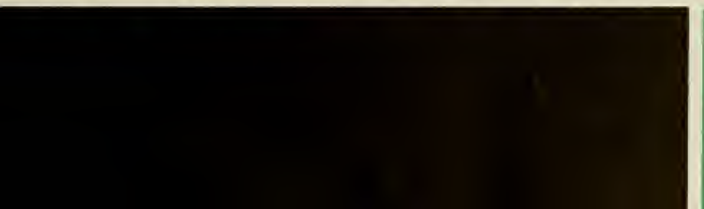
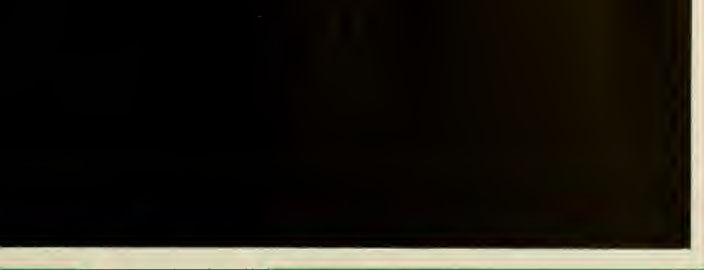

Regarded by various circles as 'The Southern Part of Heaven' (though few students have been heard to voice this sentiment), 'the Harvard of the South', and a nest of Communists, the University and Chapel Hill provide that rather rare sight: Southern heterodoxy — Despite dire shouts of 'Apathy' from the pens of endless, indistinguishable Daily Tar Heel editors, the fact remains that quite a

few students *do* become excited over issues brought to their attention. Pete Seeger (the House Committee on Un-American Activities' least - admired songster) sings, and immediately, his appearance is met with cries of 'Communist!' by the local Young Americans for Freedom and the quixotic filters of Chapel Hill; the American Legion, who equate singing of pacifist songs with the surrender of



America to the Soviet nemesis. A Student Peace Union is formed, each week the Di-Phi unravels nettlesome problems, William Buckley shocks conservatives as well as liberals with his Rabelaisian metaphors; a mock United Nations General Assembly is held; liberals and conservatives (the Punch and Judy Show of America, 1963) slash away at one another with rusty verbal sabers.

And somewhere between vociferous Daily Tar Heel editors and notorious Daily Tar Heel letter-writers and the factitious leaders of particular groups — be they Dekes or Student Party members, or Pan-Hell's or NAACP members — stands that usually unnoticed, unconsulted and much-maligned straw man: the Carolina Student, to whom these lines are written, and to whom the following question is directed: "What difference has the University of North Carolina made in my life?"

We have devoted years of our lives and thousands of dollars (either ours, or more happily, someone else's), and — most of us — much anxious mental labour in order to obtain a

degree from this school. And what really has it meant? Look beyond the obvious answers of future earnings, status, and the good times on campus (which will grow even better in retrospect); what have these four

years, more or less, meant to our lives? The experience that is a university education *ideally* should be a broadening and awakening one.

We who have lived and worked among professors who have spent their lives in learning should ourselves be more open to ideas, more anxious to learn. Ignore the pedants and the incompetents; their presence has not altered in any way the example of those who seek to learn and teach: the professors who exposed to our slower eyes and ears new facets of Shakespeare; the ones who ques-





— though this is a highly personal, debatable and romantic notion — the most valuable things acquired in college come when we are alone with ourselves and an idea. It matters not what the idea is, so long as we are concerned with grasping something previously beyond our reach. What *is* important is that we are awakened, are struck by the ageless curiosity as to the 'whys?' and 'wheres?' of our lives, of all lives. The idea may come completely unannounced in the midst of the noisiest night of the year in the Tempo; drunken philosophizing in smoky clamorous beerhalls is not en-

tioned God and those who exalted Him; above all, those teachers who lifted our eyes — forcibly in most instances — above Y-Court, above Woollen Gym and Harry's and fraternities and dormitories — in brief, above the passing parade of manifold fun and games, to the lasting questions of the mind and heart.

Anything which draws one outside his small circle of problems and concerns is beneficial; and if during our stay in Chapel Hill, we — even once — stood and looked beyond this day's work and tests and the next evening's

pleasures and gazed into the swirling awful process that is life — if only *once* we looked beyond ourselves to the stars, then the time has been well spent, for one who has looked upon stars hesitates to return to earth. Perhaps education is essentially the cracking of the tough, unyielding wall of self-preoccupation, the freeing of one's mind and — if you will — soul, from the tiny confines of self-indulgence and concern. It is not only by books that we are made more knowledgeable, more wise or better able to cope with our lives. Perhaps



tirely futile. Occasionally, beer breeds a valid fresh thought. Or an insight may arrive to the visceral beat of one of the infinite number of combos that circle in and about Chapel Hill, vying for the fraternity's favour. A pair of eyes, equally as intoxicated as our own, sometimes — for an instant — become more knowing than Plato. Or walking down South Building steps, facing the library's challenging bulk, the thought may come that college is not forever, that all lives lead somewhere, and our own lives must go on from this small village. But where? And why? In the





exquisite agony of these questions lies the gift that Carolina has to offer each of us. If we have passed through this time — when we have been most intensely and expertly involved with the things of the mind without once questioning the nature, purpose and destiny of our lives, either we have failed the University, or Carolina has failed us. If all Carolina has come to





mean to us is Saturday's camaraderie in Kenan Stadium; collective disdain for Duke and Wake Forest and State; momentary friendships engendered by alcohol, the Hot Nuts, and madras-butted, heavy-haired coeds; memories of Lenoir Hall food, final exams and other unpleasant relics that survive not for their sweet memorability, but for their sheer

repetitiousness — if these things are all that remain, then our time and effort have been a colossal waste. It is difficult and painful to think of such a large undertaking as having been useless, but if we have gained nothing more than a class ring and a sheepskin and a subscription to *Alumni News*, then we are the same as we were when we first came to





Chapel Hill. No wiser, no more aware than we were as freshmen who were awed (all but the most worldly-wise of us) by the scope of Carolina: South Building (the best-known and most-hated building), the classrooms: Bingham and Murphey, Caldwell and Hanes, Saunders and Venable, at first so new, then grown used to, alternately liked and despised.

As freshmen we responded to the hoarse-mouthed exhortations of cheerleaders. We never questioned their right to demand our fealty, for as strangers we gladly swore allegiance to the welcoming blue and white banner. Then it was glorious to immerse one's self in the roaring mass, and to sing the song after each contest. If we had won (Walloping Wake or Dunking Dook, or whatever the alliterative aim), the song rang sweet with our calm acceptance of our superiority. If we had not won the past bauble of the day, our clear and true whisky-oiled voices drifted through Kenan Woods with the momentary sadness of autumnal loss of the young who cannot live with darkness. After the game we drank to the delighted "economic lechery" of Harry and Sybil, of Spiro, Clarence, the Danziger's and the rest of the town's beer-peddlers. If we had lost to Duke, we drank to the end of the momentary world; but if we won, then intoxication heightened, not de-

pressed our spirits, and we filled the town with senseless victory's cries.

Chapel Hill responds to the University and ultimately to each of us who is a minute fragment of the University, as sensitively and joyfully as any coy maid ever responded to a suiter's attention. Stores and restaurants open and close to the tune of the students' comings and goings. The town of Chapel Hill is a qualitatively different, quieter place when the University closes for Christmas or semester break — Townspeople at-



tain a prominence otherwise unknown. The trees and ivoried buildings stand out more markedly against the sky than when they are surrounded by and filled with the milling thousands of students. The village is a good place when the students are gone, a less frenetic town in which one is more conscious (almost to the point of self-consciousness) of the slow smooth glide of time. Yet for all its serenity and beauty, Chapel Hill is a dead town alone, and one whose character is drained of energy and drive. Chapel Hill *is* the University of North Carolina. The University is its students, and the indi-



vidual student — we the students — have partly determined the attitudes and atmosphere of this town. It is odd, but patently true, that we can no more evade our responsibilities as students than we can shirk our duties as persons in our lives after leaving Carolina. For no matter what course we have taken, whether we chose to dabble in the campus' political mudpies, or to immerse ourselves in dramatics, athletics, or scholastics, or whether we chose to remain alone,





uncommitted and inactive — no matter what our attitude or actions, we formulated a statement reflecting the University's influence on us. If we dribbled balls or beat our palms red in praise of those who dribbled balls better than ourselves, it was because we found nothing better with which to occupy ourselves than the expert manipulation of leathery spheroids. And if — this is the least obvious but the most important — we retired within ourselves and concerned ourselves with neither books nor fraternities, nor politics nor sports, neither YMCA nor Playmakers — if we lived in a stagnant sphere of non-



action, it is — again — because either the University of North Carolina has not offered us the prize worth competing for, or because we would rather concede the prize (whatever that prize may be, whether scholastic marks or campus fame, as mere self-satisfaction) to others who find the competition stimulating and who adjudged the search worthwhile for its own sake.

What is to be done if the University has failed us, or if we have not met its just demands? First of all, how can the University of North Carolina — so long-renowned for its liberal traditions, its academic





freedom, its stimulating environment that has influenced, molded and perhaps inspired such diverse personalities as Frank P. Graham and Junius Scales, Thomas Wolfe and Terry Sanford, Luther Hodges and Robert Welch — how can this wonderfully-varied environment have failed us the students? In several ways. The simple fact that Craige Dormitory lies fifteen minutes from the Old Well is a tacit admission that the size of the University is rapidly overtaking its quality. Lying like a sand-

dripped castle all over the town, with the new dormitories as far away from the center of campus life (whatever *that* may be), Carolina approaches complete objectivity and dehumanization of the individual student. I can only speak for myself, but as a freshman whose first lodging was the inelegant basement of Cobb, and whose second abode was the new-smelling suites of Avery, I can say that I felt about at home in Chapel Hill as a backwoods farmer would feel at a Kennedy bossa-nova fete.



Perhaps I was overly-sheltered and abnormally shy in the midst of knowing upperclassmen and even some of my more sophisticated fellow first-year men; nonetheless, Carolina was more than a little frightening in its sheer size. One felt then that it mattered little whether he learned his Modern Civilization (or Social Science, or whatever its present nomenclature) or studied his botany or his English 21 (Shakespeare, Chaucer and Milton neatly summed up by tweedy and intellectually impeccable



professors). No matter what he did, the University continued to grind on. This was years ago, and now several thousands more are enrolled here. The IBM's grow hot with the effort

of cataloging, processing and disposing of the faceless names who somehow comprise Carolina. And how much more lost must some freshman now from Rutherfordton or Clinton



or Tarboro (or even the state's sole metropolis Charlotte, and its aspiring kin Winston-Salem and Greensboro) — how much more an unmeaning cog must the incoming student now feel? Among ten thousand, what is one? Of course the answer is that the individual student still can achieve, can reach his own goals and can carve out his own educational experience, bounded only by the limits of his own energy, talent and desire. But how many are lost in the massive conglomerative classes that become more and more the rule rather than the exception? A personal remark, teacher-to-student, means more and endures longer than the most erudite mass lecture ever can or will. The state of education at the University is nowhere near the state-witchcraft of 1984, but it does border on 1964, where professors no longer assign papers because the huge numbers of themes would require too much effort to grade; where bright and amoral students take quizzes with impunity in packed classrooms for lesser-endowed but equally uncaring friends; and where the student who cares and asks is hissed by his seven-score classmates who desire only the uninterrupted hour of note-taking. Intelligent growth is fine, but it is a gluttonous attempt to educate tens of thousands within the walls of outmoded and ill-equipped classrooms which almost palpably bulge with





their great burden. Through these corridors walk the sorely-tried and wondering teachers who, despite their critical importance as professors or the young — a profession which as no other so surely demands their whole being — are paid less than football coaches and much, much less than bank presidents.

Stricter admission requirements, more demanding courses of study, and less emphasis on good-natured getting along with the gang and more stress on superior achievement — these must be adopted (and are already gradually being put into effect) to ward off the galloping thyroidal growth of the school. Some students spend hours mastering material which should require only minutes; if they are willing to make the tremendous effort necessary to keep pace, they should be commended for their works. But there are so many, many people enrolled in this University (under the laughable title of student) who have no right to be here, that the prize self-praise of local boosters, "Carolina is the Harvard of the South," is beyond belief. If the standards of the University of North Carolina are so lax, so utterly undemanding — and concomitantly unrewarding — that a student can graduate from this school never having *heard* of Dante or never having looked into Mendel or Aristotle, or without having *studied* Archi-

medes, Marx and Freud — if he, the graduate, the representative of Carolina, has thus escaped exposure to the accumulated wisdom of man's brief, curious history, the University is at fault for not supplying these gaps in his knowledge. And it is academic sprawl, bulbous bureaucratic missteps, and the misguided, well-intentioned loose requirements of this University that have reduced the



whether by talent or diligence, or luck or cunning, a sufficient number of these courses.

So, Carolina can — and unhappily often does short-change and disappoint the students. But one-sided wrongs are rare in this world of complex compromises and adjustment, and we students have failed the University. Most of us realize at isolated moments that we could have drawn

value of its degree to a tacitly devalued scrap of negotiable paper. It is negotiable, for apparently those who hire young graduates demand this degree. But it is devalued, for it means no more than that its holder (whether by his honest sweat-flowing labour or by slothful slipping through or by careful, contained cheating) has sat through the prescribed number and variety of courses, has passed





more from this place's inexhaustible resources than we have done. The number of books we have not read dwarfs those that we have scanned, but it is not merely the unread vol-

umes which bespeak our negligence; rather it is the casual way with which we have rejected the new, the unknown, the challenge, and have held fast to the familiar. We were

either fearful of, or we yawned at, the challenges that were daily laid before us. The Southerners among us who recoiled from intelligence and compassionate discussion of the





desperate relations between negroes and whites; the blindly-believing super-Nathan Hales' who relegate to political purgatory, communism, socialism and any government other

than that by the Constitution of the United States of America; the liberals among us who found solace in slogans and whose easily satisfied hearts numbed their questioning

minds until they were able to respond only to the slogans of their fellow believers. Through fear or slothfulness (certainly not in most cases from any lack of mental celerity), we have



appropriately-horrified eyes on a movie screen; thirty seconds later, we laugh at the Chaplinesque Nazi goose-steppers, the gas ovens are forgotten, and we see no connection between the passive German citizenry which watched while Hitler aspired to holy heights and our own attitudes of folded hands and meekly nodding heads; we who would no more protest an action of our government, on any level, than we would question the sun's daily journey.

