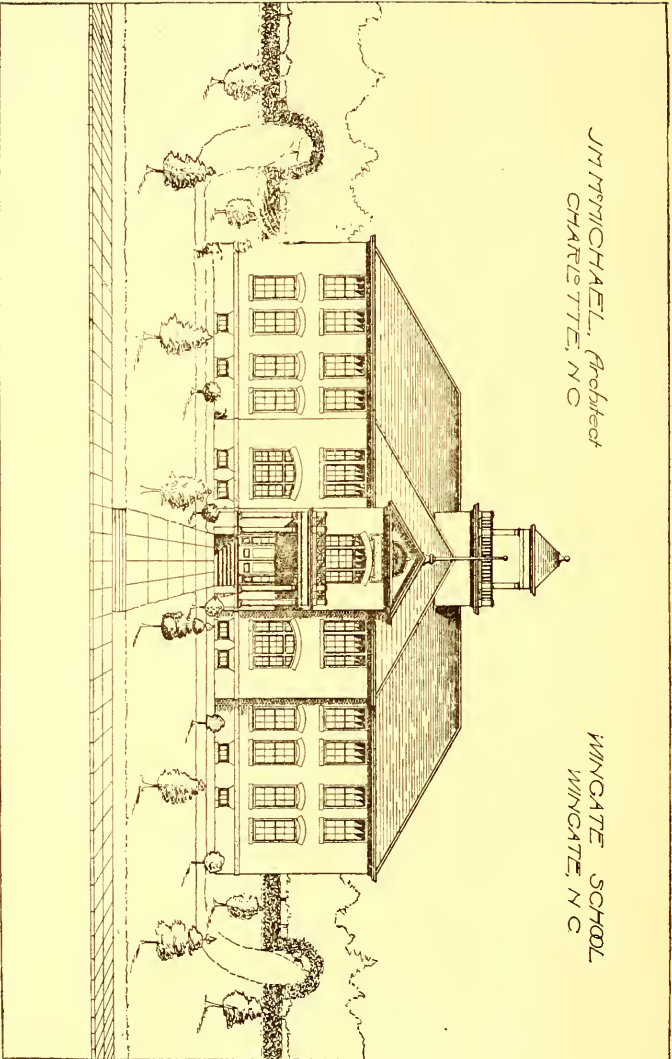

The Wingate School.

HISTORY.

The Wingate School was established in accordance with a resolution passed by the Union Baptist Association at its annual session in October, 1895, for the higher intellectual, moral and religious training of the boys and girls of the Association and surrounding country. A Board of Trustees consisting of J. W. Bivens, Rev. Hight C. Moore, O. M. Sanders, M. W. Griffin, J. C. Sikes, B. F. Parker and R. F. Beasley, were appointed to secure a suitable location within the bounds of the Association, and to establish there a school of high grade, which should be owned by the Association, and conducted under Christian influences.

The place selected was Ames, a small village six miles east of Monroe, on the Seaboard Air Line Railroad. A good brother of the place donated to the Association a suitable lot, comprising ten acres, and on this was erected by the citizens of the community a handsome single-story building, which they presented to the Association as a free gift.

The Association, at its annual session in 1896, established a Board of Trustees, consisting of fifteen members, to be selected from the various churches of the Association, each to serve a term of six years, and five to be elected by the Association every two years. The Legislature of North Carolina, in 1897, granted to the school a charter, which secures to it all the protection and privileges that are usually granted to a college.

In 1900 a new double-story building, with five additional rooms for society halls, music room, library, etc., was added to the old building.

But with the steady growth of the school this building has proven inadequate and the Trustees have under way of construction a \$10,000 brick building.

BUILDINGS AND SURROUNDINGS.

The present school building, consisting of eight rooms, is located about two hundred yards north from the railroad.

The lot on which the building stands comprises ten acres. In addition to this the Trustees own twenty-six acres surrounding the school lot, which they are sell-

ing at reasonable rates to those desiring to build near the school.

For the coming session the Trustees have under way of construction a handsome brick building consisting of six class rooms, two society halls, two music rooms, an office, library, and auditorium.

In locating the school at Wingate the Trustees were exceedingly fortunate. The place is noted for its healthfulness. The surrounding country presents an endless succession of hills and streams, and there is no local cause for disease. The people are enterprising and prosperous, and the moral and religious tone of the community is unsurpassed.

Wingate is only a small village but it enjoys the advantages of being situated on a great railroad, and, at the same time, is free from the numerous temptations of town or city life. Mail is received four times each day, and there is telephone connection with all sections.

The place has a telegraph operator and a depot agent, and four passenger trains stop here daily.

