ft. apart. 100 plants will plant 4 rows 30 ft. long, if set above distance apart. For horse cultivation set plants 2 ft. apart in rows 3 ft. apart. 7,260 plants at this distance will plant an acre. Firm the plants well in the soil, keeping them thoroughly cultivated and cut off all runners. About the middle of December, cover bed with salt-meadow hay, straw or leaves. In April, as soon as the plants show indications of growth, push the covering away from the plants to allow them to come through. The mulching protects the plants from cold in the winter and heat in the summer, keeping the fruit clean and prevents the growth of weeds.

This variety is remarkable for the large size of its round, scarlet-crimson berries which frequently average two ounces. The flesh is scarlet, melting and juicy, with a pleasant musky flavor. A good forcing variety. Midseason. 75c. per doz.

#### AUGUST LUTHER

One of the best early varieties. Is very prolific, fruiting early and continuing until practically every berry reaches a good size. Berries are uniform in size and shape; dark red; firm. \$4.00 per 100.

#### AUTO (New)

An immensely productive variety, bearing large, handsome berries of the finest quality. \$4.00 per 100.

#### AROMA

One of the oldest sorts now in general use, but still a valuable berry. It has the same season as Gandy, is not quite so large but is more productive; with good care it is large enough for market, especially as it is very uniform in size and color.

#### BARRYMORE (New)

This variety resembles Marshall but is a much better bearer. \$4.00 per 100.

### BEDER WOOD

One of the very best early berries, always producing a large crop. Fruit is large, conical, bright red, and of excellent quality.

### BRANDYWINE

### BUBACH (P)

The most popular of all large strawberries. Plant is very productive, completely covering ground about it with berries which are roundish, slightly flattened. Midseason.

### CHESAPEAKE

### NIMROD