Dissipation flourishes in Chapel Hill; we all have wallowed in it —

met new ideas and concepts with closed minds and puerile jibes.

A student pickets a theatre in protest against segregation; another student riding past in an automobile shouts "nigger lover"! And nothing is changed.

A Nobel Prize-winning chemist soberly states that the fallout from nuclear tests will kill and deform hundreds of thousands of yet unborn children; we listen, applaud politely, and disperse to restaurants and coffee shops to placate our stomachs; and none of us moves to act.

The incomprehensibly murderous tale of Auschwitz flashes before our



not the wholehearted, self-destructing actions of the dope addict or the almost-reverent libations of the hopeless alcoholic, but more subtle, less obvious forms. Dissipation is the squandering of talent or time, and who of us has not cast away huge chunks of his life upon aimless ambling after pleasure or upon purposeful retreats from some unpalatable aspects of life? We who see — God knows, we all should be able to see by now — that professors' lectures at times are something more than impressive polysyllabic exercises and that our minds were made not to parrot but to create. We who have realized this are derelict toward ourselves if we do not act on this knowledge. It is hard to speak of "responsibilities" and "duties" without approaching pedantry, for the abundant drivel covering the two words has long since repelled students weary of good, sound advice; but nonetheless, these duties and responsibilities still exist, if in no other sense than Polonius' much admired and seldom-followed admonition: "To thine ownself be true."

It is also difficult to speak without lapsing into pathos of our leaving the University, to avoid falling into the Old Well — Bell Tower — Hark the Sound syndrome which is fitting and good for class reunions, but hardly conducive to any serious speculation

as to the student, his years here at Carolina, and his life afterwards. But graduation from college is a dividing point, a meridian. On one side of the

dividing line, the life of a student: thousands of hours in classrooms positively reeking of shamelessly repeated facts and opinions and of the





thousands of students who have sat for years in the same varying degrees of inattention; the remarkable variety of amusements developed by and for students; athletic events, Co-Rec carnivals, Sigma Chi derbies, Beat Dook parades (though *that* cultural event may have committed obscene suicide), auctions, dances, beach trips, plus the usual, normal amount of everyday

boozing. "Give us this day our daily circus," we cry and at Carolina, we have had circuses with a vengeance. Too, in the student's life are the usually fleeting moments of reflection which approach and recede, but never entirely vanish — moments that carry with them implications of rushing time and future glories — moments in which we each arrive, painlessly,

magically and quite unrealistically, at our own particular goals. Each of us has felt at one time or another that certainty of success that is necessary for anyone who thinks or dreams.

Most of us will be fairly unremarkable persons who will lead reasonably unremarkable lives. Carolina — at the very least — gives us a fair assurance that we shall not

zens. But if our degree from Carolina brings only the stuffs of the good, flaccid American life, it is worse than useless.

If — always the almighty *if* — Carolina and Chapel Hill have showed us that the boundaries of our

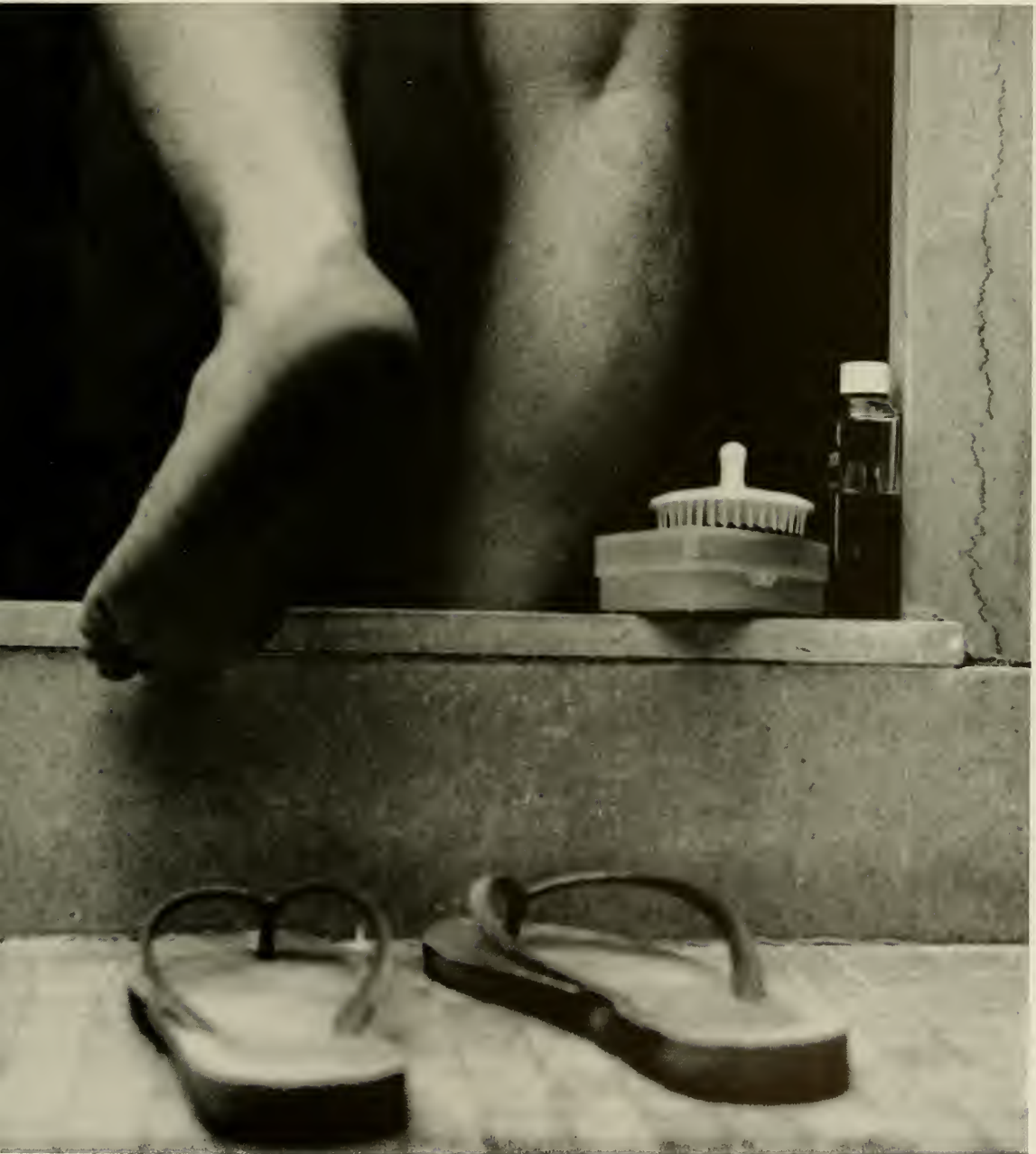

objects, for even the most unworlthy, Epictetus-quoting soul among us will hardly refuse the comforts so easily gotten in America by educated citi-



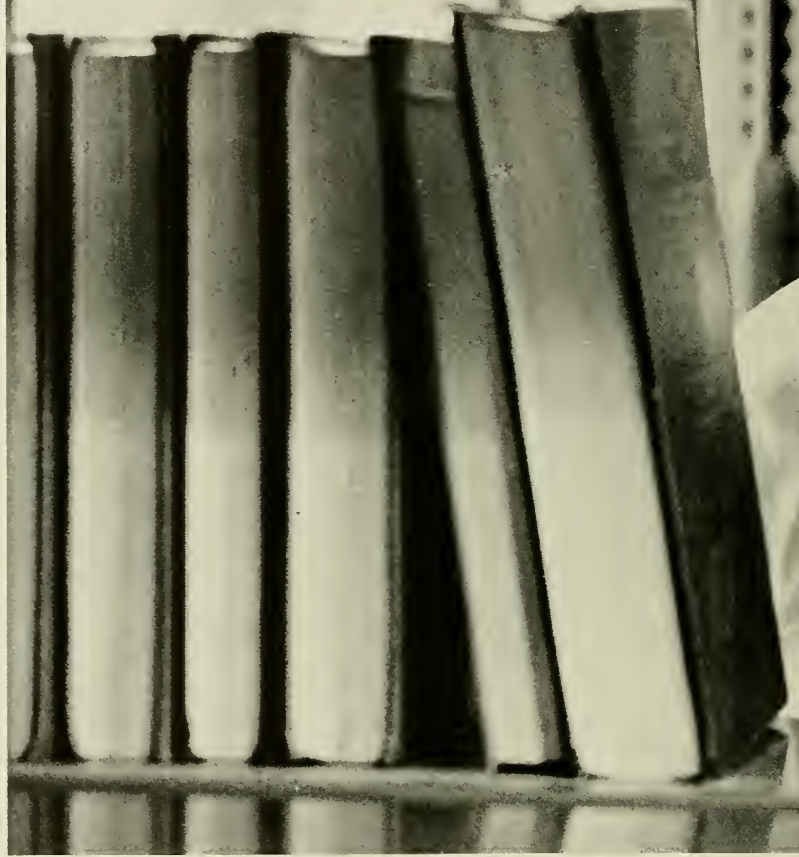
flight are all self-imposed, *if* the town and school have showed us others who absorbed and, ultimately, conveyed not the letter but the spirit of education; *if* we see now the tiniest spark of beauty that would have otherwise gone unnoticed, and *if* we now can speak of beauty without embarrassment at the word; *if*, because we have lived in Chapel Hill and learned at Carolina, we can accept other human beings on the basis





of our shared humanity; *if* we walk a bit wiser (an awareness of our lack of final answers to the meaningful questions which constantly ask themselves) for having studied — and slept — in the library's depths; *if* we are a bit more content for having paid youth's debt and given age its promissory note; *if* the name "Chapel Hill," brings to mind the wet red sidewalks on a rainy dawn as well as golden glasses of beer interlaced with infinite cigarettes; *if*, beyond the necessary (because human) imperfections of Carolina, we remember in the end, the freely-given invitation to learn, to live and to grow as large as we dare, *if* we remember that here at Carolina, we had the chance, whether or not we took advantage of it, to lose ourselves in something larger — *if* we carry with us these impressions and memories and thoughts of this University, we may truly feel that we are, and will be, not only "products" of the University of North Carolina, but also architects of its spirit and destiny.

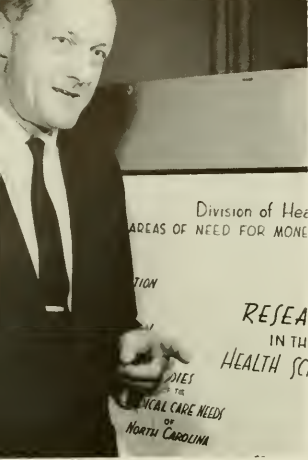

A C A D E M I C S

The University of North Carolina, considered to be one of the best state universities in the country, exists to sustain old traditions and stimulate the growth of new ideas. Our primary reason for being here is to gain knowledge and intellectual stimulation which is basic to an

appreciation of many other aspects of university life. At Carolina one will find countless opportunities for growth and enrichment outside the classroom as well as in. The thoroughness, the extent, of an education will depend on the degree to which one utilizes these opportunities.

CAROLINA: ITS ACADEMICIANS



ALFRED T. BRAUER, Ph.D., 1928, Ph.D. habil, 1932 (University of Berlin), Kenan Professor of Mathematics, is well known for his lectures, not only in the United States, but also in West Germany, East Berlin, Switzerland, and England. He is a member of the Mathematical Association of America, North Carolina Academy of Sciences, and the Elisha Mitchell Scientific Society. In a search for a better understanding of mathematics, he has published more than eighty papers in scientific journals. Among Dr. Brauer's awards are the Science Research Award of the Di-Phi, and a grant received in 1956 from the United States Air Force. Dr. Brauer's main concern is for the success of his students, whether they be freshmen or Ph.D. candidates.

The *Yackety Yack* is proud to present ten of the more outstanding professors of the year. To these men we are deeply indebted for all they have given us, not just in stimulating classroom lectures or in laboratory experiments, but in the practical knowledge of becoming mature men and women during our years at Carolina.

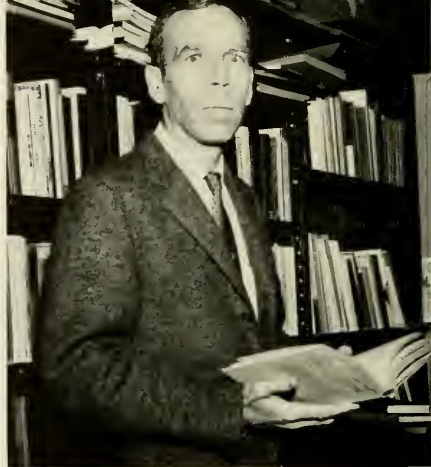


JOHN B. CHASE, JR., Ed.D., 1952 (Virginia), Associate Professor of Education, is currently chairman of the Undergraduate Division of the School of Education. He is a member of the National Science Foundation's Advisory Committee on Elementary School Science, the John Dewey Society, and is on the Editorial Committee of the National Science Teachers Association which involves him in the writing of an extensive series of monographs over the next 15 years. Dr. Chase's primary interest is in Science education, and he is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He was selected in 1961 by the American Association of College Teachers of Education as one of 25 superior education teachers in the Southeast. Dr. Chase is a frequent contributor to numerous professional journals, and has written several books.



SAMUEL S. HILL, JR., Ph.D., 1960 (Duke), Professor of Religion and Chairman of the Department of Religion, is well known to students through his many popular courses. Dr. Hill is a member of the National Association of Bible Instructors and the Society for the Scientific Study of Religion. He has traveled extensively in Europe and Latin America, and attended Cambridge University on a 1955 Rotary International Fellowship. Dr. Hill's field of special interest is religion in the South from theological, sociological, and historical standpoints. He has written several articles for *The Christian Century*, and is currently engaged in writing a book, tentatively entitled *The Rise and Decline of Protestantism In The South*.

J. CARLTON INGRAM, Ph.D., 1951 (Cornell), Professor of Economics. He is a member of the Southern and American Economic Associations, and the Asia Society. To gain information on his specialty he has worked and studied in Thailand, Puerto Rico, and Canada. Dr. Ingram is listed in the *American Men of Science*, and was a 1960 recipient of a Faculty Research Grant from the Social Sciences Research Council. He is currently writing for a U. S. government economic publication entitled *Factors Affecting the U. S. Balance of Payments*. Dr. Ingram has written numerous articles for economic journals and has served for the last two years as the Managing Editor of the *Southern Economic Journal*.