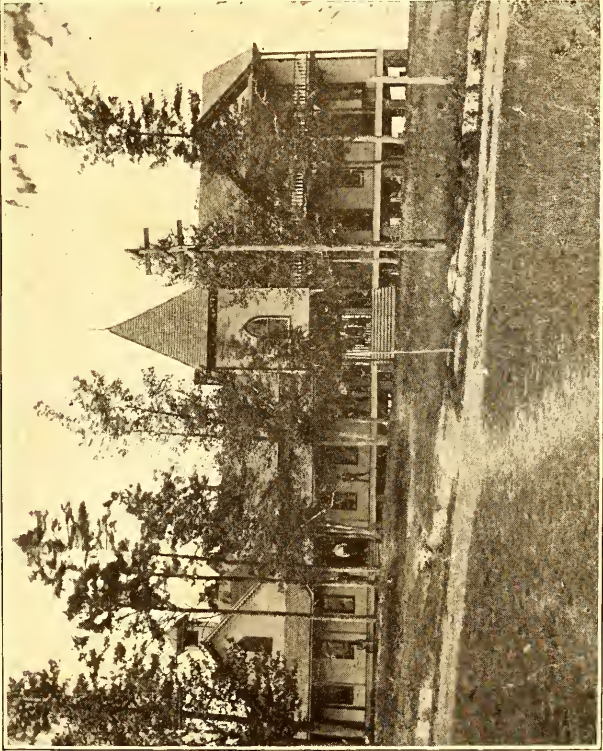
There cannot be found within the limits of the State a more moral or law-abiding class of citizens than those who live in and around Wingate. They are industrious and honest and "live at home," with all that the term implies. Drunkenness and rowdyism are unknown.

There is within a few hundred yards of the school building a strong Baptist church, thoroughly progressive, and in hearty sympathy with the school in all its work.

A live weekly prayer meeting is held on Sunday night, to which students are cordially invited as active members.

SOCIETIES.

There are in connection with the school five excellent literary societies, the Philosopher, the Gladstone, the Browing, the Poe and the Athenian. The Philosopher and Gladstone Societies consist of young men, and meet every Friday night for the discussion of questions which are intended to be practical and of such character as to stimulate an active interest in passing events and in general research. Frequently public discussions are held in which the members learn to ex-

press themselves with intelligence and ease before an audience. The Browning Society consists of young ladies and meets on Friday afternoons. The exercises consist of written discussions, essays and recitations. The Poe Society is composed of Second Year girls and is conducted in every respect like the society for young ladies, thus offering to these girls especial advantages along this line. The Athenian Society, is conducted by and for the small girls, and is a most interesting and helpful organization. The lady teachers offer such suggestions and help from time to time as they deem wise. These societies exert a most wholesome influence over the school, and determine largely the character of its public exercises. No school of high grade is complete without organizations of this sort. They are necessary factors in the all-round development of young men and women.

The halls are nicely furnished and are the pride of the school.

All students, unless excused by the Principals, are required to join one of the societies as active members, and to conform to its rules and regulations.

LIBRARY.

The school library contains a number of volumes of valuable books and is open each day to all students.

And in addition to the school library, the Seaboard Railway Company allows us the use of the Carnegie Traveling Libraries, from month to month, which furnish the students with excellent supplementary reading.

Students also have access to the magazines, daily and weekly papers, which are kept in the reading room.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Academic Department.

First Year.

Spelling, Grammar, Composition, Geography, N. C. History, Arithmetic, Physiology.

Second Year.

Spelling, Higher Grammar, Composition, U. S. History, Physiology, Civil Government, Higher Arithmetic, English History.

Third Year.

Rhetoric, Composition, English Literature, Latin, Grammar, Advanced Arithmetic, Algebra, General History.

Fourth Year.

Higher English, Latin Prose, Caesar, Cicero, College Algebra, Geometry.

First Year College.

Halleck's English Literature, Shakespeare's Plays, Milton's Life and Poems, Essays and Parallel Readings, Virgil, Livy, German Trigonometry.

One of the requisites of a good education is a thorough knowledge of the common school branches. This we insist upon. In order for the student to get this the training must commence in the Primary and Intermediate departments. Here we have endeavored to place the very best teachers available, and their work has been evidence of their competency in dealing with the charge committed to their trust.

The work here outlined is intended to build upon the foundation laid in these departments, and the student is advanced as rapidly as is consistent with thoroughness, but in no case is he allowed to take up the higher branches until he has mastered the fundamentals in English, History, and Mathematics.

When students have completed the Academic course they may then take the first year course given in College, at much less cost than at one of our higher institutions of learning.

Careful preparation is given to teachers, prospective college students, and to boys and girls who will follow other vocations in life.

REVIEWS AND EXAMINATIONS.

