My dear Sir,

For the past six years I have been collecting rare ornithological and oological specimens here in Southern Ariz. I collected for years for Mr. Josiah Hoopes of West Chester, Pa. Much of his collection is now in the Academy of Natural sciences, Phil^a.

For some reason he is not collecting any more, so the time I have spent for him for years I have now for some one else.

If you would like me to keep you informed as to my finds the coming season, I will be pleased to do so. Last season I took several very rare sets of eggs, among them sets of Sulphur-bel. fly catcher, broad billed hummer (1 set) Stephen's vireo Bridle titmouse² Olive warbler (1/1)

I have the following eggs that I shall dispose of. 1/1 Olive warbler, nest, and two parent birds, ex-

exceptionally fine skins @ \$4.00. The two skins are

puts up as fine skins as mine. Will send you
one if you would like to see my work.

Dear Sir,

Your communication of Feb 26
is recd., for which accept my thanks.
I send you $\frac{3}{4}$ Louis f. c. by this mail
hoping that they will please you. I
usually put up the parent skin but
did not succeed in capturing the bird
this time. Do you care for skins
with sets? I have branch (hor. fork)
on which this nest rested. It is not
here, but at my sister's in the Hua-
chuca mts. If you wish it I will
send it to you next month when
I will be going over there.

I send you in case with eggs, two skins, one, the blue throat hummer, about fairly, represents my best work, tho' I do very many as well. The other, the warbler, is as poor a skin as I ever send out. Between the two lies my average. The warbler was a much better looking skin two years ago, but I have packed it around a good deal. There is a great difference in species as to skin making. The red faced warbler is difficult to make a neat smooth skin of; I can scarce tell why. Of many other species of birds, my poorest skin is much better than that.

The warbler skin I do not wish

returned. The hummer you may re-
turn unless you care for it, in which
case you may send me 75 cents for it.
My price for skins is 50 per cent of
lower catalogue price, except in a
few cases.

Would you like some fine Massena
partridges @ \$125 ♂s, & \$100 ♀s? Think
I can furnish them next month if you do.

Expect to soon be with the birds
all the time for two or three months.
Will be pleased to let you know of
the rare things I find.

My dear sir,

You asked me to keep you informed as to the rare things in the oological line that I took. I did but little last season owing to ill health. I have a set $\frac{1}{8}$ Massena partridge that I intended retaining for myself, but feel obliged to sell them. Then there is always the hope that I will find another set for myself, tho' in the case of this bird, I have found only 2 sets in seven years of searching.

These eggs bring about \$1.50 to 1.75 per egg. The set I have could hardly be called first class, tho' it would appear as such in a col. Three of the eggs ~~are~~ have slight cracks about the blowhole, which does not weaken the egg any and does not show unless closely examined; but I would not like to state that they were strictly 1st class in every respect, and dissapoint you upon examination. Then, too, the number is

not up to the average, tho' many lay less, as evidenced by stories of the inhabitants who have found the nests for years, and of whom I have often enquired concerning the birds and their habits, and also by sets taken in this country by other collectors.

I would sell the set for \$7.00.
Then I have a set of Audubon hermit thrush, $\frac{1}{4}$ @ 1.00, $\frac{1}{3}$ Low. Tanager @ 60¢
 $\frac{1}{2}$ Buffbreasted f. Of this bird I think there are not above 8 sets in existence, the first being taken in '96 in which year I also took a set. These readily bring 2.50 per egg. For these 2 that I have I want \$2.50 for set, since one egg has small hole besides blowhole but it is not cracked and is strong. They are unique among fly catcher egg, in shape and color, spotted creamy white or buffy white. and very small, as befits the bird. 2 is as typical a number as 3.

I enclose list of specimens that I can take next season, in all probability. I once sent you specimen of my work. I have steadily im-

proved since then.

The prices I enclose are for strictly 1st class adult skins, selected. Should you like a few fine skins from this locality of rare things and you will kindly let me know within a few weeks, I can collect them in fresh spring skins this spring.

For an order of any size I will do a little better by you than these prices, that is, will make slight discount.