DONALD R. MATTHEWS, Ph.D., 1953 (Princeton), Associate Professor of Political Science, is primarily interested in American politics and is currently engaged in research on Negro political participation in the South. He is the Director of the Political Studies Program here at Carolina, and is a member of the American, Southern, and New England Political Science Associations. Dr. Matthews has published many articles in professional journals and has written several books including *The Social Background of Political Decision-Makers*, and *United States Senators and Their World*. Among his honors is a Senior Award for Research on American Governmental Affairs from the Social Sciences Research Council. Dr. Matthews' outside interests include tennis, sailing, and jazz.



MAURICE A. NATANSON, Ph.D., 1950 (University of Nebraska), Professor of Philosophy, is particularly interested in contemporary European philosophy, especially existentialism and phenomenology. Teaching is a meaningful part of Dr. Natanson's life and his classes are extremely stimulating, made even more so by his lively sense of humor. He was a Scholar and a Fellow of the American Council of Learned Societies which last year sponsored him while he studied in Switzerland. Dr. Natanson has been invited to be a Distinguished Visiting Professor at Pennsylvania State University for the Spring term of 1963. He is the author of many articles, essays, and books which include *A Critique of Jean-Paul Sartre's Ontology*, and *Literature, Philosophy, and The Social Sciences: Essays in Existentialism and Phenomenology*.

CHARLES N. REILLEY, Ph.D., 1952 (Princeton), Professor of Chemistry, has done extensive research work in many phases of chemistry. He is Past-Chairman of the Division of Analytical Chemistry, American Chemical Society, and the editor of a continuing series of volumes entitled *Advances In Analytical Chemistry and Instrumentation*. Dr. Reilley studied in Switzerland under a Guggenheim fellowship in 1961. His classes are popular with students as he is well known for his ability to explain difficult material in a clear manner, and he conducts his classes in a personal atmosphere. Dr. Reilley believes it very important that his students look at chemistry from its practical applications in every day living, and he is always willing to discuss problems with his students.



H. K. RUSSELL, Ph.D., 1931 (University of North Carolina), Professor of English, was a 1960 recipient of the Tanner Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching, and received in 1951 a Faculty Study Fellowship from the American Council of Learned Societies. He is a member of the South Atlantic Modern Language Association and the National Council of Teachers of English. Dr. Russell has traveled extensively and taught in the American University of Beirut, 1924-1927. He is the co-editor of *A State University Surveys the Humanities*, and *Literature in English*. Dr. Russell's course in English and American Fiction of the Twentieth Century is a popular one among Carolina students. He enjoys teaching literature because "ideas become valuable when we see what people do with them — the people who write, the people in fiction, and the people in classes here in Chapel Hill."



JOSEPH CURTIS SLOANE, Ph.D., 1949 (Princeton), Professor of Art, is also Director of the Ackland Art Center. His major research areas and teaching specialties are 19th and 20th century paintings. Among the societies he is a member of the National Council on Arts and Education, the College Art Association, and the Southeastern Art Museum Directors Association. Dr. Sloane has published several books including *French Painting Between the Past and Present*, and he is a frequent contributor to such periodicals as *The Art Bulletin*, *Art Quarterly*, and *The Journal of Aesthetics and Art Criticism*. His hope is to "make the art of the past and present a genuine, as well as a significant part of the lives of students who will be artists themselves."

GEORGE V. TAYLOR, Ph.D., 1950 (University of Wisconsin), Associate Professor of History, is a member of the American Historical Association, the Society for French Historical Studies, and the Southern Historical Association. Among Dr. Taylor's awards is the 1958 Tanner Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching. He was also a recipient of a Fulbright Research Fellowship in 1953 for study in France. An active author, he has contributed to many publications, among them the *American Historical Review*. Dr. Taylor is now engaged in writing a book entitled *French Capitalism at the End of the Old Regime*. Dr. Taylor's objectives as a teacher are "to promote understanding and compassion with peoples of the past, and responsibility to those of the present and future."

people and activities which are housed in this campus institution.



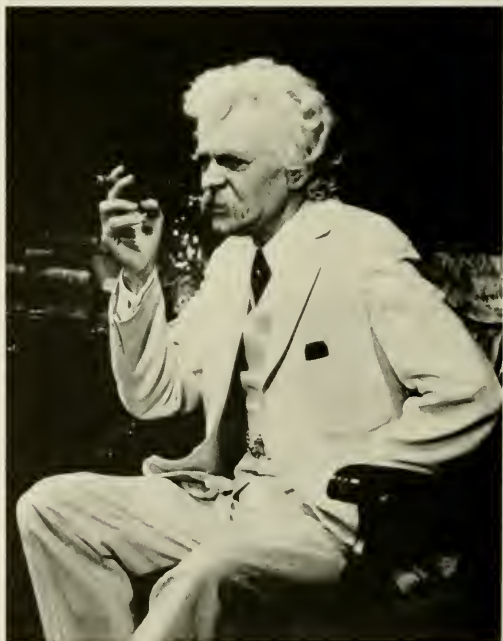
Reflection: the contents of the vending machine look appetizing at this instant. Maybe it's going to be a snack; possibly it's a quick lunch.

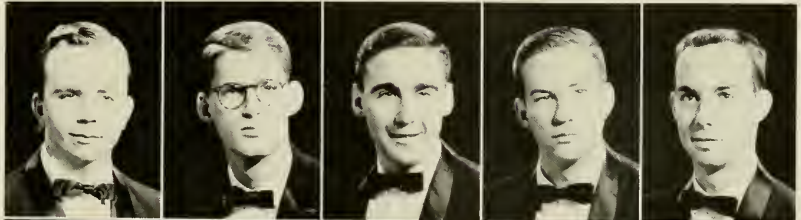
Dance Committee Assists at Public Functions

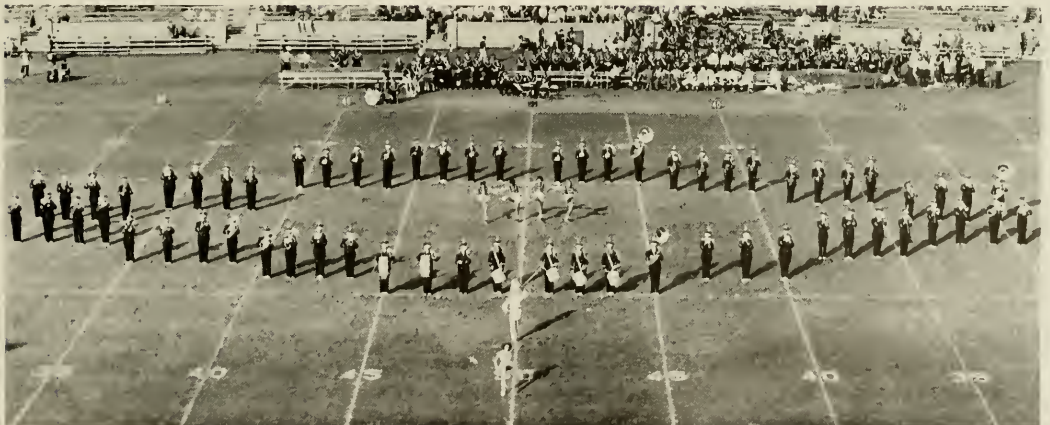

EXPANSION — 62 THEME

Under the leadership of President H. Inman Allen, Student Government of 1962-1963 sought not only to work *for* the student body, but also to work *through*, and thereby to speak for, all areas of the campus. In accomplishing this, the President chose not to appoint the usual advisory cabinet, but rather to maintain advisory staffs which delved into particular problem areas of the University and were directly responsible to him.

Further steps were taken to increase and maintain student interest and participation in Student Government organizations. Evidence of this interest was seen by over six hundred applicants for committee work.

Through the tightening of organizational affairs, Student Government was able to increase membership on most of its committees and thus make use of an even larger portion of unused student ability and creativity.

The expansion of committees and the promotion of greater student interest resulted in outstanding work. Prominent national and local personalities visited the campus as lecturers, debaters, and entertainers. Some newer problems were squarely faced through committee action. These included such projects as providing the basis for the establishment of a Student Co-operative and investigating the possibilities of transportation to fringe areas of the campus.

A concept which Student Government attempted to deal with realistically was the elevation of the general level of educational experience. Steps in this area were taken by the *Daily Tar Heel* in its coverage of matters of academic, political, and cultural interest; by class recognition of excellence in teaching; by dormitory and organization sponsored discussions; and by the outstanding work of the Academic Affairs Committee, the Carolina Forum, and the National Student Association.

In a greater attempt to hear the voice of the student body, an extensive communications program was set up largely through the efforts of the Communications Committee which, among other things, conducted various polls in order to ascertain student opinion.

The Student Legislature, headed by Vice-President Mike Lawler, entered its 33rd and 34th Assemblies with fifty legislators representing the various areas of the campus. A major piece of legislation proposed the "Open Trials" amendment to the Constitution; this amendment was ratified by two-thirds of the student body in the fall elections and was thus incorporated into the Constitution. The Legislature worked very closely with other campus organizations in handling needed legislation and by providing its support through resolutions and financial bills.

Much of the value of Student Government lies not only in its opportunities for service, but also in its opportunities for individual experience, growth, and training. It is hoped that this year's Student Government will be remembered for both.

The 1962-63 Men's Council spent a large measure of its time fulfilling the judicial function of enforcing the Honor Code and Campus Code. The Council sought, however, to go beyond this limited range of duties and to lead the University community in a re-examination of the positive aspects of the Honor Code and in a renewed commitment to its ideals.

Beginning with Orientation the Council attempted to emphasize the philosophy of the Honor System as a method of teaching the lessons of honesty and self-discipline. The Council instigated a constitutional amendment which provided for the writing of an unbiased newspaper account of all council proceedings except those in which the defendant requested a private hearing. Plans were made in cooperation with the faculty committee on discipline to have council members visit every academic department to urge the faculty to renew their support of the concept of self-discipline.

One of the major changes in the Honor System is the establishment of open trials; however, the defendant may have a closed trial upon request. The Women's Council vehemently opposed the mandatory open trial, but it supports the modified change in the Constitution, believing that by this system, the rights of the defendant and the interests of the community will be protected and promoted concurrently.

This Council is the judicial body which has original jurisdiction in all Honor Code and Campus Code violations. It is composed of eleven women students elected bi-annually. All women students, undergraduate and graduate, are within the jurisdiction of the Council.

The principle duty of the Women's Council is to administer justice; the secondary obligation of the Council is to educate the students in the realization of honor and the acceptance of responsibility.

The YMCA at the University of North Carolina attempts to effect a change in the campus atmosphere by providing a forum of ideas in which the student body can meaningfully raise critical questions and seek accurate answers. This year the YMCA entered a range of programs in securing these goals.

Through the Public Affairs, International Affairs, Human Relations Committees, and the Collegiate Council for the United Nations, all organs of the YMCA, students this year participated in seminars in New York and Washington, in discussion meetings with faculty members, foreign students, and visitors to the campus.

As the United States Air Force has been recognized as America's first line of defense, the A.F.R.O.T.C. is an integral part of the University of North Carolina. The purpose of the program is to provide a constant supply of officer material.

The A.F.R.O.T.C. enables the cadet to prepare for the role of a responsible citizen, a well-trained Air Force officer, and possibly a pilot. The training here consists of intensive classroom and laboratory work. Principles of

effective leadership and the importance of military discipline are stressed.

During their junior and senior years, the cadets are offered an advanced A.F.R.O.T.C. program. It calls for four extra hours of classroom work and two extra hours of drill each week. Upon the completion of the academic requirement for a bachelor's degree plus four years of A.F.R.O.T.C. training, each cadet is commissioned and assigned to active duty.

SOCIAL FRATERNITIES

I.F.C. BECOMES MORE SELF-REGULATING

In the past few years, Interfraternity Council has become more and more a self-governing body, because of their increased initiative and responsibility. This year the new, self-imposed law that each active fraternity member have a cumulative "C" average went into effect. This replaced the old "80%" rule. Another innovation, that of deferred rush for new freshmen, will go into effect in two years. This year also brings a crack-down by I.F.C. on inactive fraternity men who are not allowed to attend social functions or represent the house in any way. The last comes under the expanded powers of the I.F.C. Court.

Another idea initiated by I.F.C. is the "black-listing" of combos that break contract by failing to appear or by arriving late. This will alleviate the past situation of a planned party weekend being spoiled by the unreliability of combos.

The fall was a busy and often turbulent one on the Carolina campus. Students discovered "causes," and demonstrated actively their convictions and beliefs.

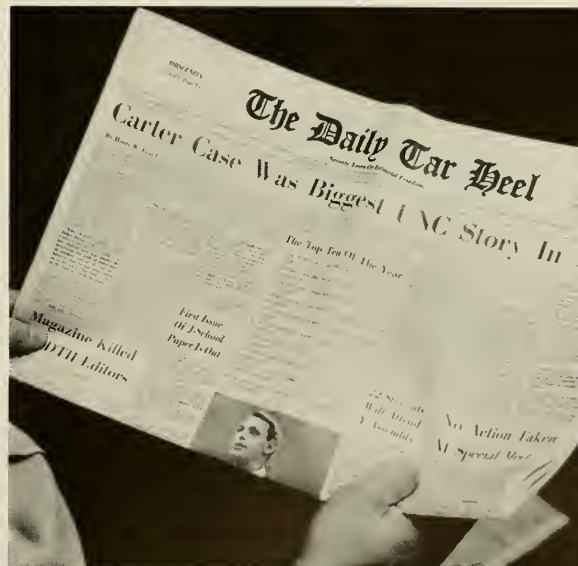
A chastisement of leftist sympathies at UNC was engendered by the American Legion and student conservatives. One result was a picketing against the appearance of folksinger Pete Seeger.

