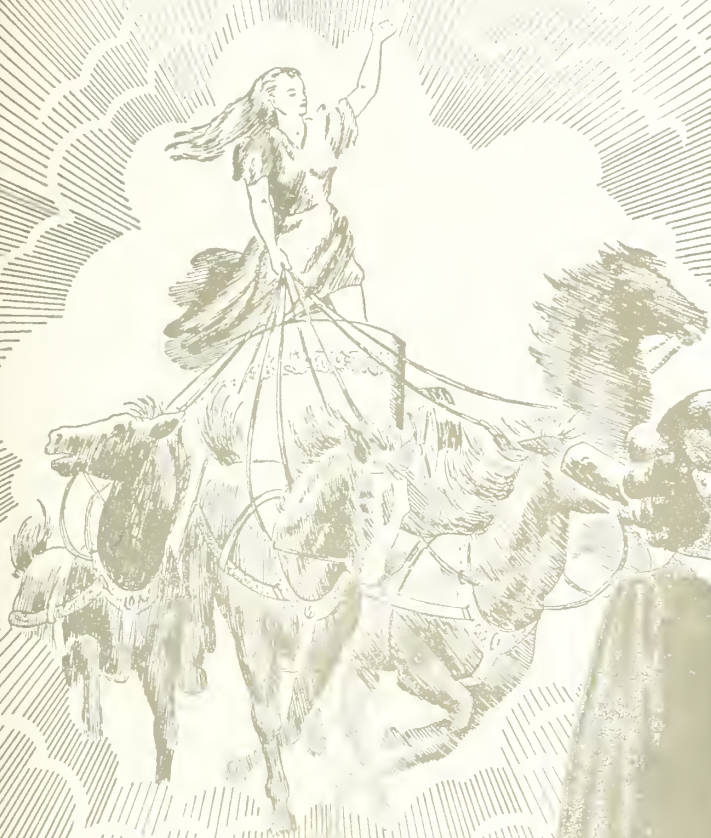

Because she is such an expert at hair dress now, Virginia Watson will someday be manager of the Franklinton beauty shop.

