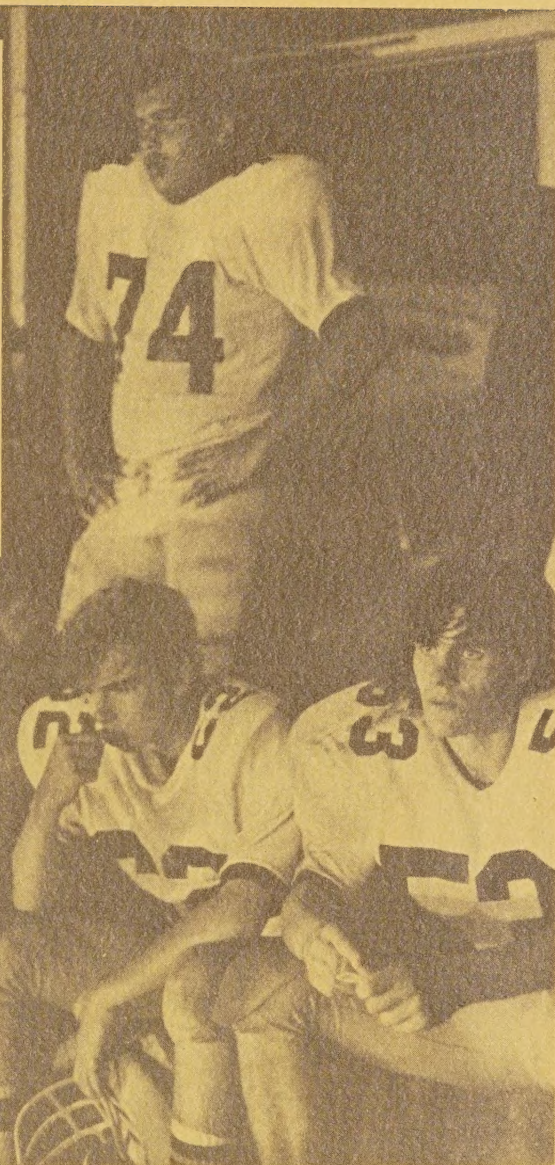
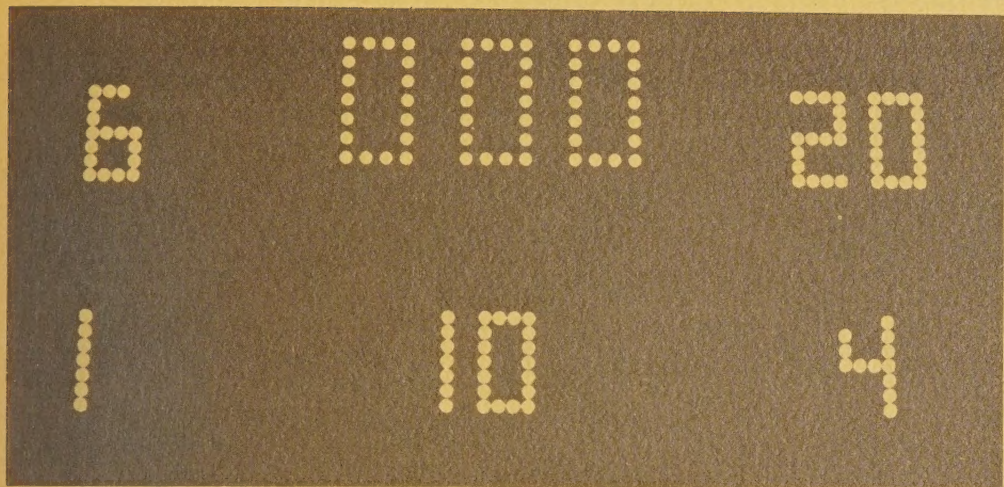
Once in a lifetime . . .