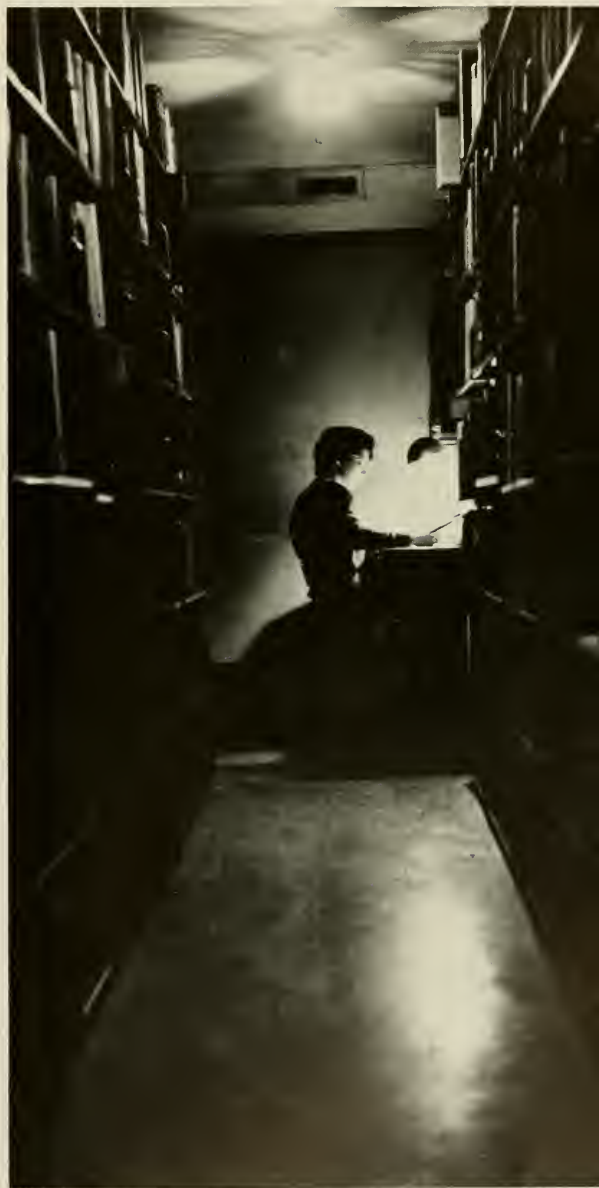

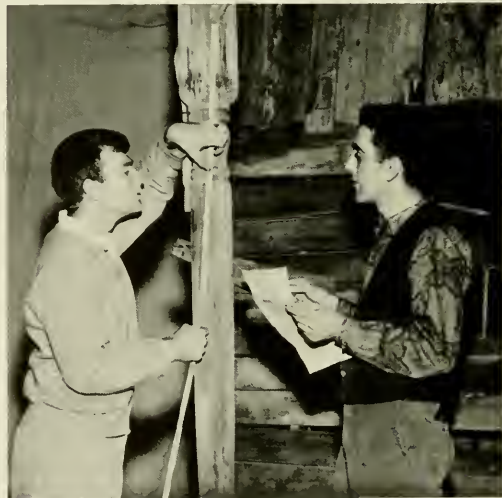
GEORGIA DIRT FARM SCENE FOR "TOBACCO ROAD" PRODUCTION

WINTER BRINGS CHAOS: THE CU, ARCHEOLOGY, BAD CHECKS, AND GIRLS

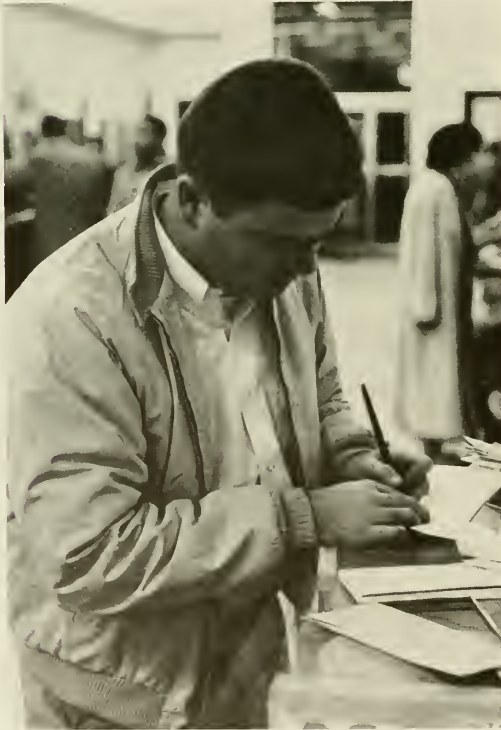


What could Terry be consulting in his little black book? Perhaps more suggestions for renaming Consolidated University branches.

Controversy surrounded a long-ranged perspective for the future functions and goals of the Consolidated University. In an effort to provide additional branches of the University, college administrators and politicians alike hoped to take a significant step in North Carolinian education. Changing the names of the institutions now in the CU system — W. C. and State — engendered heated disagreement.

On the lighter side this winter, the female cheerleaders girded their loins in a revolt against a particular garb enforced upon them. The Student Legislature also acted with mature conviction when they passed a bill making certain forms of bad checks an honor system offense.

Perhaps the most regrettable and sensational of any incidents this year was the mid-term disclosure of more than nominal cheating in an archeology course taught by Dr. J. P. Harland. Men's Honor Council Walter Dellinger chairman questioned academic integrity at some levels of the University, setting off reverberations throughout the state and nation.

"RHINOCEROS" STAMPEDES CAROLINA IN FAMED "AVANTE-GARDE" PLAY

An offbeat play with an offbeat title — this describes "Rhinoceros" which the Carolina Playmakers presented in February. Written by rising new "avant-garde" playwright, Roumanian-born Eugene Ionesco and coming to Chapel Hill fresh from a successful New York run, this play is satire in a different style. Its chief emphasis is on depicting "rhinocerositis," which is defined as conformity to sweeping popular manias. One of the characters actually becomes one of the ferocious African beasts on stage, and several others are converted to the "spirit of rhinocerositis." In what was obviously a challenge to their creative skills, the cast and backstage crew turned this nonsense play into an audience charmer.

And there had been in the land *Playboy*, a prophetic scroll. And it was read — at Memorial Hall by the guest. And the hosts rose in vengeance at this sacrilege.

And the guest felt betrayed and complained mightily and with righteousness of Judas and the facts of life — money. And so he was paid in silver . . . to read about himself in *Time*.

POLITICS STIR UP THE CAROLINA CAMPUS

The old saw about Carolina students being politically apathetic didn't apply this year, for the campus witnessed a startling reawakening of ideologies and fascination with political philosophies.

Some of the controversy was purely homespun. Students charging that *The Daily Tar Heel* was an insidious liberal plot. *The Daily Tar Heel* claiming that Richard Nixon and Barry Goldwater were insidious. That sort of thing.

A major political crisis seemed to be brewing early in the fall when the American Legion chapter in Chapel Hill decided that it might be fruitful to investigate UNC for Communists and other subversive types. Much of their fears were brought on by the formation of a Progressive Labor Club on campus. The furor raged for a while. Local television commentators delved into the situation, but nothing was uncovered, and no investigation got beyond the talk stage. National PLC leader Milt Rosen spoke in November in Gerrard Hall on Progressive Labor's critique of contemporary society and PLC's plans for the future. Since that time, things have gotten progressively quieter.

The Carolina Forum brought down Nikolai D. Turkatenko of the New York Bureau of TASS. This Soviet citizen and

Communist Party member spoke in Carroll Hall on dissemination of news in the USSR and then chatted informally in a two hour question and answer session with his audience. He lunched and supped in fraternity houses and was eagerly and incisively questioned wherever he went. Turkatenko's comments on Chapel Hill and UNC: "beautiful and exciting . . . I would like to come back sometime."

Participants in the famous 1960 "Operation Abolition" debate, Fulton Lewis, III and Michael Harrington, did come back, although not together. Harrington, a socialist, discussed "The Tragedy of Poverty in America" and urged his Carolina Forum audience "to create a new climate of social idealism" in this country. Mr. Lewis spoke on the content and failure of American liberal thought at an open meeting sponsored by the Young Americans for Freedom.

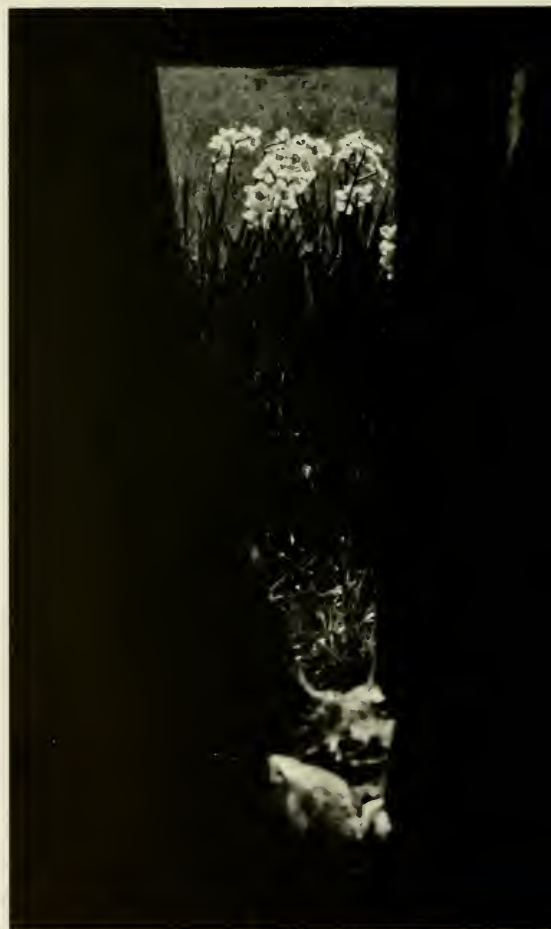

An ocean of sunglasses and shortsleeve shirts goes through the paces of pretending to be a Forest Hills or Davis Cup gallery.

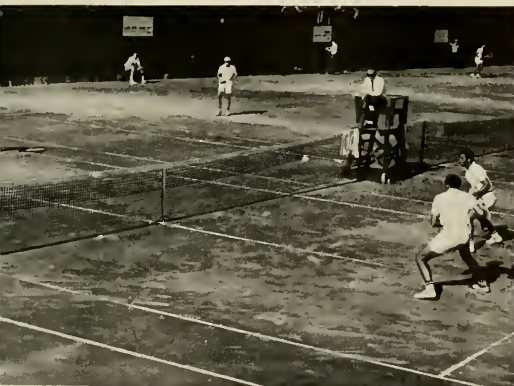
The stands were so crowded by 2 P.M. that one ingenious student was forced to take advantage of his tree-climbing ability.

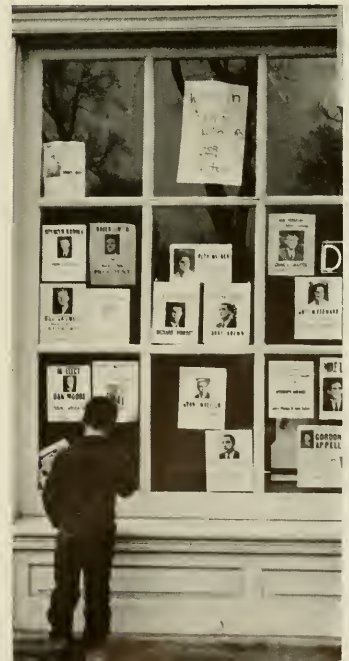
In an unfamiliar role, all-time Carolina great Charlie "Choo-Choo" Justice warms the bench during the first Alumni Game.

North Carolina did not have an overly impressive amount of football success in the 1962 season. There can be no specific reasons given, however, for the not-so-good outcome. Firstly, there was natural ability, not a tremendous amount, but enough to have a rather good season, and secondly, everyone tried his darndest to pull the upset.

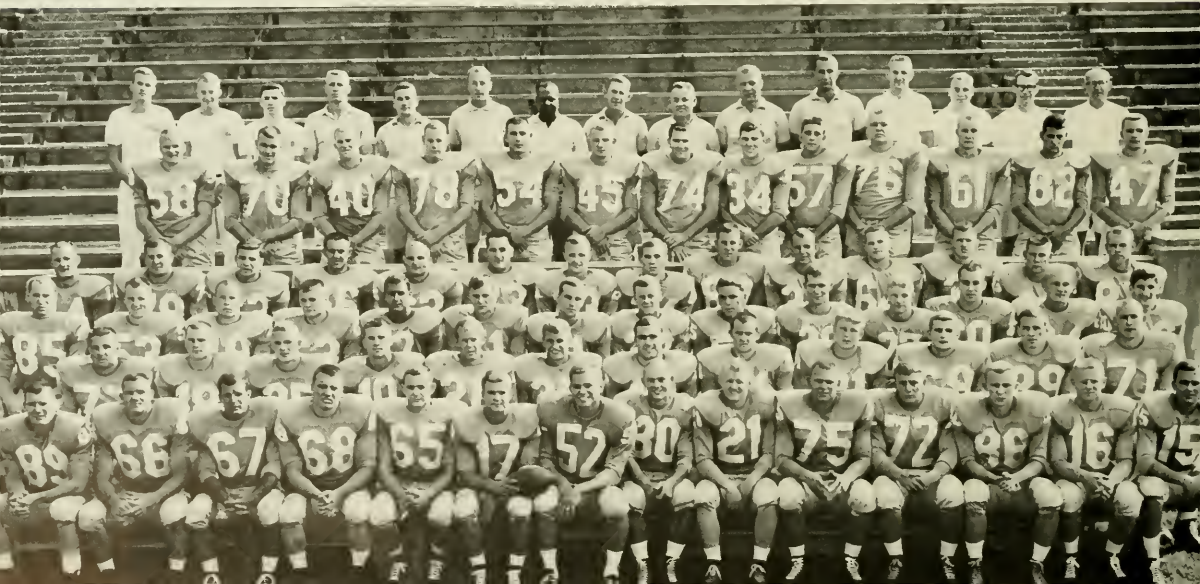
The season was not nearly as insignificant as the scores reveal, for Carolina did accomplish a great deal that is worthy of recognition. The team was very young, but most of the really strong points on the squad were with the younger players. A strong offensive example would be sophomore fullback Ken Willard. His running from the middle-back position was easily comparable to the famed Bob Elliott's of 1961. Willard gained more yardage than any running back since the days of Ed Sutton and Wade Smith.

Our top candidate for All-American, Bob Lacey, will be returning next year. He now holds the most pass reception's record for Carolina; the record that was originally set by All-American Art Weiner.

The records for the most passes attempted and most passes completed were broken by the fine junior quarterback Junior Edge.

Overall the future looks bright — the brightest of all for Coach Jim Hickey. At this time a good prediction is impossible, but if a Carolina team has ever looked exceptionally good on paper — this is the one.

