


Depth

We wondered what our last year would be, but like the storm clouds that give way to the brilliance of the sun, our doubts were dispelled on the opening day with the radiant smile and the extended hand of our new principal, Mr. Fred W. Greene. Our Senior year opened auspiciously.

A high school student for three long years looks forward to the first Senior privilege, the thrill of going up the front steps; we bear our willing witness we were not disappointed. It must be recorded here that we did not meet our new principal; he met us. Our concern about the future was gone. It was soon evident that Mr. Fred W. Greene was to be the creator of a new day in New Hanover High School history and we were to be his first associates in bringing into being the new order. During the first weeks our Senior year had taken on added meaning; and as we have since realized, it has been more to us than we ever hoped or dreamed.

There are clouds as well as sunshine, sorrows as well as joys in life. The sudden deaths of our fellow student, Ellen Nall and our teacher and friend, Miss Emma Martin, cast a pall of sorrow over

these first days. Tributes of our love and esteem are expressed in a fitting manner on the pages of this Annual. We loved them; they loved us; love is immortal.

So much depends upon the example and leadership of the members of the Senior Class. I think it can be said without contradiction the members of our class have proved themselves worthy Seniors. Through months of hard work our scholarship and leadership measured up to the high standard required of us.

School Spirit is a thing that is hard to define, and yet one cannot help but feel it. There are certain factors that make it, and we think we did our share in contributing to it. The school paper reached a high point of efficiency and usefulness. Clubs and organizations under Senior leadership were very active and worthwhile. Outstanding interest was manifested in developing the athletic enterprises of the school. Seventeen members of the class were added to the National Honor Society making thirty-one members in all. All these things combine to make our school great, and we have the satisfaction of knowing we made our contribution.

Graduation is the climax of high school life, but the activities that proceed this event crowd the closing weeks with memories never to be forgotten. The Senior Prom was scarcely over 'till we were at work on the Senior Play. Next came the Annual Prom, then the Junior-Senior Entertainment, and finally the Hi-Y Minstrel. These events deserve more space than can be accorded them here, but just the mention of them is sufficient to bring to mind the joyous events that crowned these last days as students in New Hanover High School.

The dedication by the class of this Annual to Miss Frances Formy-Duval will be a constant source of satisfaction to the members of this class. Her ability in the class room, and her desire to be a friend, demonstrated on so many occasions, can never be erased from our memories. To Miss Formy-Duval and every teacher who has contributed to our development through the four years of High School life we express our deepest love and appreciation. To them we owe a debt we cannot pay save in living upright, useful lives. They have made their contribution to us; we shall try to make our contribution to them, by carrying on, and doing our best, in a world they have helped us to know and to appreciate through their devotion to their high calling.


