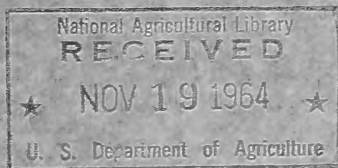

Two new varieties of Apricots developed at the University of Minnesota Fruit Breeding Farm for the Minnesota climate. At the Farm they have produced heavy crops of freestone fruits. They are juicy and pleasant for eating fresh and fine for canning. Medium sized fruits hang on tree until well ripened. Trees are hardy and resistant to disease; about the size of Plum trees. Require a pollinizer.

Moongold. (Minn. No. 15)

Chubby yellow fruit, sweet with a slight acidity and good quality. A little earlier than Sungold. Rather spreading tree.

Sungold. (Minn. No. 36)

Slightly oval fruit of gold color with an orange blush. Mild and sweet; very good quality. Rather upright tree.

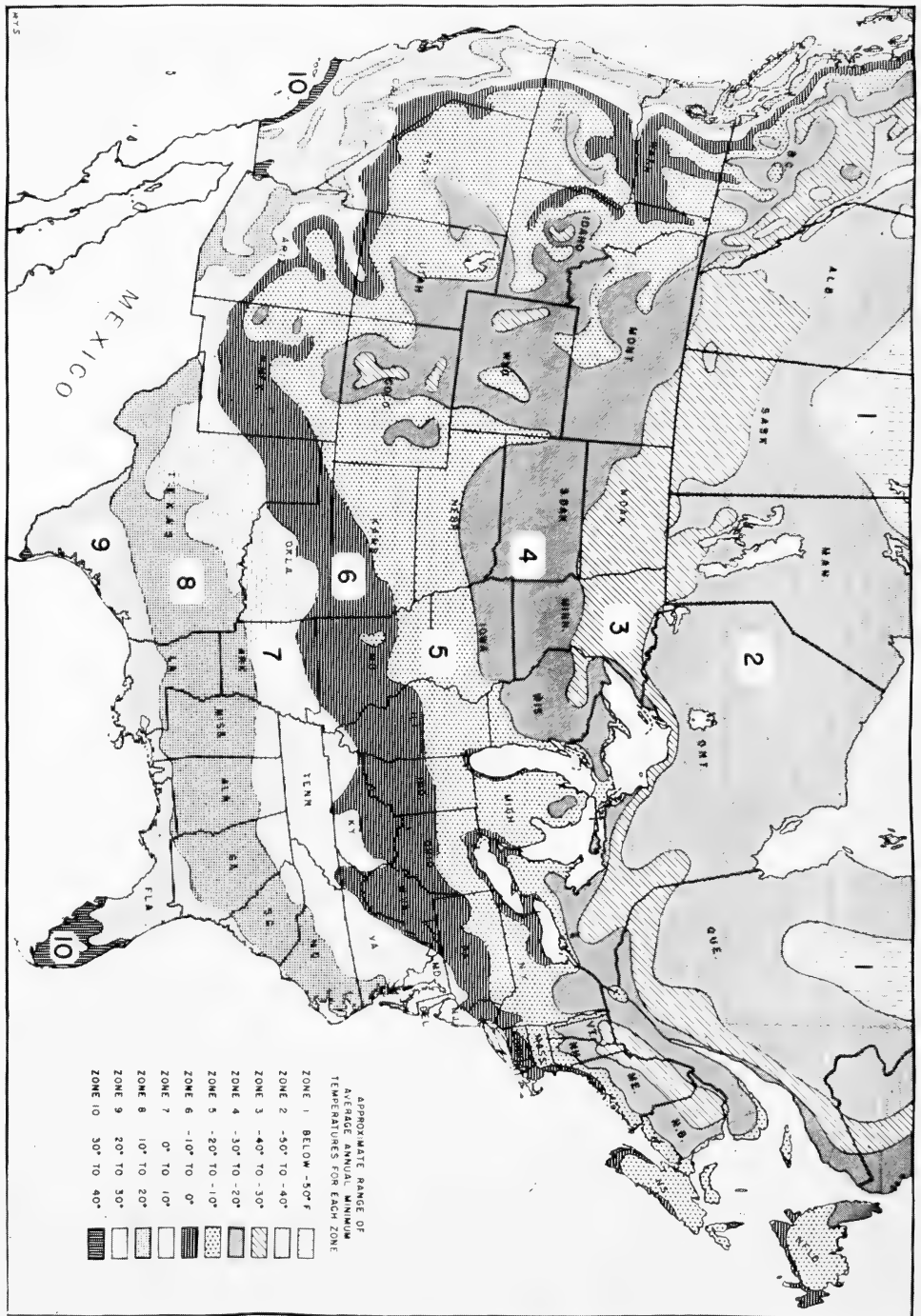