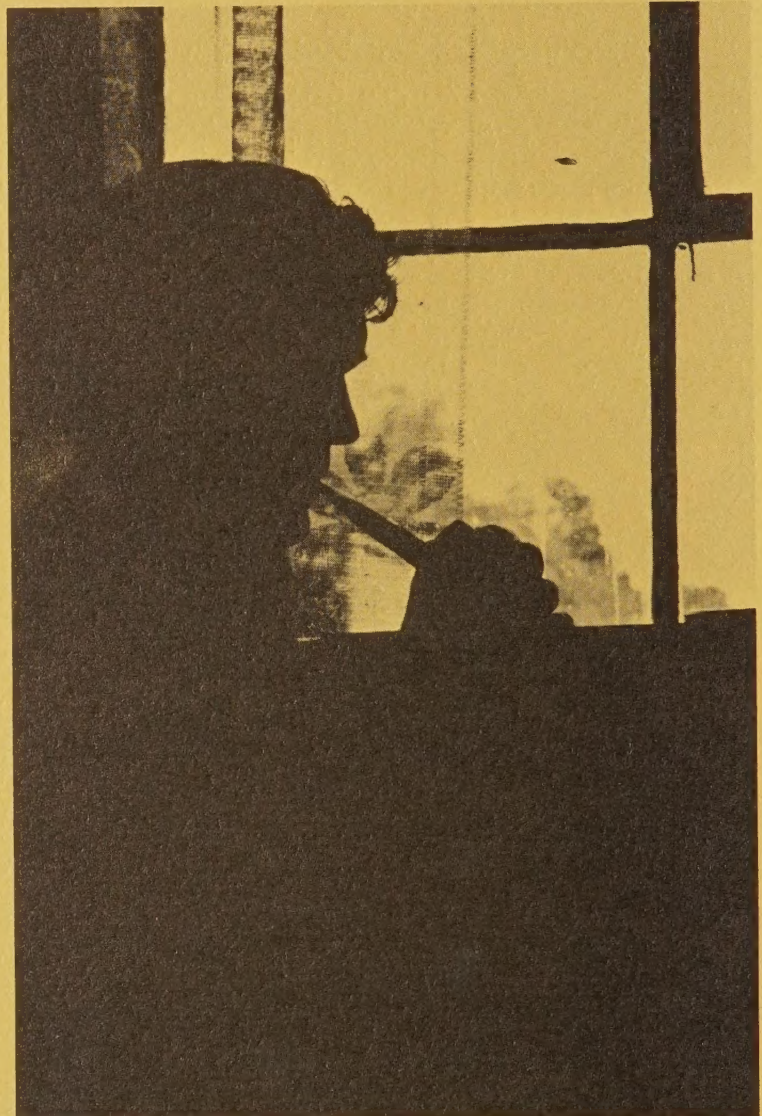




... and heartbreak ...

... anxieties ...