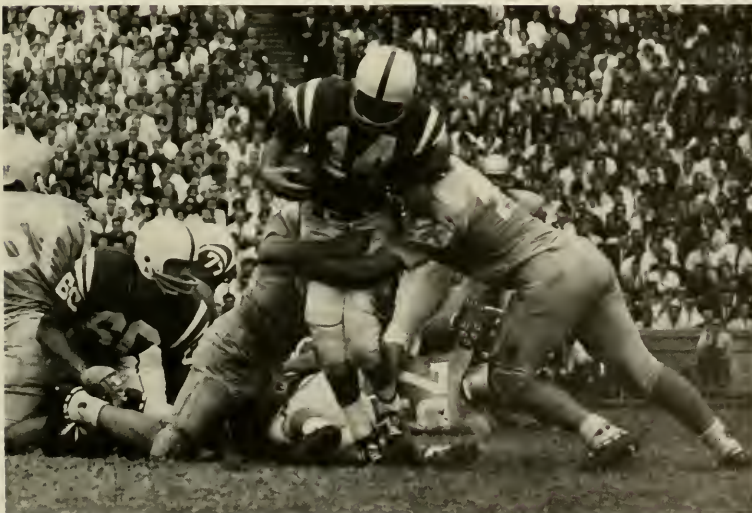
GREAT EXPECTATIONS

"I can only hope that the raw material is as good as the method of distribution." Thirty-three players, scattered adequately over three platoons took the field to make some type of gridiron history in the first game of the 1962 season. Enthusiasm was high and hopes were even higher as the gun was sounded to begin the annual State-Carolina strategic battle. This was to be our proving ground.

The basis of our attack this afternoon lies in balance — the balance of all offensive elements in a platoon that seems much like a green legion feeling its way through the densest of jungles. The effectiveness of this type of offensive unit was revealed throughout the first two quarters of play, with some dismay to the spectator. At the half our favored forces trailed by seven. Soon after the initiation of the much more "die hard" second half of play a most hopeful spark of potential was revealed in the abilities possessed by our highly underestimated air forces. The quarterback had a quality that could prove to make or break a tough season — and he had the ends to make it. Carolina scored in the *fourth* quarter and with 13:56 left, quarterback Edge put his toe into the all-important conversion attempt. Carolina fell by 7-6.

Over sixty thousand spectators jumped with fear as Junior Edge passed 20 yards to Bob Lacey for the big UNC score midway in the second period. The score was then 20-6 in favor of Michigan State. Could UNC make a close fight of it?

The Spartans promptly pounded the left side of the Carolina line and scored once again before the half.

Trailing 26-6, the Heels contained the Spartans for most of the third quarter and Edge passes to Lacey and Hammett set the Tar Heels in position on the Michigan State 8. But drive and downs spoofed the candle out as Carolina gave the ball over, short of score. Ron Rubick was the story as he averaged over 14 yds. per carry in breaking a school record for Michigan State.

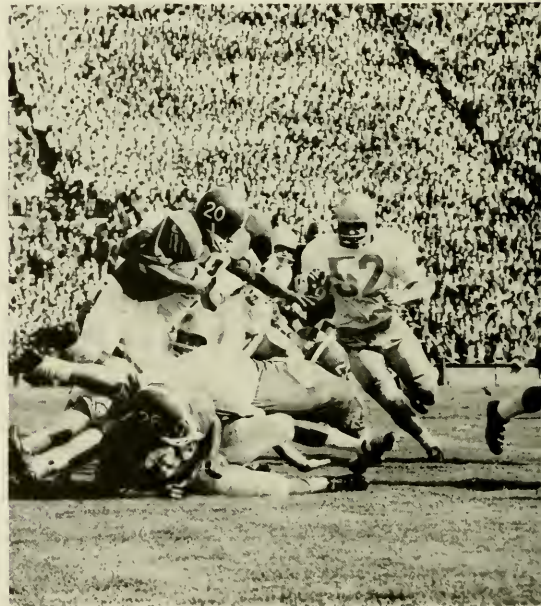
That was it for the Big Ten in 1962 — 1963 may turn out differently?

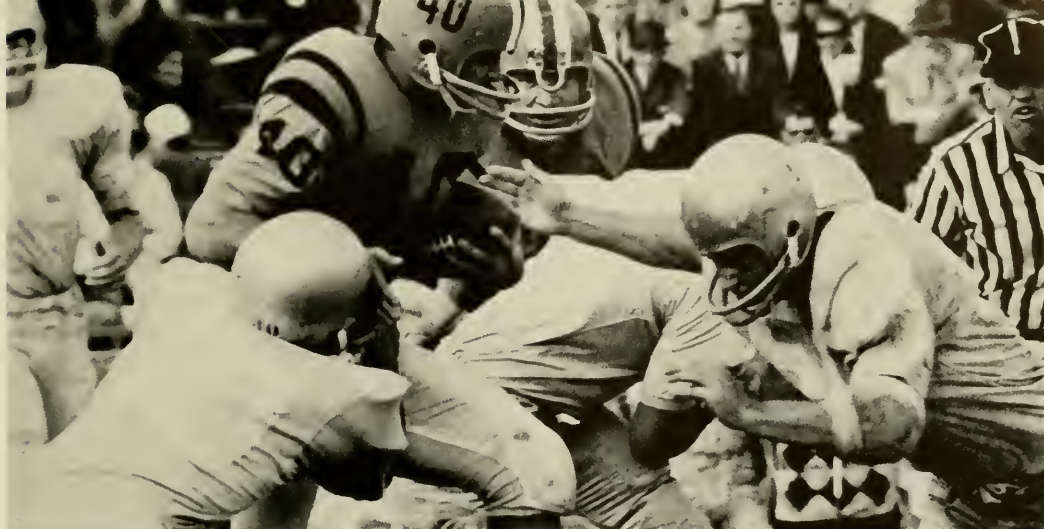
Somewhat recovered from the stun given the Tar Heels in the opener, the trip was made to Ohio State with much enthusiasm. UNC journeyed to the Midwest prepared to give a surprise or two to the No. 1 team in the nation. Those surprises came in the first half as the Heels took advantage of a faultful Ohio State offensive. Behind 14-0 and with the Buckeye infantry advancing, our left wing dug in admirably and took advantage of the second big Ohio fumble and our own offensive machine rolled into motion. The highly respected arm of Junior Edge told the story as UNC scored in three passes and two plunges. Score at the half was a fighting close 14-7.

"A war of few casualties and unnumbered executions!" Carolina bounced back on the field in the second half and was bounced right back off. The blood thirsty Ohio State Buckeyes scored 27 points in a most indescribable fashion. There was no time for anyone to become seriously injured for we were all too busy.

We shall not disappoint the Spartans next week — we shall turn out in full strength.

“A FAREWELL TO ARMS”

One of the basic strategic truths that is most applicable to our situation has been put in the form of a simple anecdote. This is the celebrated tale of the man who gave the powder to the bear. “He mixed the powder with the greatest care, making sure that not only the ingredients but the proportions were absolutely correct. He rolled it up in a large paper spile, and was about to blow it down the bear’s throat, but the bear blew first.”

After playing a good early game and in a position to romp on the tiger with its careful strategy, Carolina fumbled away a possible tying tally. Clemson turned this mistake into her own score and clinched a 17-7 victory with a field goal from the UNC 13.

Far outshining all other players this gray and gloomy afternoon was Carolina’s “Prophet of Power” — Ken Willard who rushed for a bruising 113 yards.

But even Willard was not quite enough as the University of North Carolina football record slipped one more notch.

“This would be an event which if it occurred would be one of the most melancholy in history . . . The first victory we have to win is to avoid a battle; the second, if we cannot avoid it, is to win it.”

The best method of avoiding a severe battle is by striking quickly and effectively through the air. The Maryland Terps, unfortunately, had much the same idea and, by halftime, had withstood all our surprise tactics and still held a 17-13 lead. We were well within striking range but what would be our weapon in the second half?

Whatever the weapon was meant to be, Dick Shiner of Maryland so completely camouflaged it that it was hardly noticeable that we were still actively participating on the same playing field. The result: Maryland 31 — Carolina 13.

South Carolina has been known to supply a sufficient amount of (a), thus, whether UNC could overcome the problems rendered by (b) or not was the big question of the afternoon."

North Carolina carried a heavy four game losing streak into Kenan Stadium on October 21. The loyal Carolina fans were to be shown the most exciting football of the early season, however, as the Heels trailed for 44 minutes of the game and then came to sparkling life. With the Tar Heels behind 14-6 as they entered the final quarter, fullback Ken Willard began running like Bob Elliott did in the season of 1961. He climaxed a continuous drive by dragging the entire South Carolina team for 13 yds. into the end zone. Still behind by 2, Junior Edge took over once again. The big one this time was a beautiful arched pass to Bob Lacey for 41 yards and the winning tally. 19-14, UNC.

Although South Carolina was not a ball club to compare with a few of the other powerhouses with which we came into contact, the victory did a great deal for team spirit. The Tar Heels would not win so easily in the future.

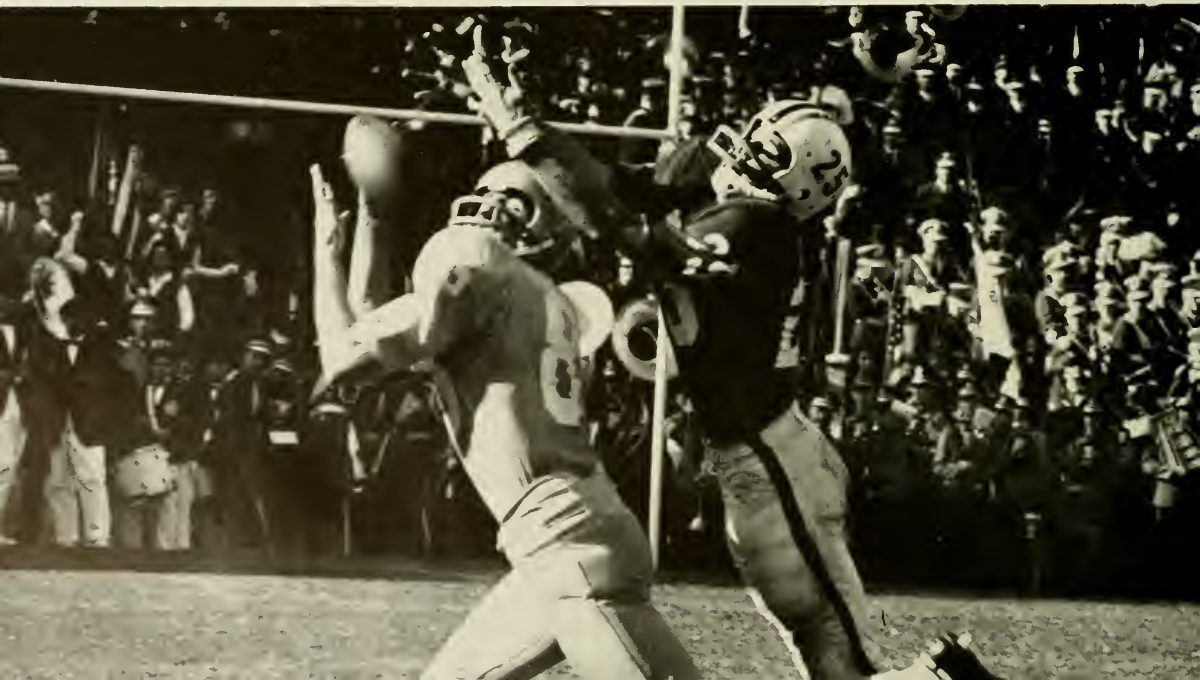
"They were the most good-hearted enemy we have ever fought against in the many regions in which it has been our fortune to see Active Service." Late October saw the winless Deacons of Wake Forest match their ability against an improving Carolina team. We fought them in the air—49 passes were thrown, all told, this chilly afternoon. Junior Edge threw eight completed passes, all to Bob Lacey. With the aid of Ronnie Jackson, Carolina halfback, the precision Carolina offense overcame a 7 point half-time deficit and emerged the long-awaited victors.

The real highlight of the game came in the second quarter when Wake Forest moved to the Carolina 3 yard line. With the score tied 7-7 ace line-backer Joe Craver was the key figure in an aggressive goal-line stand for 3 big downs. Carolina took over on the one.

Unfortunately the 23-14 score rolled up by Carolina against Wake Forest opposition was not enough to add much color to our colorless cap. The significance of this game was that Bob Lacey could catch passes and Junior Edge could throw them.

