The first requisite for a lawn of any kind, be it permanent or merely temporary, is good soil. these three vital parts: Plant food, moisture fammiar with the first with the third-humus. Humus is that po familiar idenl soil that renders it porous and part of an ddeal son that renders it porous and loamy. It prevents hoayy soils from packing or baking and adds body to light or andy soils, thereby increasing their moisture holding capacity. There-
fore, since plant foods must be in a liquid form before they are available to plants, humus is the most important of the three vital parts of an ideal soil. Heary soils without humus are so tightly andy or light soils, while having great capacity for moisture, drain so rapidly that they become very dry too often for healtiy plant growth. And so we see then that humus added to heavy soil conting its packing or haking and when added to

Where the area is too great to permit the uso of commercial peat for himus we recommend successive plantings of cover crops for turning under. legumes much preferred. We do not recommend manures ninless they are known to be thoroughly rolted and free of wepl aceds and harmfil bncterin. As from a compost lienp made of leases from trees or grass clippings or from some equally genernum mource. nnd scratched into the lawn from
time to time. Howeser, once the soil is well built up with humus and a constant supply for the fulure is provided the prohlem of erowine permanent lawn or anything else is solved.