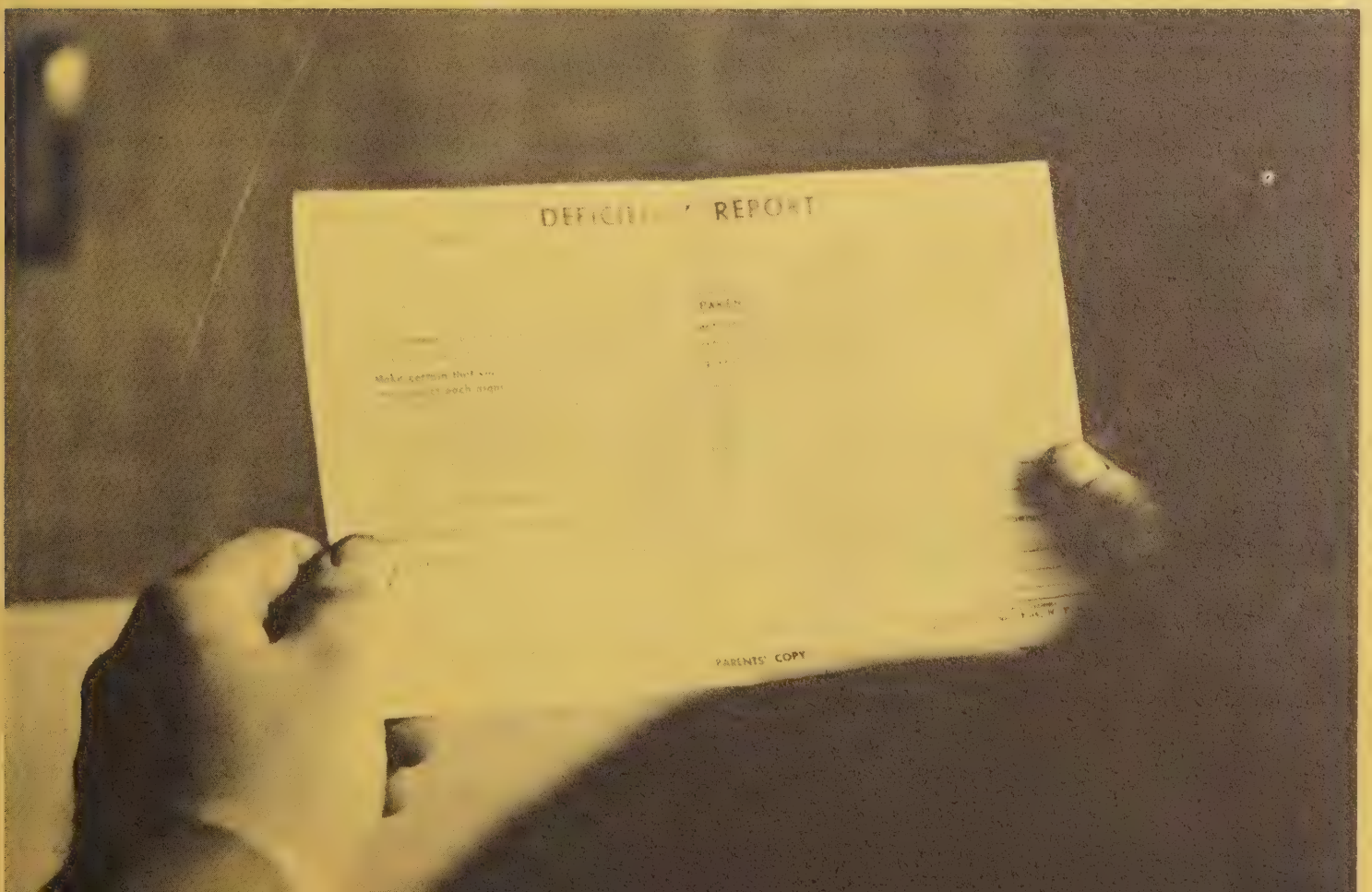
Anxieties and frustrations are a part of life no matter what age we are. Whether we be young or old or in-between, all our apprehensions are serious matters.