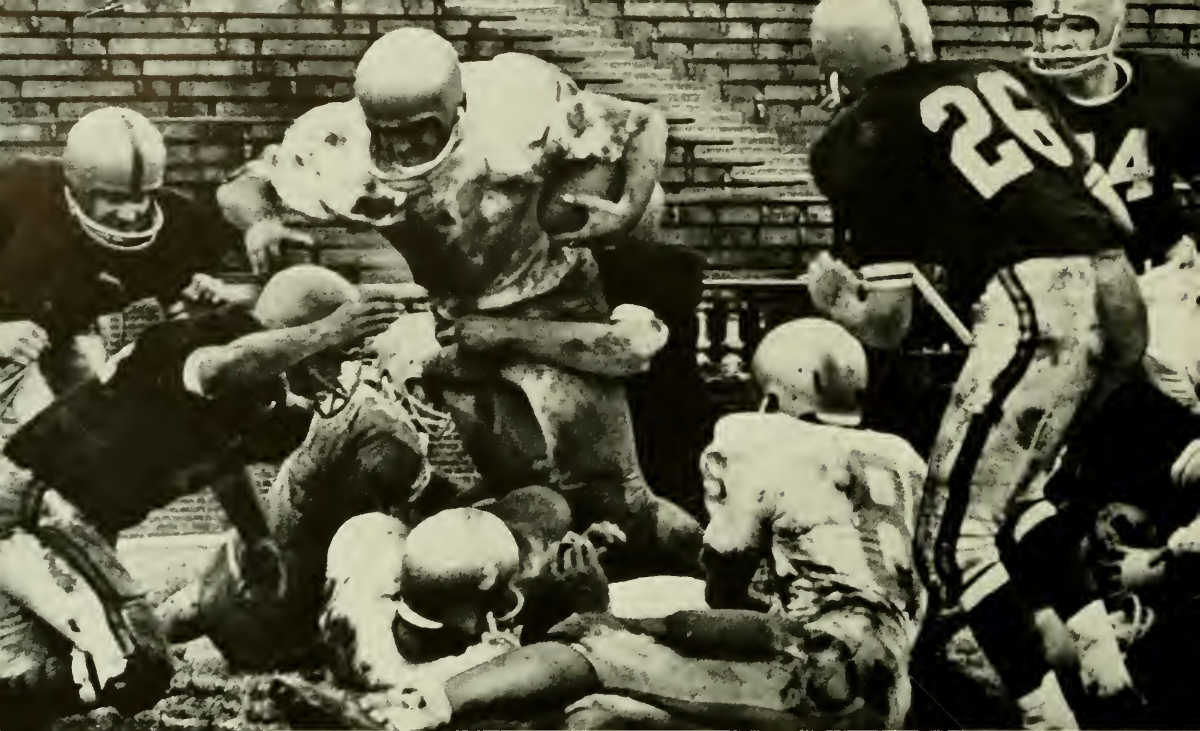

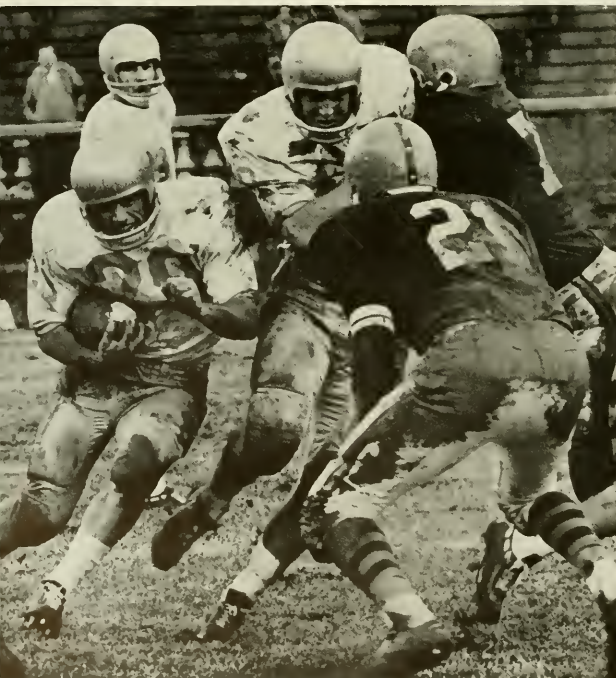

VICTORY AT SEA; THE LUCK OF THE IRISH

"We shall fight them on the land, and in the air, and *on the sea.*" The scene, in Charlottesville on November 10, was brown — muddy brown after many hearty rains. Carolina's Tar Heels, for the first time in the 1962 season, would have to deal with this always dreaded element. "Surprise, violence, and speed are the essence of all amphibious landings."

Our favored Tar Heels unloaded what would appear to be a very experienced encounter with the Cavaliers of Virginia and rain. Our ground forces worked well and, when needed, our aerial attack shined forth brightly. By halftime we had a 3-0 lead.

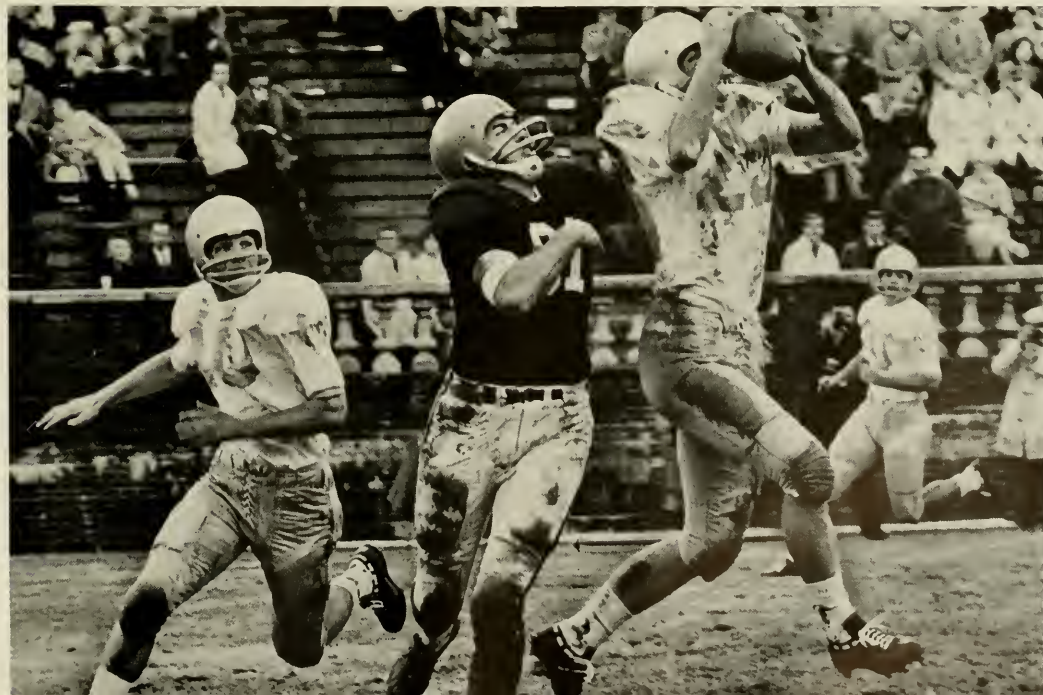
The Cavaliers came back strong in the third quarter and were the first to hit pay dirt. The end of the quarter was Virginia up by 7 to 3. Carolina's 4 game winning streak over the Cavaliers was in jeopardy but the Tar Heels had the ball and were moving. A seven yard run climaxed a 74 yard drive to put the Heels ahead — for good.

All in all, Carolina played a far finer game against the elements than is revealed by the 11-7 score. The sweet victory cake was tasted once again.

"I stand by my original programme — blood, toil, tears, and sweat . . . to which I added five (weeks) later, some shortcomings, mistakes, and disappointments." Those of us who have been around Carolina for a longer period of time recall, with this same dismay, the Irish game of 1949. Thousands of North Carolinians loyally followed the three touchdown underdog Tar Heels to Yankee Stadium that cloudy Saturday in November. The lowly Tar Heels shocked the mighty Irish in the first half as the latter had to fight to hold a 6-6 tie going into halftime. Yet the Tar Heels fell that afternoon, 42-6.

The 1962 contest was not unlike the Irish game of a decade and three ago. A brilliantly executed first half put the Heels miraculously in front by a space of seven points. The faultless Carolina squad hadn't given an inch until the second half, when Notre Dame pounded out the necessary yardage for a 21-7 victory. It was learned, this afternoon, that the Heels had the ability to be a fine squad. Future games are destined to feel of this new spirit.

"THE POWER OF POSITIVE THINKING"

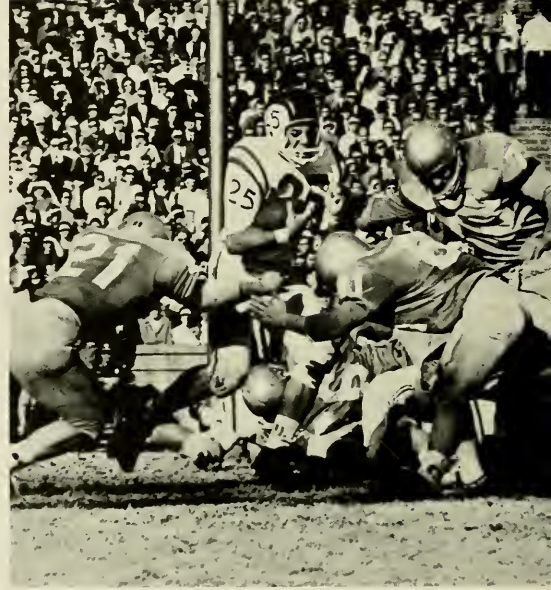

The entire first half was a see-saw battle featuring several spectacular performances. An Edge to Smith pass in the second period was just enough to keep the Heels ahead of the Devils with the prolific toe — Bill Reynolds, and Carolina went into half-time with a 7-6 edge.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Devils on the first play of the final period scampered ahead 13-7 on a six-yard end run. Carolina soon retaliated with a 68-yard drive capped by an over-the-shoulder catch by Bob Lacey. Braine put the Heel's ahead with the p.a.t. by 14-13 and Kenan Stadium went berserk. Late in the quarter Duke had penetrated deep but lost the vital first down on the UNC 23 by the thinness of a piece of paper.

"Any clever person can make plans for winning a war if he has no responsibility for carrying them out." It is on this basis that a Carolina back has received much criticism for fumbling on the very next play — tension was very high. Unfortunately, that fumble was to allow Bill Reynolds to kick the crucial field goal from within our 20 with only 46 seconds left.

The Devils squeaked out a 16-14 victory and went home with the game, the ball, and the bell.



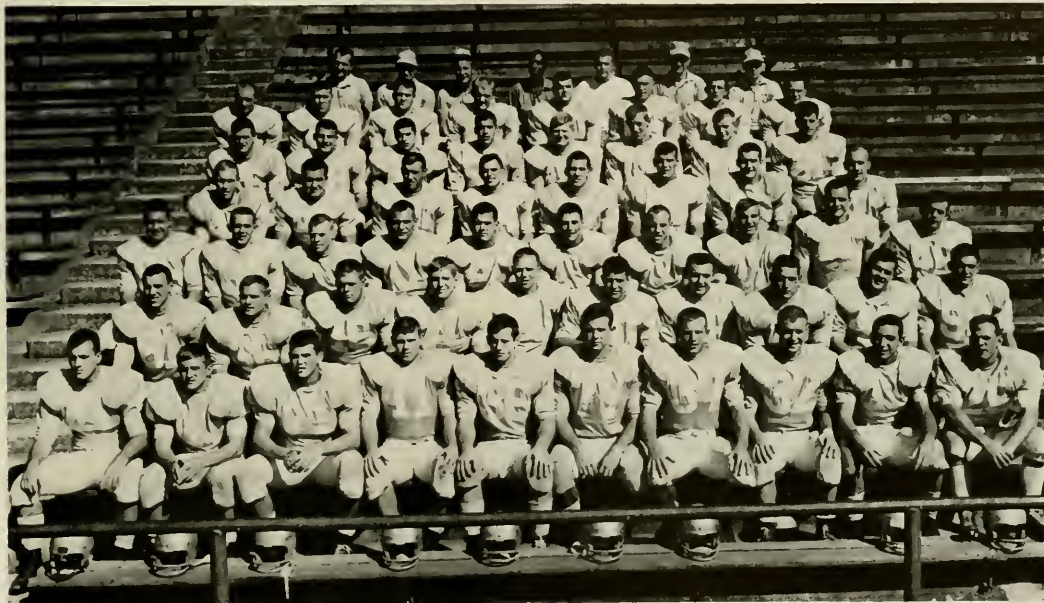
Wheaties-eating Duke half-back flakes through Rice-Krispy Carolina line for key first down.

Despite a mediocre record of 2-3, the 1962 edition of the Carolina Tar Babies showed constant hustle, genius at times, and a certain promise of a bright future for Carolina football. Coach Barkley's freshman squad made its debut with a sparkling 16-12 victory over N. C. State College at Raleigh. The following week the Tar Babies ground out 350 yards rushing against a fine Clemson team but were unable to find the scoreboard. The Clemson passing attack overshadowed Carolina's offensive display with a 21-7 victory.

In their next outing the Tar Babies unleashed a vicious attack completely demoralizing the Deaclets of Wake Forest in a decisive 35-7 rout. The following week, six inches spelled the difference between victory and a 14-13 defeat at the hands of Maryland. Late in the game the Tar Babies decided to go for the win rather than the tie but failed on their two-point conversion attempt.

The finale came on Thanksgiving Day as the Heels met the Blue Imps of Duke for the annual Cerebral Palsy Benefit Game. The results were in the form of an unfortunate but well fought loss.



BASKETBALL TEAM HAS SURPRISING YEAR—ASK WAKE

The Tar Heels could be said to have been in the league race most of the season — until, on a bright, shiny Saturday afternoon, McKinney and a bunch of nothings from Wake Forest beat us for the second time.

UNC was to lose to Wake Forest three times (and there ought to be a law against that), Duke twice and Big Ten spoiler Indiana once for its six defeats. The early season road trip loss to the Hoosiers was perhaps Carolina's worst game of the season. But it was immediately followed two nights later by our best. There, at Kentucky, sophomore Coach Smith watched with the kind of glee only a youngster can have as he beats an old master. Smith beat old master Adolph Rupp, 68-66.

The season, after that, went almost as anticipated. Two stirring wins (over Yale and Notre Dame) sent UNC into the top ten ratings. But suddenly the Deacon struck (70-78), and the Tar Heels saw no more the glare of the national spotlight.

Three league wins were followed by a close 69-77 loss at home to Duke. Carolina won five more times the rest of the regular season, but it was the two remaining defeats that will be remembered. McKinney beat us again by one (72-71), and Duke beat us once more, this time scoring in excess of 100 points — the first time in human history a team had done that against UNC.

Filled with many victories, some surprises and a few disappointments, North Carolina's 1962-63 basketball season, in the final analysis, must be called somewhat of a paradox.

By all the tenets of common sense:

- (1) you do not field a team of five starters 6-5 or less and win in big-time basketball;
- (2) you do not go to the dreaded home floors of Kentucky and Notre Dame and beat them both;
- (3) you do not lose to a team of apparent lesser ability than your own three times in one season.

Carolina did all three this past basketball campaign.

But it was much less what the Tar Heels did than the way

they did it that made the year such an enthusiastic success.

Led by the most exciting sophomore to enter the Atlantic Coast Conference in years and two of the classiest guards ever to wear the Blue and White, UNC sometimes ran, sometimes walked and all the time hustled to a 15-6 overall record and a 10-4 ACC measure.

Surprising many people, Coach Dean Smith's relatively under-sized crew lost only to nationally-ranked but regionally-hated Duke and to Horace "Bones" McKinney in the ACC.

The ACC tournament left a sour taste in the mouth. South Carolina fell easily in the first round, 93-76. But then there he was again, and then he beat us again, and it was one point (55-56) again. And Carolina fans could be forgiven if they didn't give a damn that McKinney is a UNC graduate and was once a star basketball player here.