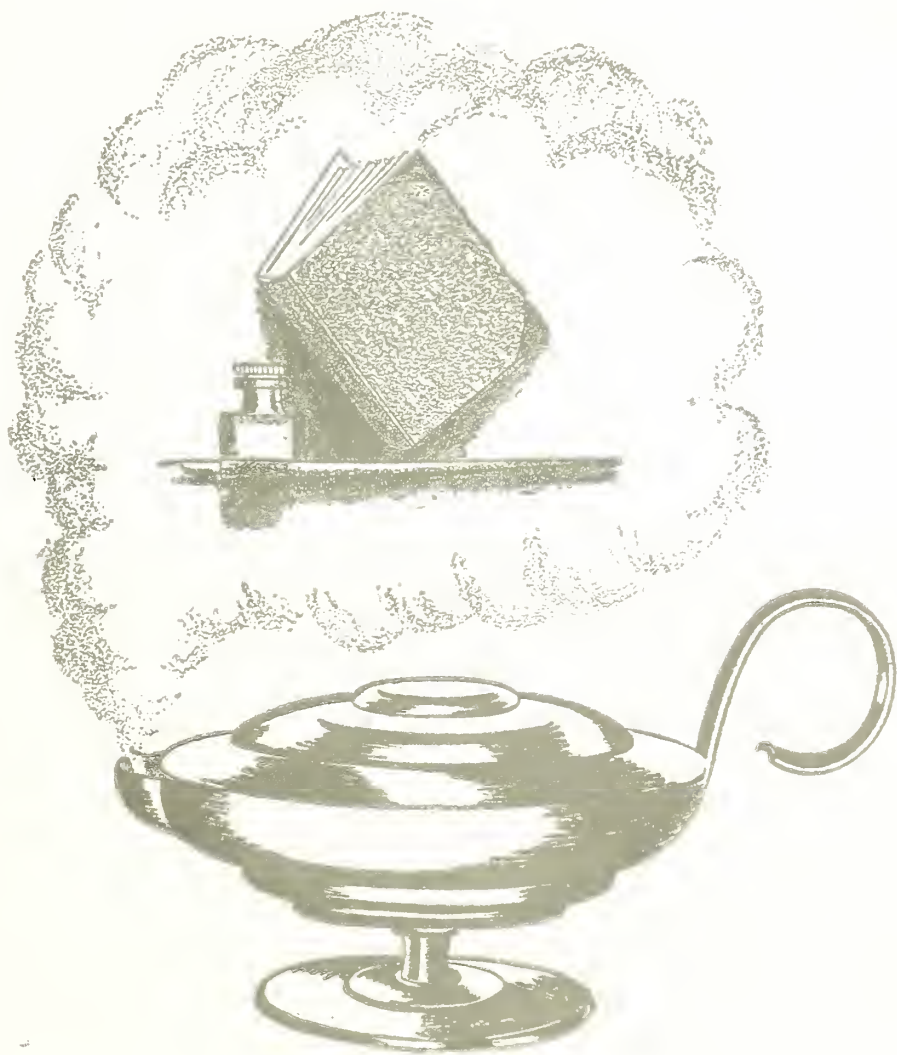

Talking about nursing, Laura Mae Preddy might start it in a hospital in Virginia. But before long she will not have time for that, for all her time will be spent at home.