In order to secure thoroughness frequent drills and reviews are given, and in no case are students excused from the quarterly examinations.

Parents often commit a great error by taking their children out of school just before the examinations, or by allowing them to stop while the examinations are in progress. No time of the school year is so well spent as that devoted to review and examinations.

CLASS PERIODS.

The opening exercises commence strictly at eight fifteen in the morning and last fifteen minutes. Twelve recitation periods of thirty minutes each follow, allowing for two recesses and a noon hour. Students are required to report promptly on exercises and recitations.

TEXT BOOKS.

The following is a list of the books that will be used in the school next session:

Griffin and Faust's Speller, Johnson's Graded Classic, Maury's Geographies, Smith's Our Language, and Hyde's and Buehler's English Grammars, Colaw and Dukes's Arithmetics, Hill's History of North Carolina, White's History for Beginners, and Chamber's Higher History of the United States, Peele's Civil Government, Ashley's Federal State, Wentworth's Algebra, Bennett's Latin Grammar, Jones' Latin Prose Composition, Lowe and Ewing's Caesar, Knapp's Virgil, Kelsey's Cicero, Culler's Physiology, Myer's General History, Frazier and Squair's French Grammar, Kuhn's French Reader, Collar's German Grammar, Hewett's German Reader, Hill's Rhetoric, Niver's English History, Wentworth's Plane and Solid Geometry, Wentworth's Trigonometry, Wentworth's Analytics.

Any of these books can be bought at Wingate at New York prices.

EXPENSES.

First Primary—Reading and Spelling \$1.00 per month.

Second Primary--Reading, Spelling, Arithmetic, etc., \$1.30 per month.

Intermediate—Reading, Spelling, Arithmetic, History, Geography, Grammar, any' or all of these, \$1.50 per month.

Common School---Spelling, Arithmetic, Grammar, Geography, U. S. History, Civil Government, Physiology, any or all of these, \$2.00 per month.

First High School—Algebra, Latin, Rhetoric, General History, English History, Physics, English Literature, Geometry, \$2.00 plus 20 cents per month each, not to exceed \$3.00 per month.

First Year College—Higher English, Virgil, Livy, French, German, Trigonometry, \$2.50 plus 50 cents

each, not to exceed \$3.50 per month.

There are no incidental fees of any kind.

Instrumental Music, including use of piano, \$2.75 per month. Special rates to two or more from same family

Board, including furnished rooms, light, and fuel, can be had in the homes of citizens who are deeply interested in the school at the low rate of \$8.00 to \$9 per month.

Tuition bills are sent out at the end of each quarter and immediate settlement is expected, unless previously arranged otherwise. No deduction is made in tuition for time lost unless it amounts to a week of continuous absence. Four weeks constitute a month both for board and tuition.

Ministerial students, children of pastors and needy widows receive fifty per cent. discount on tuition fees in the Literary Department.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

The strength of the School depends largely upon its loyal supporters. The citizens have voted a special tax, which insures a public school of the highest order for at least seven months in the year. All branches of high school studies are taught free of charge to students living in this district.

Parents who are blessed with bright boys and girls are urged to come to Wingate. At present four houses are nearing completion. This shows that we are taking on new life. We invite comparison with other schools in the matter of expense, conveniences, and health conditions.

In fact, a more desirable place for a school, taking everything into consideration, could hardly be found.

Move to Wingate and become a member of a community whose watch-word is Education. Within the last year several families have moved here, and although houses are scarce, if you desire to come, you can buy a lot and build, purchase a home, or rent a house. Wingate has much to offer the man who is interested in education. The executive committee of the board of Trustees and the Principals of the school are at your service for any information along this line.

ENTRANCE.

Students should enter the first day if possible, and remain through the entire term. However, classes may

be entered at any time. The student finds it greatly to his advantage to begin with the other members of the class so he can have a fair show with them.

THE RELATION OF TEACHERS AND PUPILS.

Every member of the faculty for this year is a consecrated Christian, who is anxious to instill into the lives of boys and girls those principles which make life worth living. They are all well prepared for the careful instruction of those in their respective departments. The motto, "Individual attention and personal helpfulness," will be carried out in all departments of the school as far as practicable. The girls will be under the personal supervision of the lady members of the faculty and will have the warm sympathy and care that is prevalent in the home life. Only necessary communication between the boys and girls will be allowed, and the tendency to neglect duty for the social pleasures, which sometimes exists in co-educational schools will be carefully restricted. Few rules will be made; but kindness, help, and firmness on the part of the teachers; and obedience, courtesy and respect on the part of the students will in our mind largely obviate the institution of a great amount of the sterner thing known as law.

