## HOW TO REACH OUR NURSERIES FROM BOSTON

Trains leave South Union Station (twenty-five or more trains daily) for South Framingham, thence by Saxonville electric car, one and one-half miles, to within a few minutes walk of our office.

The Boston & Worcester electric cars leave Park Square every fifteen minutes. Any Chestnut Hill or Brookline Village car will connect with South Framingham or Worcester cars, either of which pass very near our grounds.

We have put up a sign, "Framingham Nurseries," on the line of the Boston & Worcester, five minutes walk from our office, and have arranged with the company for a stopping place at that point.

Parties coming from Boston way will notify the conductor on leaving Sunnyside; coming the other way, from Worcester, the conductor should be notified soon after leaving the Junction, at corner of Eastern Avenue and Concord Street.

The running time between Boston and our nurseries is about one hour and ten minutes. The fare is twenty cents.

# NOTICE

## PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

1. This list is intended for Nurserymen, Landscape Gardeners, Florists and Dealers in Nursery Stock. Parties unknown to us, when writing for Trade Lists, should use printed stationery, or enclose business card, so that we may know they are entitled to receive the list. We do not send Wholesale Lists to gardeners on private estates.

2. The stock herein offered is strictly first-class in all respects, all nursery grown and every tree, shrub, plant and vine, has been transplanted, all shade trees twice, all evergreens three times.

3. We will supply five at the ten rate and fifty at the hundred rate; but we cannot furnish long lists of varieties, two or three of a sort, either at the hundred or ten rates.

4. We commence shipping usually about April 1st, continuing until about the 20th of May.

5. Most varieties of evergreen can be transplanted with safety in August or September

6. We never substitute unless authorized to do so by the purchaser. In case we are sold out of the variety ordered, the customer is notified at once.

7. To avoid misunderstanding, purchasers should be careful in ordering to state the size, 1 to 2 ft., 2 1-2 to 3 ft., 3 to 4 ft., etc., just as noted in list.

8. Purchasers will please give explicit shipping directions. State in all cases whether you want your goods by freight or express. When no special mode of conveyance is mentioned, we will forward according to our best judgment, but we cannot assume any responsibility after the goods are delivered to the forwarders.

9. We pack carefully in boxes and bales, using damp moss to protect the roots, for which a charge will be made sufficient to cover cost.

10. Terms cash, except to reliable parties we are glad to allow until June 1st on Spring bills and December 1st on Fall bills. All Spring bills remaining unpaid June 1st and Fall bills December 1st will be subject to sight draft without further notice unless special arrangements are made.

11. We will not ship any stock, or accept orders from unknown parties without cash in advance, satisfactory reference or security of some sort. On receiving orders from parties who have no commercial rating, but accompanied by reference, we will at once communicate with the reference, and if satisfactory reply is received, the plants will be shipped.

12. We will not send goods by express C. O. D. unless twenty-five per cent. of the amount of order accompanies same as a guaranty.

13. All claims for deficiencies or errors of whatever nature should be made immediately upon receipt of stock, so that the same may be rectified without delay.

14. Freight or express charges will be prepaid when so directed and the amount added to the bill. We will ship stock on the day specified, if possible, but it will help us greatly to have a few days' notice before the goods are to be shipped. Early orders are always preferred.

While our Paeonies are not large clumps, they are all good, strong plants, having been divided in the Fall of 1906. Nothing will be sold that has been divided since that time, with the exception perhaps, of a few large clumps of Festiva maxima. The plants that we will send out will have from two to five eyes on each, and if planted early in the season will, under favorable circumstances bloom the first year. It must be understood, however, that Paeonies never reach their best until two or three years after planting.

While we have no large quantity of any one kind, we have over one hundred and twenty-five varieties, and taking them all in all, we have about fifteen thousand plants. As we do not make any special effort to put this stock on the market, except in our regular wholesale

way, we have made the price on many of the varieties offered herein about half, and in some cases considerably less than half of what most of the Paeony growers are asking for their plants. Our plants are stronger and better than the average.

### PHLOX

While perhaps we do not have the largest collection of Phlox, we think we have one of the most satisfactory collections that can be found. In our twenty odd varieties, we get about all the colors, a succession of bloom from early till late season and most of the plants are good, strong growers. Price, (except as noted) \$1.00 for ten, \$7 00 per hundred. We will furnish one thousand, our selection, for \$65 00. Every plant included in the lot would be a plant that under ordinary circumstances would throw up three or four good, strong shoots, and flower the first season. We do not send out small divided plants in Phlox.