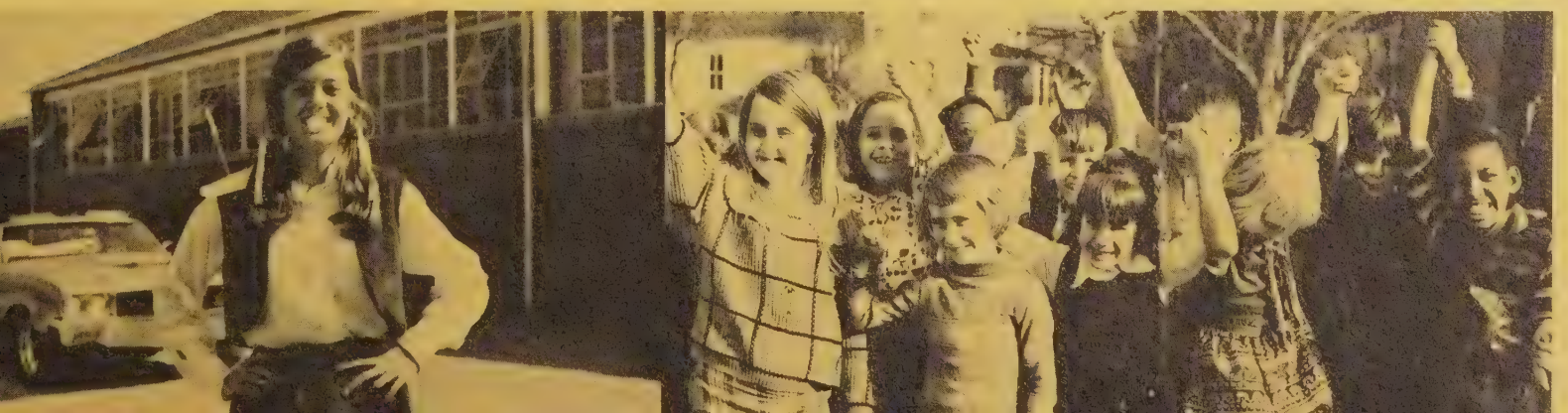

