Class History

What is the purpose of this volume if not to bring to memory in future years the names and faces and events that were part of our lives, that part of our lives which composed a short but momentous interlude of four years between Nineteen Hundred and Thirty and Nineteen Hundred Thirty-four?

So many things happened then which had never happened to us before and can never happen again—the joys and sorrows in our struggle to gain knowledge of our world and its affairs.

The "Class of '34" began its career at N. H. H. S., under an extremely disadvantageous situation. During the first few months of the Freshman Year the school was operated in "shifts"—A and B; one from 9:00 to 12:00, the other from 12:30 to 3:30. For this reason, that abstract generalization called "School Spirit" was at an exceptionally low ebb. About the middle of the year, however, there was a rift in the clouds! 21 new rooms were added to the building and we were able to assume our school duties and pleasures in the normal way, unhampered by crowded conditions.

After a break of three months we began anew our toils. We began to find ourselves, and, being "Sophs", quite the most important creatures for miles around. Forgetting that we were only removed by one year from the Status of Freshmen, we even ventured to make certain remarks about the increasing diminution in size, etc., of the incoming classes! Forgive us, let our sins be buried forever. The only real feature of activity this year was the revival of interest in athletics.

Perhaps even greater than before was our feeling of elevation when we reached the rank of Juniors! It seemed literally years since we had been at the bottom of the scale. Increased interest, increased activity, and, most important of all, a restoration of "School Spirit" in all its glory, marked this remarkable year. The season reached its height, for the Juniors, with the presentation of the Junior Play which was marked by great success and the entertainment of the Seniors at the annual fete.

It took us fully three months of deep contemplation and meditation to prepare ourselves adequately for the coming year. What is





that mixed feeling of joy and sorrow occasioned by reaching the top; that meant the end of our journey? Having reached the beginning of the top stage of this particular journey, ours was a feeling of anticipation; somewhat apprehensive, perhaps, about the difficulties to be encountered, but impatiently awaiting the achievements and the pleasures that were our lot.

Attempting to assume Senior dignities and privileges unconcernedly, as a matter of course, we failed dismally. Although we made a great deal of progress along this line during the year, it is doubtful whether we ever, to the last day, succeeded in banishing entirely our naivete when mounting our Senior Steps and marching out of chapel while the under-classmen remained seated.

On the whole, however, we assumed our duties with a great deal of zest and activity, and it was during this year, '33-'34 that "School Spirit" reached the highest point during our entire career here. During the first half we were interested in scholastic achievements and football games more than anything else. The school paper took on new colors, under the name of "The Wildcat," and put under the guidance of an able staff. Many are the Seniors whose sentiments, to this day, are not unmixed toward that esteemed organ of public expression.

The election of the annual staff was held the middle of February. The class is to be congratulated upon its choice of so able a group to put forth its annual year book. The work was gotten under immediately. There was a mad scrambling in getting the photographs taken and getting measurements for the caps and gowns. Then we had a most enjoyable time when time came for the group pictures, some of us were lucky enough to get out of our home-room period.

Then came that always exciting event—the election of Senior Superlatives—preceded by two weeks of speculation and followed by three of discussion. Those who were fortunate in placing here strutted haughtily about and tried not to look too proud, but some of them had to have measurements made over for their caps and gowns.

On March 7, a Senior-Freshman chapel program was held by the National Honor Society, membership in which is the highest honor which can be accorded by a high-school to one of its students. By means of a simple, though impressive, induction ceremony, twenty-five members were initiated into the society.

Following close at hand was the beginning of practice for the Senior Play. After several weeks of hard work and no play it was given on Friday, April the thirteenth, and believe you me, it could have been lots more successful. It was a real hard task to put so difficult a play on, but the members did it in a superb manner. The play was Oliver Goldsmith's, "She Stoops to Conquer."

During April we had two important events, following in close succession, namely, the Hi-Y Minstrel, which drew one of the largest crowds in its history; then came the "High School Follies"; it also proved to be entertaining and financially successful.

The biggest event of the year was the dance given on May 11, at the Hotel Cape Fear. This dance was well attended and all who were fortunate enough to attend saw some of the best added attractions that have ever been staged in Wilmington. Prizes and souvenirs were awarded the patrons. The Annual Staff had charge of this, and we can say that it was a huge success.

Finally, after four years of varied experience, we had reached that momentous event which culminated our career at the dear old Alma Mater. Words fail us in our attempt to describe adequately the innumerable emotions that surged within us. Our minds were occupied not only by retrospection, but by conjecture as to the future as well. We came to the full realization that we had reached a definite turning point in our lives.

Now that my work is completed, I leave this history with you which I hope will live forever in your memories.