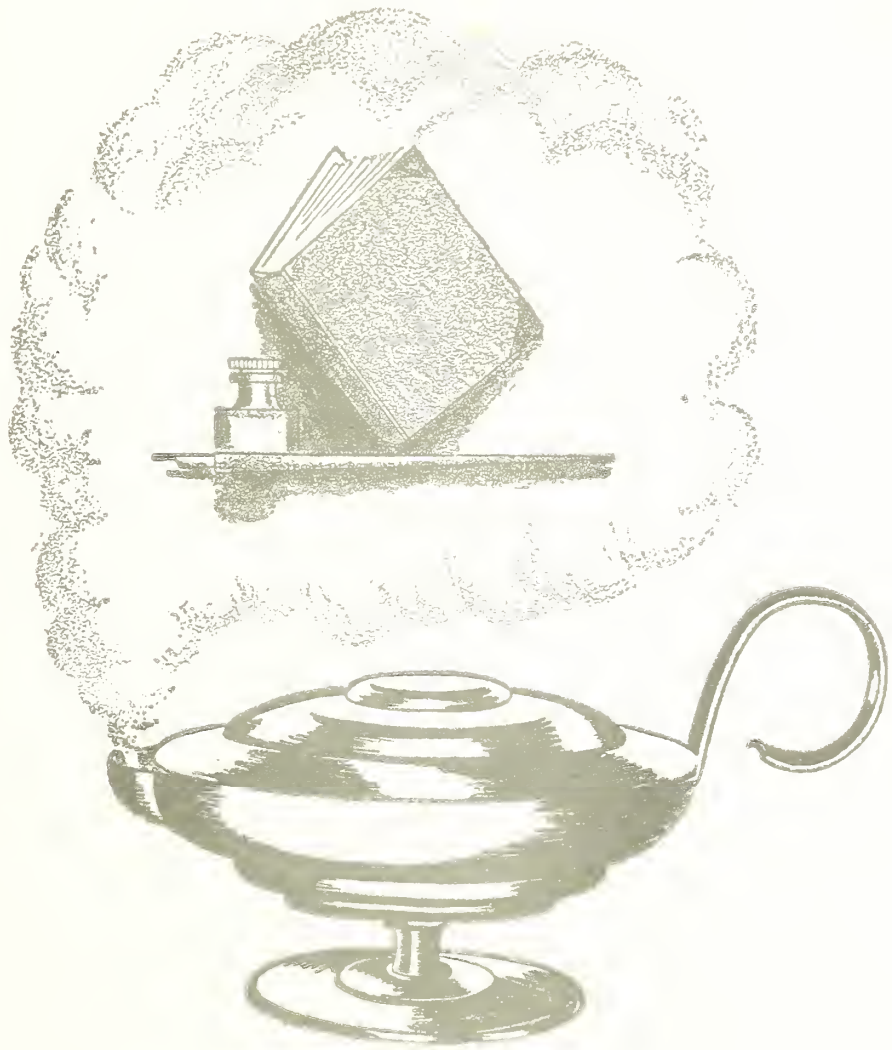

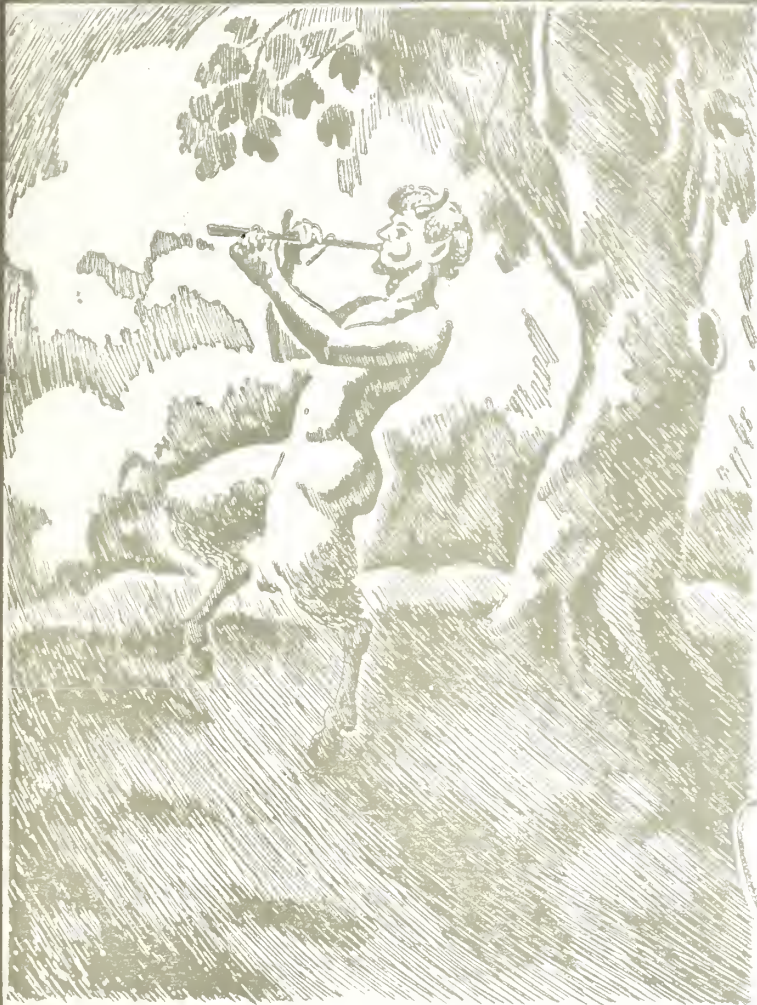

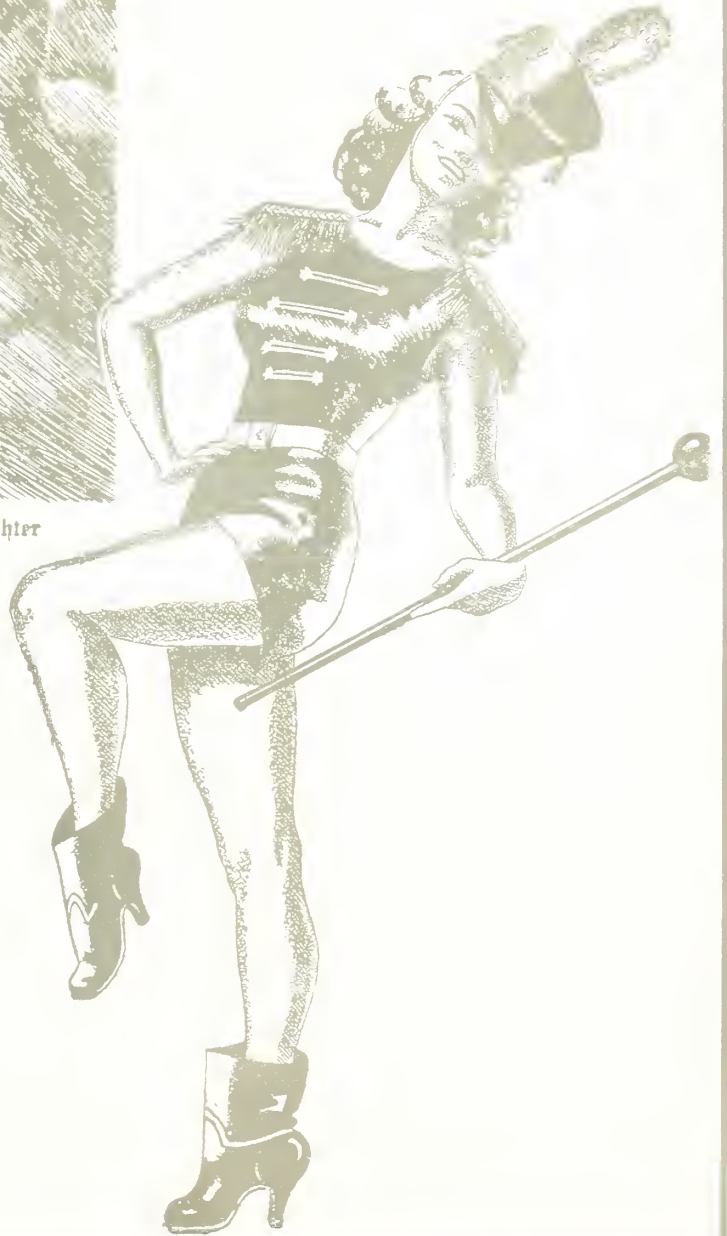