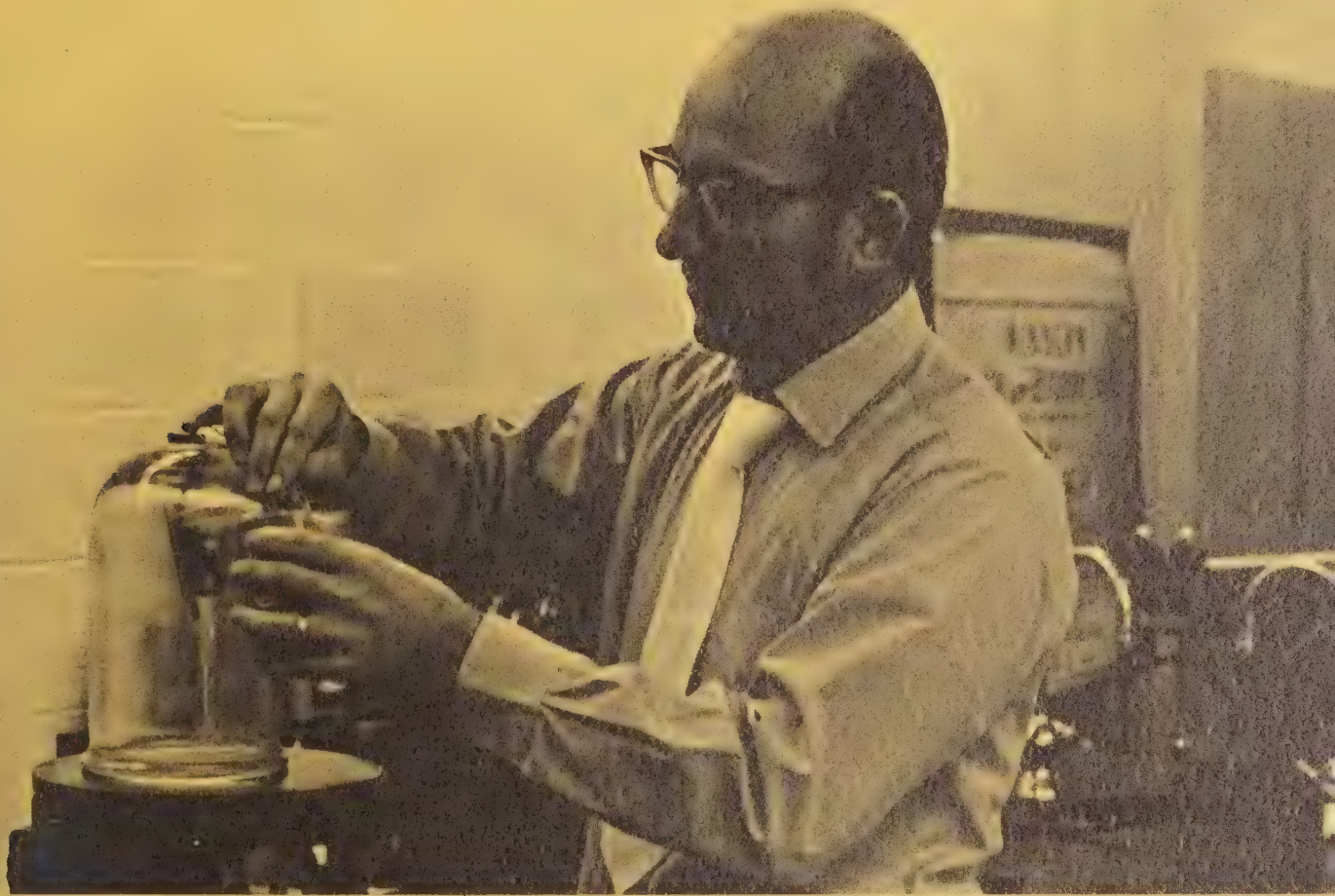


... and forgetting ...

