Friend Brewster.

I received your skins some time ago, but I was about to visit Washington at the time and was very busy I have neglected to acknowledge the receipt of them until now. Now, I know you do not want me to say (oh! they were a fine lot of skins, and while saying so in my letter make a ^{very} fair face to myself as much as to say they were not. Your Warblers are No 1 and all any collector could wish for, also most of the Thrushes, but there is one of them that has no bill at all. The Laughing Gull is a remarkably hard customer and ^{most of} the ~~the~~ ^{the} Kittiwaks have got the Epizootic from hard knocks and too much plaster, in

fact they are quite likely to starve to death as some of them have but one mandible of the bill to assist them in feeding. Now I always talk plain English and have done so on this occasion and I have no hard feelings towards the Gutter Auk and shall only pity them if they come to grief for want of nourishment. The ~~Stellar~~ Sandpipers have both of them knocked their heads off and one of them being more of a genius than his Brother has attempted to sew his head on again. Now at the price you put your birds at and as I gave you your pick out of my stock and promised to do ^{so} in the future I think for a commencement you some of your skins are a little hard. I have lately received about 480 ^{birds} from Cal. and Oregon also some from Colorado, and about 180 more birds from Indian River and Locality. Now I am willing to give you your pick provided you return to me as good skins as you select. There are about 30 Collectors and cap-

'dermists that I exchange with but
 I always give Mass. collectors the first
 chance of an exchange, as I was formerly
 a Mass. man myself. Any specimen
 without its bill or with imperfect feet
 should not be exchanged unless before-
 hand specified. I send some poor
 skins away but they are to parties
 that send me skins below par, but
 when I am trading with a particular
 man I am particular myself. You do
 not think I have got out of the wrong
 end of the stick this morning for if I
 thought I had I would retire and come
 out of the right end for nothing will
 ruffle my plumage short of being
 "Bucked" by a mule in a rainy day.
 I write the above for our future mutu-
 al benefit, and I hope when I re-
 turn next fall laden with trophies
 I hope your ~~at~~ representatives from
 Mass. will be respectably clothed and
 in good health, and as my flocks are
 coming from a healthy country I hope
 they will be in a similar condition, and

that we may trade in peace.
I leave for Omaha Monday
night at 7 o'clock.

Friend Brewster.

I received your letter with about 25 others, when I returned from a collecting trip, from the Five Islands, and being very busy at the time laid it away and have never thought of it since. Please excuse delay in answering it. In regard to our exchange consider it settled, as far as I am concerned, Do not hold the specimens you received from me any longer, I had a good time collecting the past summer. I collected some rare birds & eggs. Unfortunately my eggs were all destroyed by mice or rats in our store room at Denver Col. I collected a nest, 1 ^{egg} & 6 young of the Ruby-crowned Wren. I made the acquaintance of a good many hunters, while in the mountains, and have received some good stock from them, such as Mule Deer (*C. macrotus*) Mountain Sheep, Antelope, Sage Hen, &c. I shall have a quantity of White-tailed Ptarmigan, Dusky Grouse, Maximilian's Jays &c in the flesh and in skins this winter. There is not much collecting going on here at present. I have shot and trapped about 30 adult Sharp-shin Hawks, also some Red-tails, Broadwing

Coopers, and Marsh hawks. I have also taken a good many Gulls, I killed a Tachypetes aquila in front of my house a few weeks ago. During my hunt in Colorado, I knocked over a few deer and Antelopes, I have been making up, a good many skins of the rare birds that appear in our markets.
