



CLASS HISTORY

We, the class of '52 have been guided throughout our four years of high school at Gibsonville by a very capable, progressive, and beloved principal, Gerald D. James. Under his guidance many new facilities have been added which we have had the pleasure of using. Changes for the better have come about, and many of our class members have played important parts. As we look back over our last years here, we can see some of these changes and also the changes in us.

In 1948, we became Freshmen -- 68 strong. Our homeroom teachers were Mr. J. S. Casey and Mrs. I. H. Vickery, Jr., and we elected as officers Arnold Beckom, President; Barbara Smith, Vice-president; Donald Overman, Secretary; and Jean Isley, Treasurer. Like all Freshmen we got the blame for most of the mischief that went on, and it seemed that we were not allowed to travel anywhere. However, most of us became members of an activity or two, some made the athletic teams, some were on the "Black and Gold" staff (one of the first progressive steps), and we got our picture in the annual for the first time. By the end of the year most of our "greenness" was gone.

Rising to mighty Sophomores in the fall of '49, 45 of us entered the homerooms of Mrs. Vickery and Mr. Casey, who returned with us. Herbert Belvin was elected president. During this year more extra curricular activities were added, one of them being the first school band in the high school's history, and a few of our class members joined the outfit. Becky Walker joined us toward the latter part of the year when we were beginning to think about the Junior play, class rings, the banquet, and a new gym (maybe).

Thirty-seven Juniors walked noisily into Miss Bernice Odom's homeroom on September 6, 1950, and the same day elected Arthur Davis, who had moved here from Crewe, Virginia, as president. About a month later, after much discussion, another step of progress to our school began -- a student council -- so that the students could have a say -- so in the affairs. Miss Odom was sponsor, and two of our class members had the honor of being its first leaders -- Nancy Gilliam, president (and no one could have been more capable), and Bobby "Red" Gerringer, vice-president. Our school football team had a lighted field of our own on which to play for the first time in the school's history. Later in the year a few of our boys felt the need to go into the service of our country and left us (gladly or sadly?). One of these was "Red" Gerringer, and elected to take his place on the Student Council from our class was Richard Brothers. Our ruby class rings came sometime in February. The play "Deacon Dubbs" was given in March and was a huge success. Then on May 4 the climax of it all -- our banquet for the Seniors, "Hitch Your Wagon To A Star" -- given at the Bliss Restuarant in Greensboro. We had

much fun but hard work in preparing for these events. The gym was not completed entirely that year as anticipated, but several non-conference basketball games were played in it. Quickly these days disappeared.

September of 1951 arrived and 39 students were at last Seniors. We could finally sit under Mr. James' nose in the auditorium. We began looking forward to the Senior play, the Junior-Senior banquet again, and the Washington trip. We elected as officers Billy Creasy, president; Jim Grigg, vice-president, LaRue Allen, secretary; and Betty Andrews, treasurer. We elected our mascots, Tanya Apple and Jimmy Overman. We played the part of leaders in many instances, being led ourselves under the guidance of our homeroom teacher, Miss Catherine Chiffelle.

The class of '52, as one of the largest graduating classes of all time, will not forget the many wonderful experiences at G. H. S. Now it is our aim to go out into the world and to go forward so as to reflect credit on our "Alma Mater".
