

HYDROCOTYLE LURIDA, (Japanese Water Pennywort.)

This is a most remarkable and curious Japanese plant, with reniform leaves growing in compact clusters, of a pea-green color, beautifully crimped and undulated. It is of the same habit as Saxifrage, sending out runners on which at intervals the leaves appear, and separate and independent plants are soon formed. It produces flowers of a chocolate color, somewhat similar to those of Akebia Quinata; they rise from the leaf axils and nestle closely amongst the foliage, forming a very striking contrast with the deep pea-green which surrounds them. It is a capital basket plant and will soon become an indispensable favorite wherever trailing or drooping plants are used. We are indebted to Professor Thurber of the American Agriculturist, who kindly classified and named this plant. Price, 50 cents each.

OTHONNA CRASSIFOLIA.

COLORED FOLIAGE PLANTS FOR BEDDING PURPOSES.

COLEUS.

The Coleus are too well known to require any description, their reputation as a plant for bedding or massing being world-wide. We can recommend the varieties enumerated below as about the best and most distinct. Price, 25 cents each; \$2.50 per dozen.

CHAMELEON.—As its name denotes, this Coleus is of great diversity of color, no two leaves on the plant being alike, and on them all the beautiful hues of the rainbow are reflected; and it is as changeable as the wonderful little animal from which it derives its name; when the young leaves develop they are of a bright orange, green and yellow, changing during the different stages of their growth to an intense scarlet, black, sombre green and dark maroon.

AUREA MARGINATA.—Centre of leaf crimson; margin deep yellow, speckled with purple.

ALBERT VICTOR.—Centre of leaf bronzy red, stained with blotches of purplish carmine, with broad golden margin.

BARON ROTHSCHILD.—Centre of leaf bright bronzy crimson, with golden margin.

BEAUTY OF WIDMORE.—Distinctly tricolored; leaves beautifully shaped, dark brilliant maroon, belted with bright rose and green, edged with silvery white.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH.—A magnificent variety, with beautiful rich crimson foliage, golden margin.

EXCELLENT.—Maroon foliage, netted with light green.

GERARD.—Foliage, centre of light crimson, stained with blotches of purplish carmine; broad golden margin.

HER MAJESTY.-Deep bronzy red, with narrow yellow edging.

MARSHALLII.—Rich chocolate, purple green margin.

MARMORATA.—Crimson foliage, mottled with yellow.

PRINCESS ROYAL.—Leaf, deep bronzy crimson, margined bright yellow.

PRINCESS BEATRICE.—Leaves of a golden green hue, the main veins and margin marked and lined with crimson.

PRINCE LEOPOLD.

QUEEN VICTORIA.—Rich bronzy crimson, bright yellow edged, somewhat broken, with crimson veinings. Extra.

SALUTE.—Deep green foliage, traversed with network of purple.

SPANGLE.—Leaf rich green, with network of crimson.

SANDERSII.—Leaves rich purple, mottled green.

VAN HOUTTH.—Rich deep green foliage, speckled and splashed with crimson.

VERSCHAFFELTII. -Leaf rich velvety crimson, finest bedding sort.

WASHINGTON.—Centre of leaf crimson, stained with green, golden margin.

WILLIAM PENN.—Centre of leaf bronzy crimson, with broad rich golden margin.

ACHYRANTHUS.

The Achyranthus has proved itself a valuable addition to our colored foliaged plants, its glossy foliage being preferred by many to the duller hued coleus. They flourish best in partial shade. Price, 25 cents each; \$2.50 per dozen.

- A. ACUMINATA.—Rich crimson stems, and dark red, acuminated leaves, marked with a salmon-red midrib, and light crimson under-surface.

- A. BORBONICA.—A pretty variety admirably adapted for massing; the color of the foliage being of a deep purple, habit somewhat dwarfer than the other varieties.
- A. VERSCHAFFELTII.--A dark crimson leaf with ribs and stems of a bright carmine, purple shade, and a metallic vein running throughout the plant giving it a very pleasing appearance.
- A. AURENS RETICULATAS.—Same style of growth as A. Verschaffeltii, with light green foliage, beautifully veined with yellow; stems crimson.