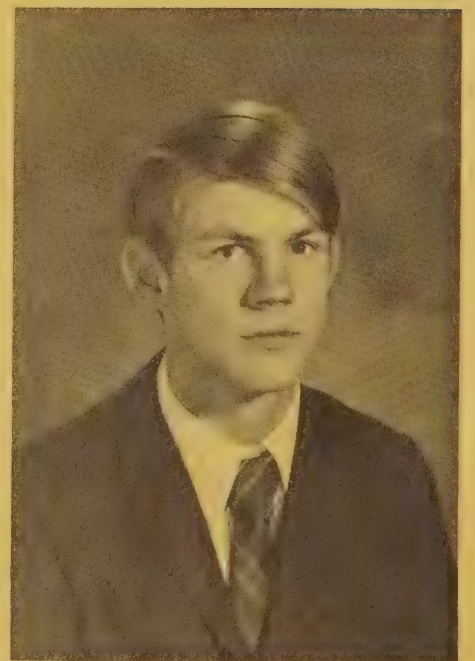

OUR PRINCIPAL

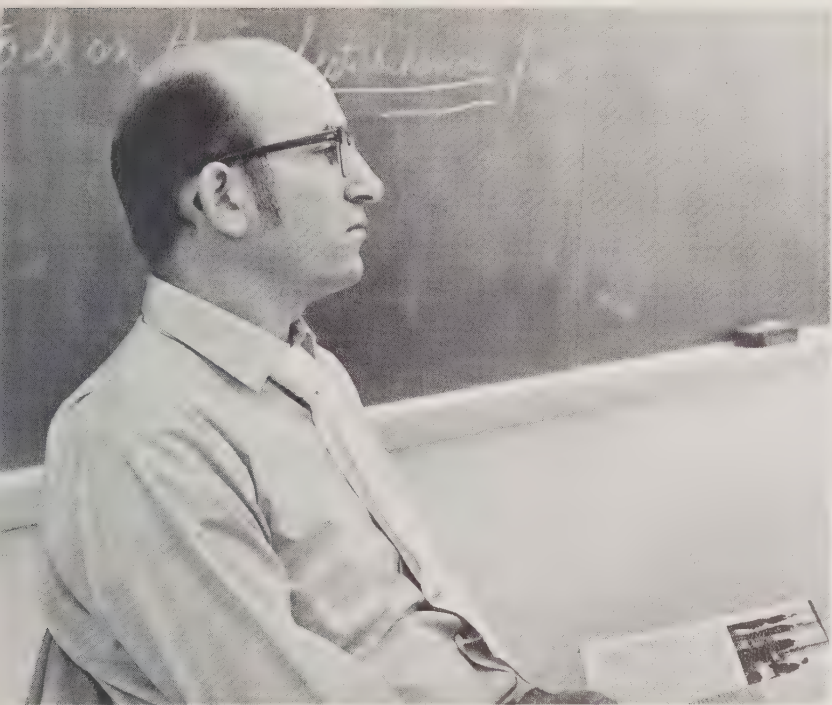

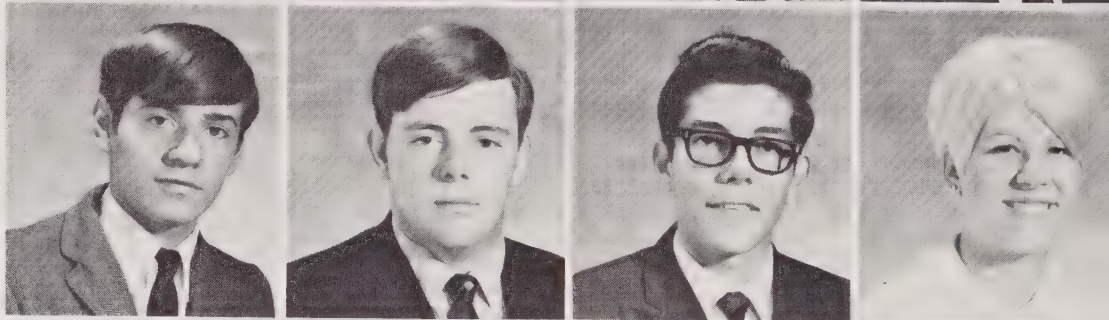
The junior — he is perhaps a little cocky, possible over-confident, but always working, thinking, and waiting for better things to come.

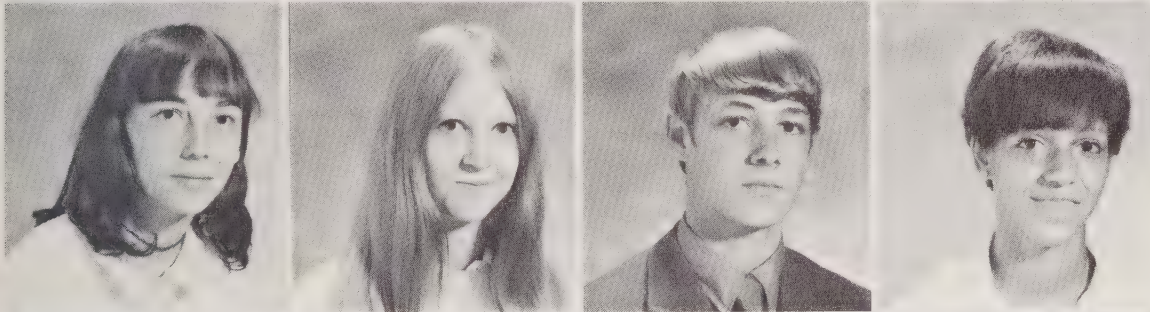
this awkward and sometimes confusing time, he finds out who he really is even though there be times he temporarily forgets.