Though senior guard and co-captain Larry Brown had his finest season in closing out a brilliant career; though co-captain Yogi Poteet, Charlie Shaffer, Bryan McSweeney and Ray Respass played inspired ball throughout; though Mike Cooke retained his reputation as the best sixth man in the league; the year had to belong to the 6-5 strawberry blond sophomore who made this team what it was — Billy Cunningham.

Billy The Kid did have a few faults (he has not yet learned how to walk on water) but not many. His gifted leaping ability and sometimes unbelievable twisting moves carried him to a 22.7 scoring average and, perhaps more important, a 16 rebounds-a-game figure. Cunningham, on the way to breaking all UNC rebounding records, earned a unanimous vote for the ACC all-star team as well as considerable All-American mention. This mention should be supplemented next year.

Billy's top billing was supported by Brown (with a 14.2 average and an all-ACC berth), Poteet (13.4) and Shaffer (9.9). Additional help came from McSweeney (6.8), Respass (6.7) and Cooke (5.5).

Though Carolina loses seniors Brown, Poteet, unheralded but valuable Dieter Krause and Peppy Callahan, and reserves Charlie Burns and Richard Vinroot, next year's situation leaves no cause for remorse.

Returning to join the magnificent Cunningham will be forefront men Shaffer, McSweeney, Respass and Billy Galantai; sharpshooting guard Cooke; and valuable help from the freshman team in 6-8 Bob Bennett, forward Jim Smithwick and guards John Yokley and Jim Moore.

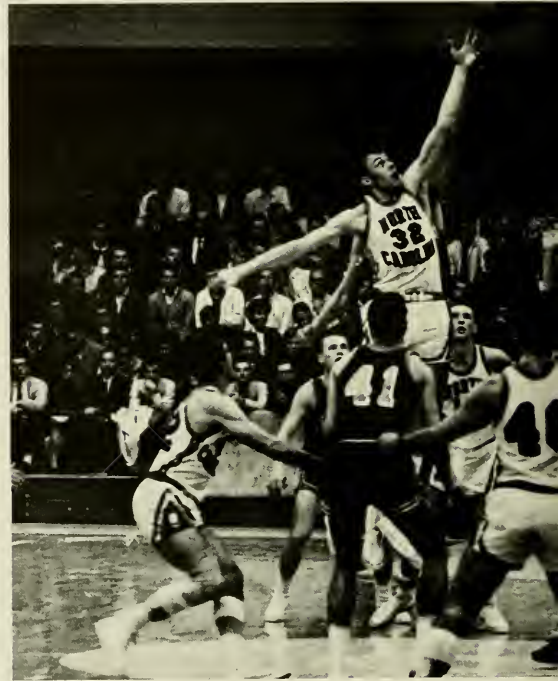

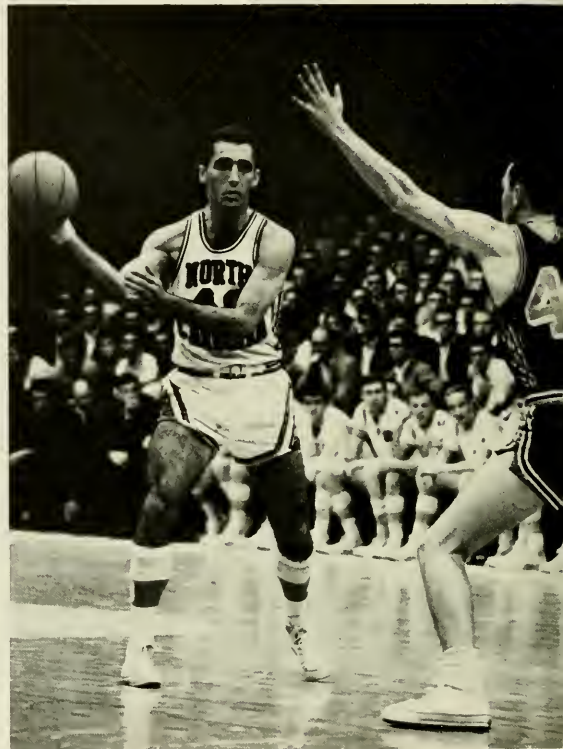

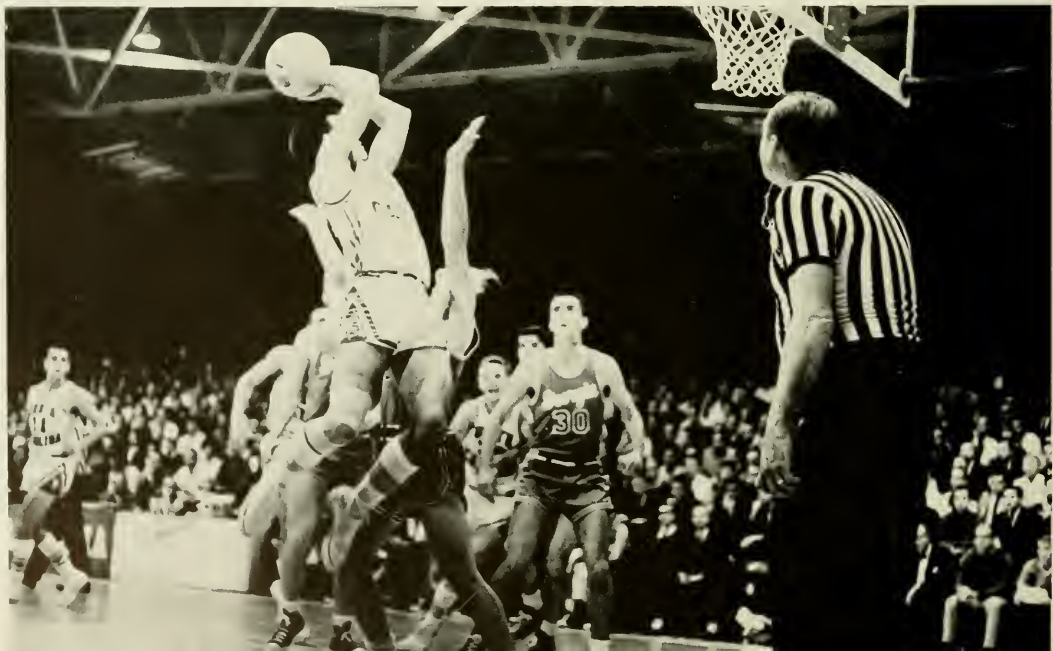

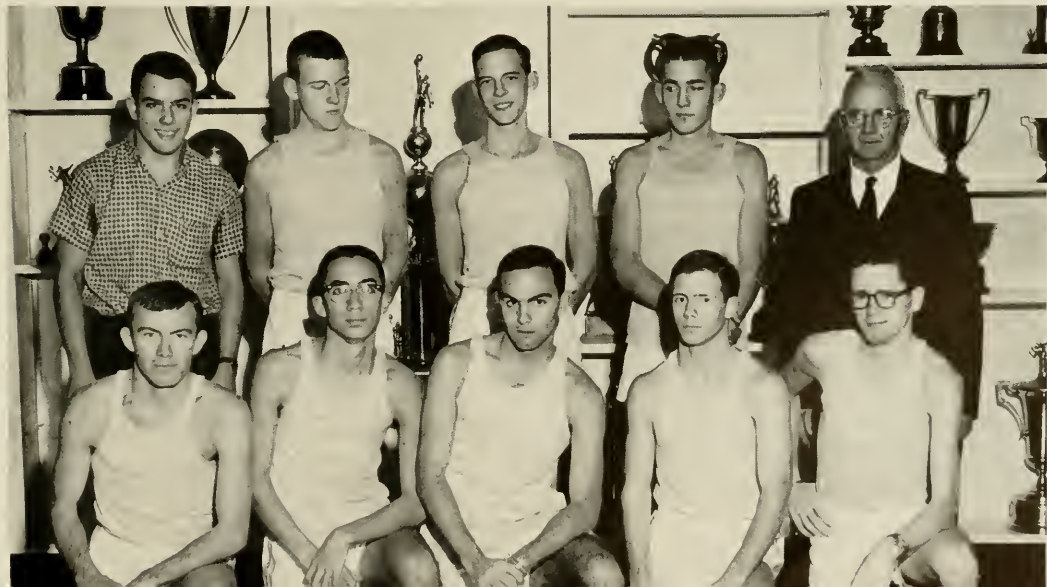

The 1962 track season saw Dale Ranson's indoor runners come closest to upsetting Maryland as anyone has come in half a decade. Later in the season the Carolina outdoor runners once again almost downed the Terps — but a week later they lost to underdog Duke and had to settle for a 4-2 overall record.

Standout of the year was sophomore high jumper Tommy Clark, who cleared an ACC record height of 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$. Also, junior pole vaulter Heath Whittle cracked the school record with a fiberglass vault of 14-1 $\frac{1}{2}$ and Bob Hart set a new UNC standard of 47.3 in the 440. Senior John O'Brannon was the conference broad jump champ.

The highlights of 1962 indoor track featured Scott Brent and Bob Bennett finishing first and second in the conference meet in the $\frac{1}{2}$ mile. In outdoor track, Brent broke the ACC record but finished second to a Maryland runner. Rounding out the outdoor performers, Bob Hart was best in the AAU meet in the quarter mile.

The overall 4-2 ACC record which Carolina achieved was good enough for a second place position in the conference — as good as we have done in many years. Coach Ranson believes that the 1963 track squad is as good as, or better than, any team we have had here in a good while.

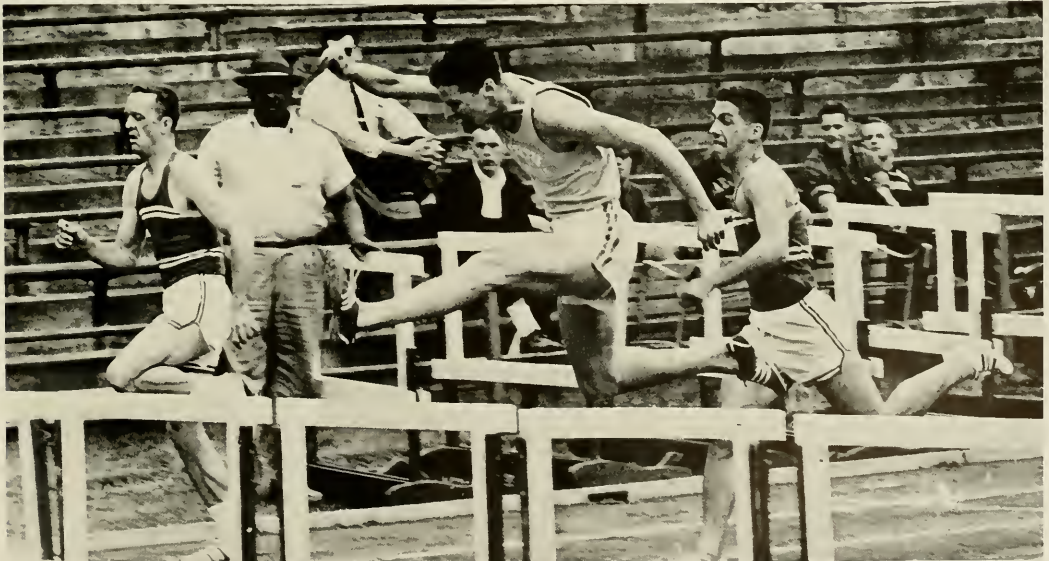


Carolina's Jerry Stuver makes his move to the front of the 1962 Atlantic Coast Conference meet.

Last season, after compiling an unimpressive 4-7 record, the Tar Heels earned a second place finish in the ACC Tournament. This year's varsity, led by seniors Gene "Dribbles" Record, and Willis "Quack" Johnson and also junior Jerry "Bearcat" Cabe, destined to improve upon their deceptive mid-season record of two victories against five defeats. 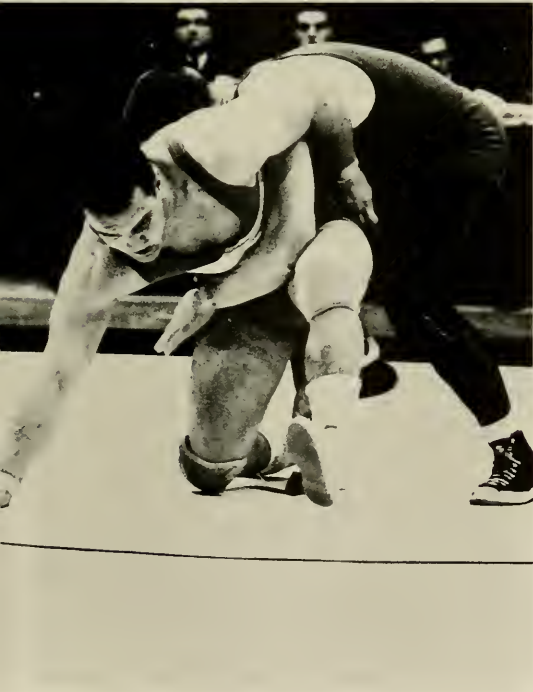

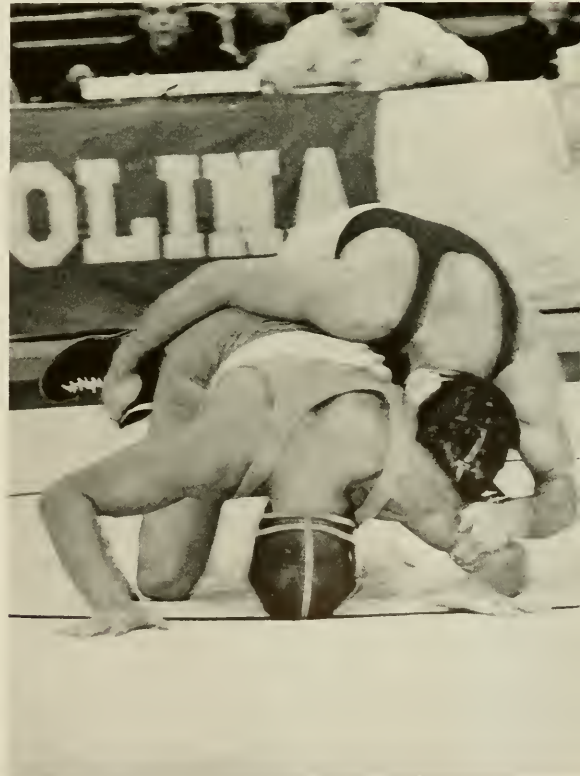


Joel Fishman struggles to keep his head above water in match against Washington and Lee.