Boys will find that they have sympathetic helpers in the school room, on the athletic field, in the society halls, and, in fact, in every phase of school life, in the Principals of the school. They will at all times be ready to share a joy or a sorrow with you. Sympathy, Helpfulness and Fellowship are the watchwords.

TO PARENTS.

You owe your children at least an education that will enable them to cope with their fellow men in the everyday walks of life. Many parents cannot give their children a college education, but they can send them to a school which is near them and where the expense is much less than half that in the higher institutions. For those who come to us we not only offer to them what most of the public and high schools give, but this, and one year of the work done in our colleges. We offer to your children exceptional advantages in Music, Elocution and Literary work.

Look at our cheap tuition and board rates and see if you can not make just a little sacrifice and place

that boy or girl of yours that you had thought you could not spare, with us at the opening of the Fall Term. You will some day be happy for it. Remember that happiness comes in service. A little extra service for your child now means untold happiness for you later, when he or she is an honor to you in the world of service.

MUSIC.

In the instruction here given no one course is pursued, but instruction is given according to the demands of the individual pupil.

Special attention is given to each pupil in class recitation, private lesson, and practice period. All pupils after completing the second grade will be required to attend a sight playing class which will meet once a week. This goes far towards the development of the musical talent.

Music is one of the greatest and most desirable accomplishments a young lady can possess. It crowns a woman's disposition with tenderness. Parents, give your daughter the opportunity of this beautiful art.

Miss Gwynn comes to us highly recommended by Dr. Vann, Prof. Brown, and others of her teachers at Meredith, and this should be sufficient guarantee to every Baptist of her ability. She has had some experience in teaching, and the course that is given is equal to that given in many instances at almost twice the cost here. We invite a trial.

ELOCUTION.

Many have an erroneous idea as to the work done in this department. Some intelligent people think that here the school girl learns to "elocute"—to make fancy gestures and put on stage airs. This is far from the aim of this department of the school. "There is no impression without expression" is a well known psychological truth, and there is no vocation in life where there is not a place for the person who can fluently and forcibly express himself when occasion demands. In the Sunday school, the prayer meeting, the missionary society, the school room, the secret organization, and many other places where we all have an opportunity to labor, not to speak of the more prominent public places, such as the pulpit and the congressional halls, there is a demand for leaders--men and

Women who can express themselves.

In view of this fact our leading schools and colleges are giving especial attention to this side of preparation by arranging for careful training in voice culture, ease, grace, and expression, besides insisting upon the students availing themselves of the opportunity offered in the literary society for development along this line.

Miss Janie Bivens, of the Baptist University for Women, has done excellent work in this department during the past year, as is attested by the splendid showing her students have made on all public occasions where they have represented the school. We hope to see more boys and girls taking this course from year to year.

EQUIPMENT.

The school is well equipped with the best patent desks, latest maps and surveys, globes, reference books, etc.

Each instructor has a separate room, and the work is graded and divided so that there is no confusion in the recitations, and every student thus has an equal chance for advancement.

MEDALS AND PRIZES.

The W. J. Rudge Company of Monroe offers a gold medal to the best orator.

Mrs. O. M. Sanders of Monroe offers a gold medal to the best debater.

Mr. G. M. Stewart of Sanford offers two prizes in gold—one to the best declaimer and one to the best reciter from the young ladies' society.

The Poe and Athenian Societies offer a gold medal respectively to the best representative from the society.

As an incentive to work, the Gladstone and Philosophian Societies offer medals for improvement in debate.

A five dollar gold piece is awarded at the close of the fall and the spring term to the best all round student.

REGULATIONS.

Few regulations are deemed necessary, but the following are closely adhered to:

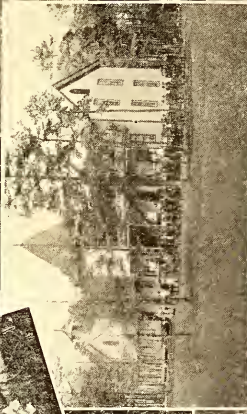
1. Unnecessary communication between boys and girls is prohibited.
2. Students are not allowed to accompany the opposite sex to or from school or religious exercises.
3. Students must get permission from one of the principals to leave the village more than a mile or to be away from their boarding place after dark.
4. Smoking or using profane language in or around the school building is not tolerated.
5. Students must remain in the school room during school hours unless they have special permission to retire to their rooms to study.
6. All students are required to join one or the other of the Literary Societies.
7. Loafing around the depot or the stores at any time is forbidden.
8. Students may get permission to meet trains when necessary, otherwise they are considered out of place when so doing.
9. An absence from class or roll call counts one demerit, unless excused by instructor.
10. Fifty demerits subjects a student to expulsion.