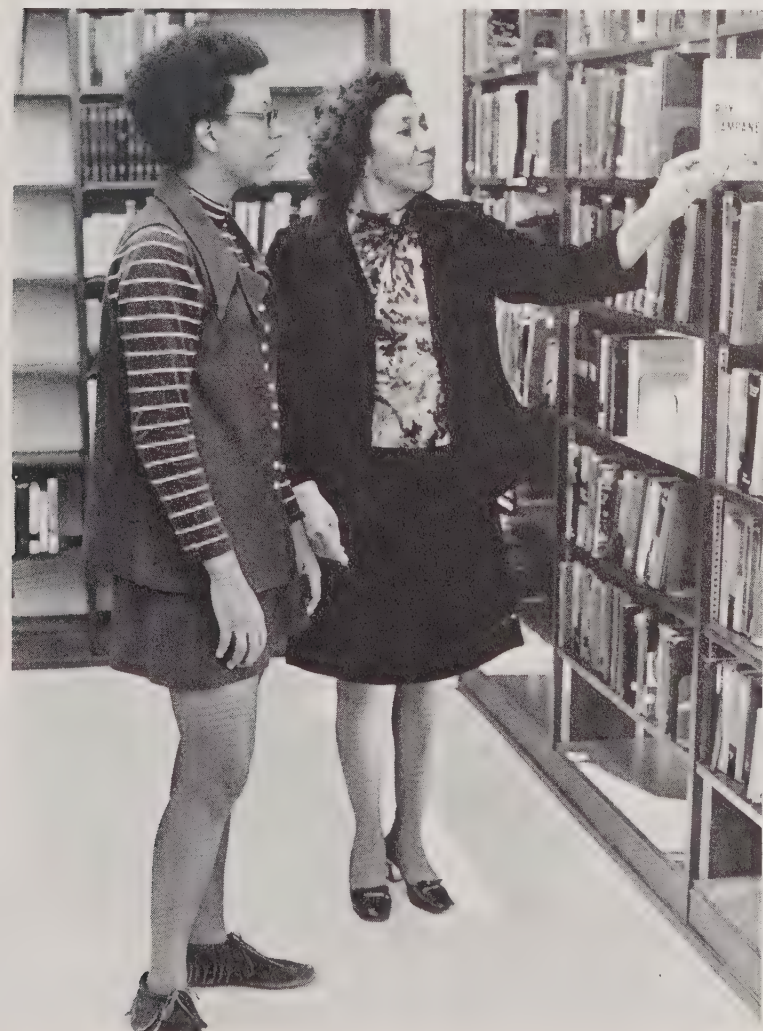

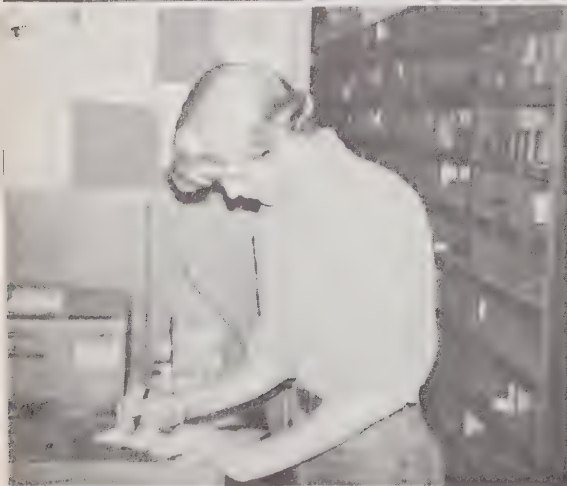

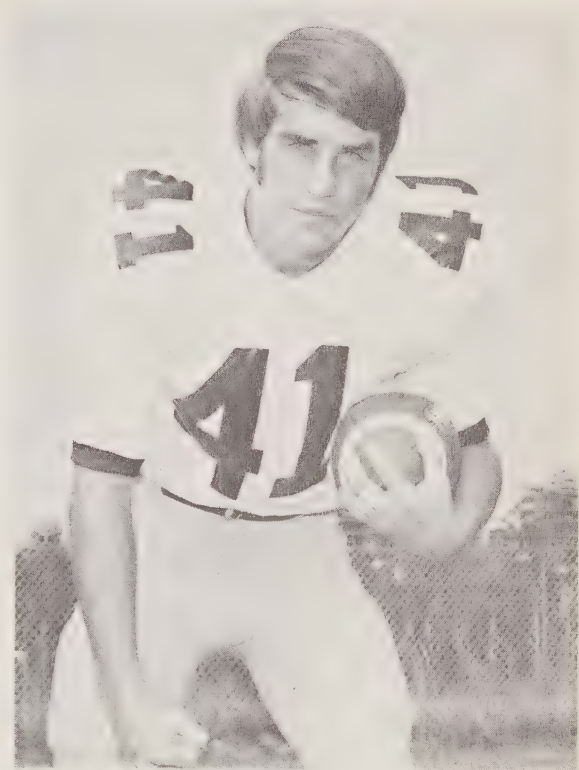