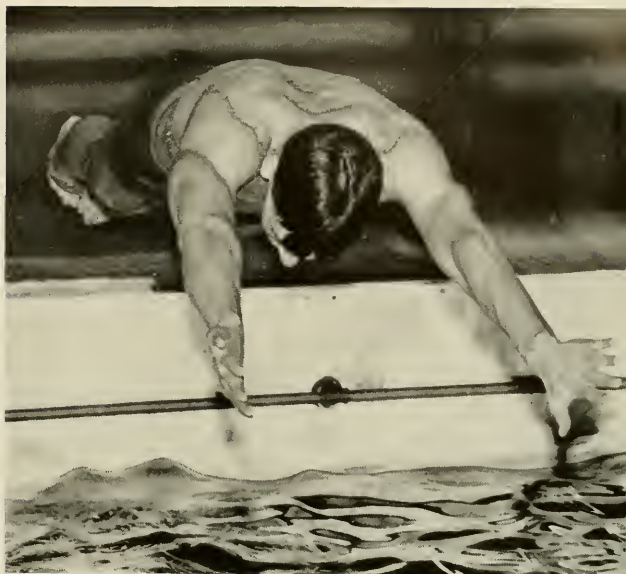

It was a great year for the annually formidable tennis teams of North Carolina. Four of the five returning starters from the 1961 ACC Champions found themselves without a steady job as perhaps the finest collection of sophomores in Tar Heel history made their debut.

With a significant exception Coach Donald Skakle's youthful charges completely devastated their opposition in rolling up a splendid 22-1 record. No ACC team could even stay on the same court with the fierce Tar Heels as UNC loped to its fourth consecutive conference crown, all under Skakle. Carolina now has won 54 out of 55 conference matches and 39 in a row. Sophomore George Sokol grabbed the ACC singles title, while sophs Ted Hoehn and "Bitsy" Harrison combined for the doubles crown.

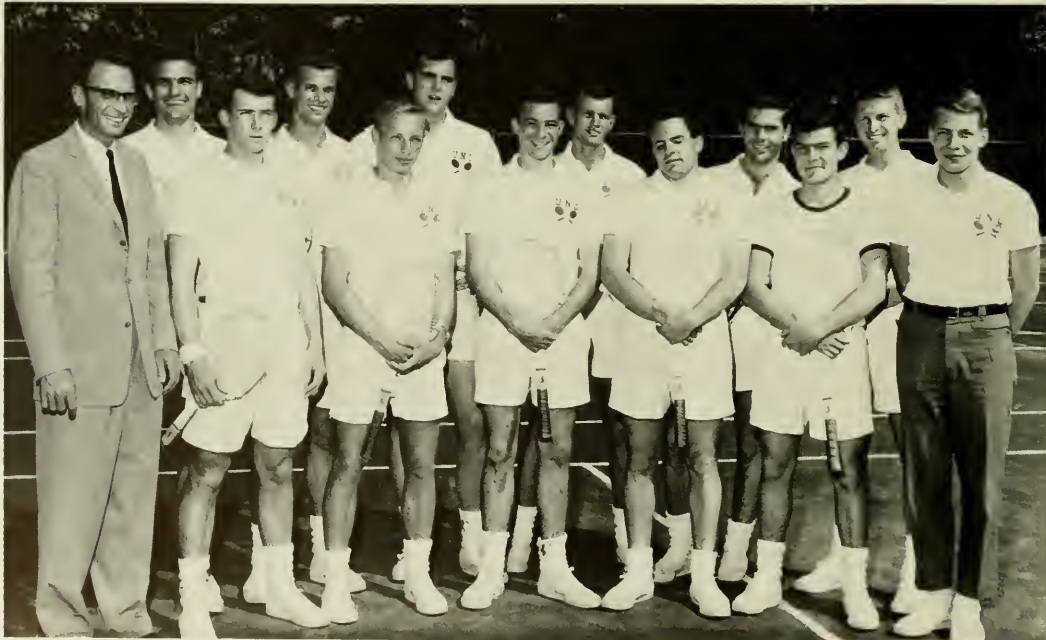

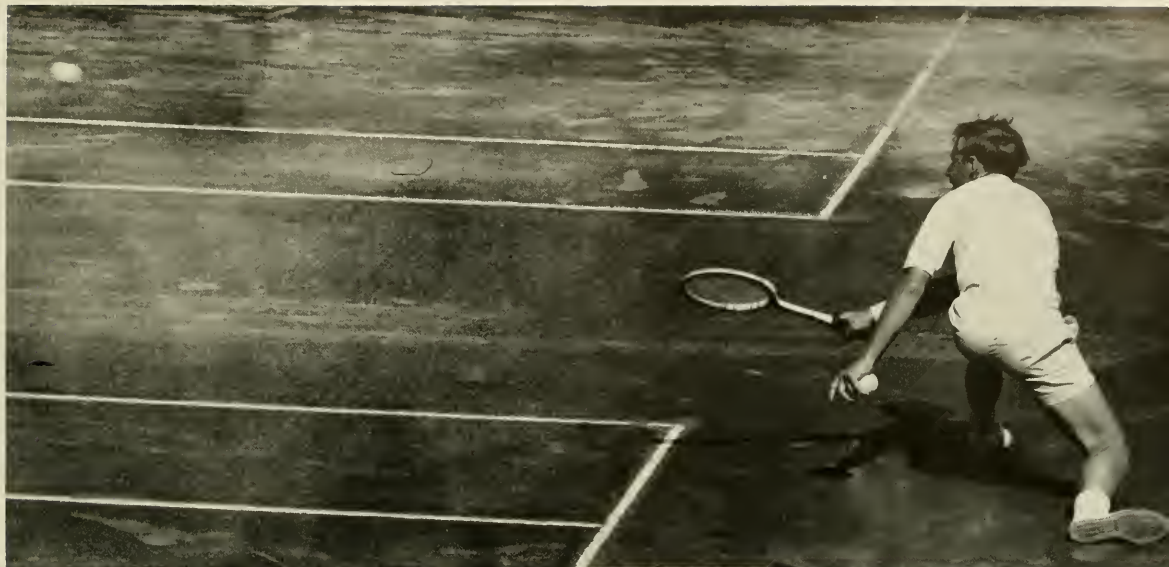

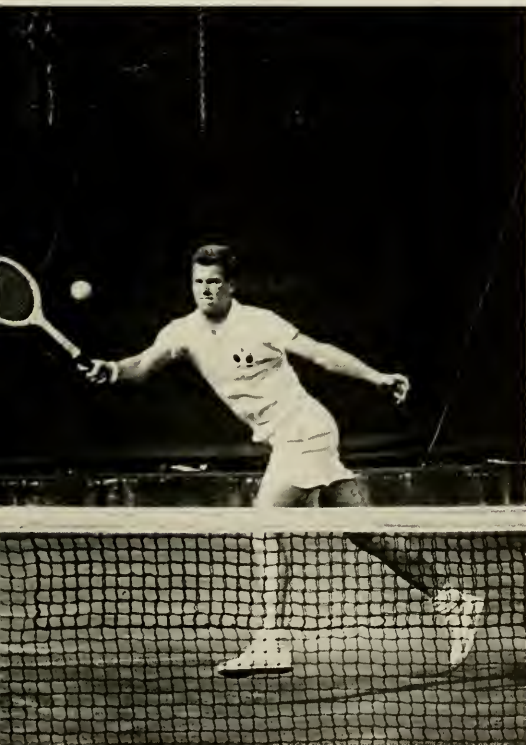

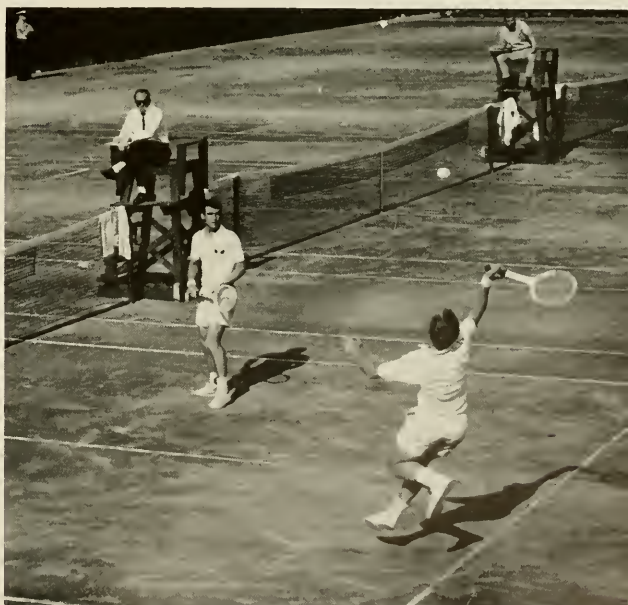


Playing the number one position, George Sokol slams a forehand shot back at his opponent.

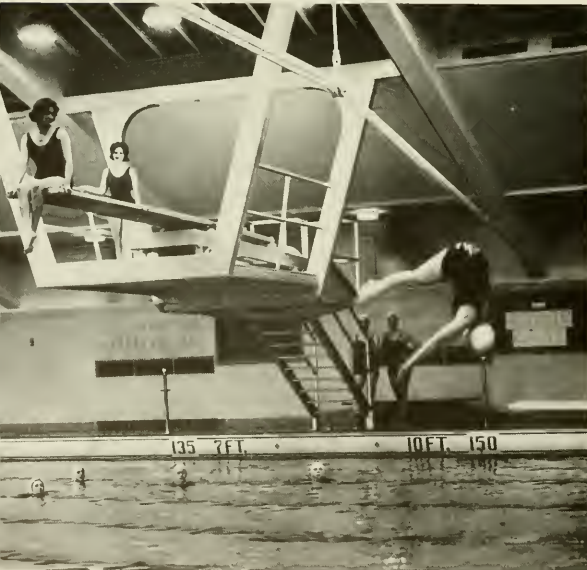

LAW SCHOOL

The Law School, which developed into the School of Law of the University, was founded as a private school in 1843 by William H. Battle, then a judge of the Superior Court, later a justice of the State Supreme Court. In 1845, Judge Battle was made Professor of Law in the University, and the University provided that the degree of Bachelor of Laws should be conferred on those completing the prescribed two-year course. From the records of the University, however, it seems that few degrees were actually conferred.

For a long time the School maintained a certain independence from the University. The Professor of Law received no salary, and the students were not entirely subject to the discipline of the University. This was the position of the School during the professorship of Judge Battle, who retired in 1879; during the two years that the law classes were conducted by Kemp P. Battle, then President of the University; and, to a considerable extent, during the professorship of John Manning, who was elected in 1881 and died in 1899.

In 1899, the School was completely incorporated into the University; James C. MacRae, previously a justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, was the first Dean. He was succeeded in 1910 by Dean Lucius P. McGehee, who served in that position until 1923.

With the construction of Manning Hall, in 1923, the law school entered its "modern" era. Serving successively as deans were Merton Leroy Ferguson, 1924-26; Abner Leon Green, 1926-27; Charles T. McCormick, 1927-31; Maurice T. Van Hecke, 1931-41; Robert H. Wettach, 1941-49; and Henry P. Brandis, Jr., 1949 to date.

This is the School of Pharmacy — dedicated to the development of qualified and well rounded pharmacists to carry on the work of our time honored profession.



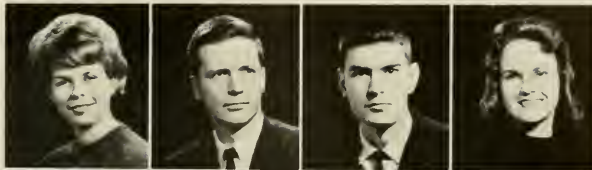

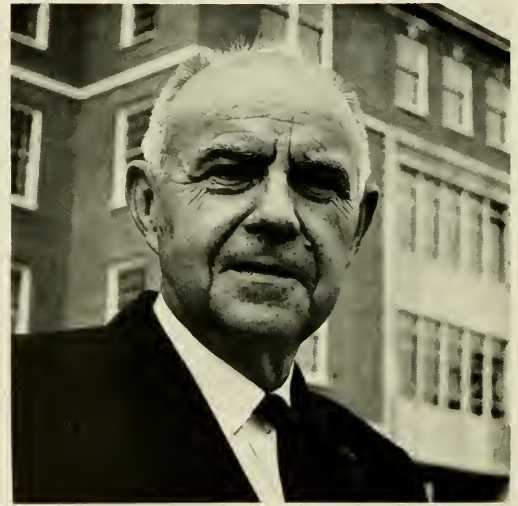
SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH

More than any other profession, the School of Public Health enjoys a sense of internationalism. Alumni from our school are engaged in community health activities on every continent, and students come to us from the far reaches of the globe. At home and abroad, the problems of prevention and control of disease and pestilence, sanitation of the environment, improvement of health standards and status, and public education in healthful living have steadily gained recognition as basic responsibilities of the community on state, national and international levels.

Our School of Public Health, one of fourteen such accredited schools in North America, prepares professional workers for service wherever their specialties take them, through study and research in the ten operating departments of the School: Biostatistics, Epidemi-

ology, Maternal and Child Health, Parasitology, Public Health Administration, Public Health Education, Public Health Nursing, Public Health Nutrition, Sanitary Engineering and Mental Health. Students number nearly two hundred and come to us with basic preparation in many professions, such as medicine, dentistry, education, engineering, nursing, statistics and social sciences. Our faculty of seventy-five likewise have varied professional backgrounds. Most work is on the graduate level, with 75% masters candidates, 10% doctoral candidates and the remaining 15% undergraduate.

Moving into a new building in November 1962, dedication exercises were held in April 1963, with alumni and friends returning to inspect and admire the new facilities and to rejoice that at long last the School had been brought together under one roof.

In 1951, the University of North Carolina School of Nursing opened its doors to the first twenty-six students in North Carolina to enter a four-year collegiate program. The school continues to pursue a four-fold approach to nursing education, offering undergraduate education, graduate education, continued education (through extension courses, institutes and workshops), and research in the field of nursing.

Dr. Elizabeth L. Kemble has been dean of the school since its opening. There are currently thirty-four faculty members and an enrollment of over two hundred fifty students. These include generic, general, and graduate students.

In October of 1962 an initiation ceremony was held for charter members of the Alpha Alpha Chapter of *Sigma Theta Tau*, National Honorary Society for Nursing. This society is established only in collegiate schools of nursing fully accredited by the National League for Nursing at all program levels.
